

U.S. investors may be asked for aid on dams

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U.S. investors are expected to be asked to put up as much as \$450 million to finance construction of three dams to be built in British Columbia under terms of the Columbia River Treaty.

U.S. officials are quietly working with private and public power utilities of the Pacific Northwest to set up a unique nonprofit corporation to handle the financing.

The corporation, as now planned, would sell revenue bonds to finance construction of the dams and pay off the bonds through sale in the United States of power originally intended to be delivered to Canada.

Interior Department officials, who have worked on the proposal, declined comment on it but some of the details are expected to be revealed officially next week.

The plan, still subject to change, is expected to meet the objections of British Columbia Premier W. A. C. Bennett, but may now run into opposition from U.S. tax officials. There was no indication yet as to whether the bonds could be made tax exempt and whether the U.S. taxes would be levied on power sales under the proposal.

Under the plan, it is believed Canada would receive the approximate equivalent of 5 mills per kilowatt hour for power benefits due that country under the treaty. Ratification of the treaty by Canada has threatened to founder on Bennett's insistence on that rate—too high to make the power attractive for potential U.S. customers.

While giving Canada the equivalent of 5 mills through savings in interest charges on construction costs, the plan also is expected to make the power available to U.S. utilities at about 3.75 mills.

The nonprofit corporation would include Washington State public utility districts, two or three municipal power companies and private power companies of the Pacific Northwest.

Under the treaty, ratified by the U.S. Senate three years ago, Canada would build the Mica, Arrow Lakes and Duncan Lake storage dams in British Columbia. Canada was to be paid \$64.4 million for flood control benefits accruing to the United States and also to receive a share of power credited to improved regulation of the Columbia River by the Canadian dams.

The Canadian power originally was intended to be delivered to Canada by the Bonneville Power Administration. Under the present plan, all the power would be sold instead by the nonprofit corporation over a 30-year period.

Some details of the proposal are expected to be spelled out here when Canadian Prime Minister Lester Pearson and Bennett visit President Johnson on Jan. 22.

The treaty also calls for construction of Libby dam on the Kootenai River in Western Montana. The dam would create a reservoir extending 42 miles into Canada and thus requires the approval of that country.

If the plan to implement the treaty proves acceptable to all parties, it now appears that Canadian ratification of the treaty signed in 1960 might occur by March.

Sig Unander, former state treasurer, has been regarded as the most likely candidate for the job.

Richard Kleindienst, a Goldwater field man, is scheduled to arrive in Portland Monday and may make the announcement before he leaves.

Hoffa says he's 'not worried'

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (UPI) — Teamsters Union President James R. Hoffa conferred with his attorneys Friday and said he was "not worried" about his impending trial on jury tampering charges.

"I'm not guilty," he said later during a television interview before he boarded a plane for Washington. He said he planned to return shortly before his trial begins Monday in Federal District Court.

Hoffa told about 100 local Teamsters and their wives he was confident he would get a fair trial and acquittal.

As Hoffa was arriving Friday, the 6th U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati issued a ruling upholding Federal Judge Frank Wilson's decision against granting a 25-day delay in the trial requested by one of the Teamsters president's six co-defendants.

But the court ruled that another co-defendant, Lawrence Medlin, would be tried in Nashville at a later date.

Wilson, who still has to rule on three other requests for continuance, was scheduled to meet with both defense and prosecution attorneys today to discuss trial procedure.

Hoffa and the others are charged with attempting to influence jurors in his 1962 trial on conspiracy charges in Nashville.

The case was originally set to be tried in Nashville but a change of venue was granted by Wilson after Hoffa attorneys charged that "intensive publicity" in the middle Tennessee district had prejudiced their case.

Barry raps LBJ's 'war' on poverty

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C. (UPI) — Republican presidential candidate Sen. Barry Goldwater today attacked President Johnson's program to eliminate poverty as an "attempt to divide Americans."

Goldwater, making his first swing into the South since formally announcing his candidacy, was greeted by three volleys from a Confederate cannon when he arrived in this tobacco and military center.

He charged that Johnson's war against poverty was reminiscent of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

"Roosevelt divided the American people," the Arizona senator said. "He pigeon-holed Americans according to income groups."

"If anyone has tried to put the people against the people, it's been the Democratic

party in the past 35 years," Goldwater said. "The Democratic party has not put people to work. The Democratic party consistently has been against the free enterprise system."

"I don't believe we have a Democrat in the administration who understands free enterprise."

Goldwater made his comments at a news conference prior to a breakfast with North Carolina Republican leaders.

Goldwater said if he wins the Republican nomination he

would be happy to debate President Johnson in the 1964 campaign. But he declined to debate another Republican presidential hopeful, New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller.

President Johnson is conceded to be more popular in the South than the late President John F. Kennedy but Goldwater said neither the Republicans nor Democrats could claim all the votes of the "solid South."

"I think we will make some gains," he said.

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
