Old building now teacherage

FORT ROCK — Passing an enrollment of 50 called for some changes at Fort Rock School. Pupils of the first three grades are now housed in the old building which had been converted into a teacherage.

Mrs. Evelyn Rice, a teacher of many years' experience does not mind the improvising necessary as they get under way for the new semester. With blackboard space at a premium she uses newsprint and a marker to supplement. Since she does her own janitor work anyway she doesn't object to stoking the wood stove, supplemented by wall electric heat.

Mrs. Rice has five girls and 12 boys in her three grades. The building was moved to the present site around 1940 and restored to use. It had been built in homestead days.

Dividing the eight grades into three rooms gave Mrs. Freda Thayer the intermediate section and Mrs. Maurice Ward was added to the teaching staff to work with the seventh and eighth grades.

There has been a gradual increase in enrollment since the beginning of the Christmas Valley community, which lies chiefly within the huge Fort Rock School district.

Damage action filed in court

Harold Hill and his wife, Katherine, owners of the K Bar 7 motel south of Bend, have filed damage actions in circuit court against Sig Tomczak Ford, Inc., Redmond, and Sig Tomczak.

Each plaintiff is seeking damages as the result of an alleged altercation Aug. 16, 1963, at the motel. Each is asking \$5,000 punitive damages, "because of the wanton and malicious nature of the defendant's acts," according to the complaints.

Each plaintiff also seeks \$17,500 special damages for medical costs, and \$1,000 general damages.

The trouble reportedly was the result of a disagreement over a truck the plaintiffs had purchased from the motor company.

Attorney feels audible grace violates law

SALEM (UPI)—Audible recitation of grace by elementary school children before cafeteria meals violates the 1963 U. S. Supreme Court ban on school prayers, a local school board attorney said today.

"It is my opinion that grace may not be given by the teacher or under the direction of control of the teacher, the principal or the school district, but there is no prohibition to a period of silence or meditation by the pupils."

A Salem resident, Kenneth Tollenaar, asked the school board last September to check the legality of some classes giving thanks at mealtime.

The local school board has no policy on the prayer issue. Some schools or classes recite a common grace, some have no observance, and others allow a few seconds of silence before the children are seated.

Boards adjust teaching cost

PRINEVILLE — Members of the Brothers School Board and Dave Potter, Deschutes county school superintendent, met with the Crook County School Board this week, seeking an adjustment on the cost of teaching an unusually large number of Crook county pupils in the Brothers school last year.

It was the first time that the two school boards had met to discuss jointly the problems incurred when an extra number of children from the GI ranch were sent to the Brothers school. Because of the larger pupil load, the Brothers district hired an extra teacher this year, the Crook county board learned, only to discover that pupils from the GI ranch were being sent instead to the Paulina school in Crook county for the current school term.

The Crook County Board learned that it costs the Brothers district \$4.15 a day per pupil for education. Costs in Deschutes county are figured by individual districts, whereas Crook county spreads its cost of education throughout the county with a resultant \$2 per day pupil cost.

Last year, Crook county paid the Brothers school district \$2 per day per pupil resident in Crook county. The visiting delegation asked the school board for the difference in costs.

After the visiting group had left the meeting, the Crook County School Board moved to offer the Brothers district \$1 a day per pupil for a total of 2010 pupil-days last year. The board mentioned the fact that the Crook county school district in the past has assisted the Brothers district through donation of classroom articles including desks, and some road maintenance.

Two Crook county children are at present attending the Brothers school, located a short distance from the southwestern county line in Deschutes county.
