Electric firm hit by blaze

A defective heater was cited as the probable cause of a fire which swept the office section of a building on S. Third Street which houses two electric firms.

Four pieces of fire apparatus and some two dozen firemen spent better than an hour fighting the blaze. The shell of the building and most of the interior remained intact, with structural damage inflicted chiefly to the office of Jim's Electric and portions of the roof. Waddell's Electric, which occupies the south half of the structure, suffered mostly smoke and roof damage. The paint on one of two trucks in the building was cooked by the searing heat, but neither truck was believed to have received mechanical damage.

Operators of the twin firms are Jim Newell and Donald E. Waddell. Newell told a fireman he was in the Waddell portion of the building when he smelled smoke, and found his office in flames. Firemen received the call at 5:29 p.m.

Building owner Walt Roy, told The Bulletin this morning there is no fire insurance on his building.

Committee announces plan for 4-cent-a-pack tag tax

SALEM (UPI)—Plans to initiate a 4-cent a pack cigarette tax to be voted on at the November general election were unveiled before the Interim Tax Committee here today.

Rep. Joe Rogers, R - Independence, said he and Rep. Morris Crothers, R-Salem, were working with a Portland resident, Neil Butler, on the initiative movement. Rogers said several other legislators also were cooperating, but he did not identify them.

Rogers said the proposed law was almost identical to the one that won approval in the House during the 1963 legislature. The measure was defeated in the Senate.

Signatures of 37,092 qualified voters would be needed to get the measure on the ballot. Deadline for filing initiative petitions for the November election is July 2.

Sales Tax Sought

Rogers spent most of his time before the committee today pleading for a sales tax which he said would raise between \$70 and \$74 million a year.

He called for a sales tax to offset steadily increasing property taxes.

"Unless the tax revolt of Oct. 15 is extended to the local level," Rogers said, "local property taxes will continue to rise."

He said 70 per cent of local property taxes went for education.

He said in 1952-53 there were 387,000 census children in the schools, and that in 1963-64 this had increased to 578,000.

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Confessed rapist, 2 others get terms in penitentiary

A confessed rapist was sentenced this morning by Circuit Judge Robert H. Foley to 20 years in the Oregon State Penitentiary, and two other felons appearing yesterday in circuit court received sentences of five years and two years.

Proctor Fackrell, 47, arrested December 7 on a rape charge, was given a 20-year sentence. He was on parole from the penitentiary, having served approximately four and a half years of a 20-year sentence from Curry county on a similar charge. The 20 years and the remaining time from the earlier conviction will run concurrently.

John Junior Duncan, 51, from Brisbane, Calif., was given a five-year sentence on a larceny charge. He had pleaded guilty after being returned from Red-

wood City, Calif. He was arrested for taking \$300 from the BC Cafe, where he had been employed by Bernice Combs.

Clarence James Hedgecock, 35, Tangent, was sentenced to two years for drawing a bank check with insufficient funds in the bank to cover it. He had given a bad check for \$500 to Bob Thomas Chevrolet. He pleaded guilty.

Pre-sentence investigations by the State Board of Parole and Probation were ordered for all three men. They will be taken to the penitentiary this afternoon or tomorrow.

Orland Ray Summers, charged with rape, pleaded guilty in circuit court, after waiving grand jury indictment and being charged on a district attorney's information. A pre-sentence investigation was ordered. Summers was arrested following the armed entry of a Sisters home last month.
