Board to get requests for restorations

SALEM (UPI)—Requests totaling \$1.7 million will be submitted to the Emergency Board at its meeting here Friday, it was revealed today.

Gov. Mark Hatfield will suggest priorities for restoration of about \$800,000 in austerity cuts. Authorization of emergency projects totaling \$875,097 will be asked, as will permission to raise spending authority by \$202,822.

The Emergency Board, made up of legislators, controls release of funds when the legislature is not in session.

The \$900,000 is money that will be returned to the general fund by the State Veterans' Department as part of the Boardman project.

The governor will recommend priorities for restoring this amount to budgets cut after the Oct. 15 tax referendum.

The Board of Control is asking \$162,842 for construction of an 80-man dormitory at Oregon State Correctional Institution and \$41,045 to meet additional operating costs at the facility because of increased inmate population.

Memorial mass for JFK planned

BOSTON (UPI)—Mrs. John F. Kennedy was to fly here today to attend a memorial Mass Sunday in honor of the late President.

Accompanied by her sister, Princess Lee Radziwill, she was to arrive from Washington aboard the Kennedy family plane "Caroline."

Mrs. Kennedy planned to leave Washington about 1:30 p.m. EST and was scheduled to arrive at Boston about 3 p.m. She planned to spend tonight at the home of the late President's brother, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., and was scheduled to return to Washington after the two-hour ceremony.

Glenn snarls Ohio situation

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI)—Lt. Col. John Glenn Jr. today met with friends, and well wishers for his candidacy for the U.S. Senate, while Democratic Party leaders made plans for their pre-primary convention here Monday.

Glenn and his wife, Anna, spent the night here following his official announcement Friday at the largest political news conference in state history that he will seek the Democratic nomination for the Senate.

State Democratic Chairman William L. Coleman, who was caught off guard by the former astronaut's decision, said he expected the convention to endorse Sen. Stephen M. Young for re-election.

Most party leaders already had come out publicly in support of Young before Glenn's entry into the race. Indications were that most of them would continue to support the 74-year-old Clevelander at the convention.

Glenn is backed by Rep. Wayne Hays and other Democrats who seek to oust Coleman as state chairman.

Junction City educators visit

A nine-man team of educators and high school board members from Junction City — seeking to give their own school program more flexibility — were guests of the Bend Senior High School this week.

The guests represent the first of four prep school groups to visit the school during the coming month. Future teams will be hosted from Klamath Falls, Lake Oswego and Seaside, Wash., high schools.

According to Homer Dixon, superintendent of the Junction City School District, primary interest is focused on modern innovations undertaken by the Bend institution. Bend School Principal Ray Talbert said he was approached with numerous questions about his school's team-teaching system, and the flexible scheduling program which relies heavily on a student honor system.

Talbert said the visitors appeared greatly impressed with most of what they learned. Later, if the district decides to adopt programs similar to those in effect here, it will send instructors to coordinate with local school officials.

De Angelis put behind bars
JERSEY CITY, N.J. (UPI)—Salad oil czar Anthony De Angelis was jailed Friday night on charges involving him in a multi-million dollar fraud.

New Jersey Superior Court Judge Robert Matthews ordered De Angelis jailed when he was unable to post \$150,000 bail. De Angelis, president of the bankrupt Allied Crude Vegetable Oil Refining Corp., was arrested earlier in the day in a civil action involving phony warehouse receipts for \$46 million worth of non-existent fats and oils.

Matthews originally set bail at a record \$46 million, the amount involved in the civil suit, but later reduced it to \$150,000.

The pudgy De Angelis, central figure in history's biggest commodities scandal, was arrested on a warrant obtained by Joseph Nolan, trustee for Harbor Tank Storage Inc., one of the eight firms enmeshed in the spreading financial tangle.

Also arrested was Joseph Lomuscio, plant custodian for Harbor Tank. Lomuscio was jailed in default of \$100,000 bail.

Both men were taken to the Hudson County jail pending a hearing Monday morning. Matthews ordered both men to appear there to answer questions about Allied Crude and Harbor Tank assets.

Mrs. Fred Simpson

Word has been received here of the death in Portland of Mrs. Fred S. Simpson, a former Bend resident whose husband served as mayor of this city for ten years, from 1935 to 1945. Mrs. Simpson died in Portland on Friday.

Cremation rites will be held

at the Portland Memorial, and on Wednesday at 11 a.m. there will be memorial rites at the Niswonger & Reynolds Chapel in Bend. Following those services, the ashes will be placed beside the remains of her husband, in the Pilot Butte Cemetery.

Mrs. Simpson was the former Claudia Foster, of Canyon City. The couple met and married in the John Day town, of which Fred Simpson served as mayor in the early 1890's, before coming to Bend in 1919. The bride was 17 years old.

Elmer Buckhorn, who attended school in Bend before going to college to study law, is a stepson, and a resident of Portland. A daughter, Mrs. Louis Moomaw, lives in Great Neck, N.Y.

PRINEVILLE—Mr. and Mrs. Joe Post, pioneer residents of Central Oregon, will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary at an open house for friends and relatives on Sunday, January 19, from 2-4 p.m. The event is to be held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bailey, 670 South Fairview.

Joe Post was brought by his parents to the part of Crook County later known as the "Post country" when two years old, in 1886. The Post community was named for Joe's father and uncle, Wallace and Walter Post, who in turn operated the post office there, some 27 miles southeast of Prineville.

After Joe Post became owner of a ranch in that community, he and Wilhelmina, niece of Dick Koopman, a native of Hanover, Germany, were married. The couple for a time furnished meals to stagecoach travelers on the Prineville - Burns highway which ran past their door. A number of years ago, the couple moved to Prineville.

Co-hostesses for the open house are their daughter, Mrs. Roy Edwards, and their daughter-in-law, Mrs. Herb Post.

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Man presumed dead arrested Friday night for killing girl, 11

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UPI)—A man presumed to have been murdered and cast into the sea almost a year ago was arrested Friday night for the brutal killing of his girl friend's 11-month-old daughter, police reported.

In a bizarre, sometimes confusing case, police discovered the man who is accused of criminally assaulting and fatally beating Shirley Marie DeJaeger actually is Richard Dennis McCutcheon of North Bend, Ore., who has been missing

since last March. A man and woman now in prison for stealing McCutcheon's car "confessed" to Ventura, Calif., authorities 10 months ago they killed the Oregon man, throwing his body into the ocean north of Ventura. The body was never found, and the district attorney refused to issue a murder complaint against the couple—Clarence E. Parker and Rosalie Eaton.

McCutcheon, who was arrested after an attempt to flee back to Oregon, told a somewhat different version, although most essential facts remained the same.

He admitted in an oral statement both the sexual attack and fatal beating of the 11-month-old DeJaeger tot, police said.

Sgt Robert Morgan said McCutcheon, tracing the story back a year, said he abandoned his wife and three children in Coos Bay, Ore., because of family differences. He said he picked up Parker and Miss Eaton driving through Oregon, and later permitted one to drive while he rested in the back.

Near Santa Rosa, Calif., about 200 miles north of Ventura, he was dropped from the car after being robbed, according to McCutcheon's story. After wandering for days, McCutcheon decided to take advantage of the episode to disappear, assuming a new name, John Lafayette Green, Morgan said.

Both the "confessed killers" apparently believed McCutcheon was either dead or badly injured, Morgan said.

The tot's body was found in the home of her mother, Mrs. Barbara DeJaeger, with whom the suspect had been living for the past month. Detectives said Mrs. DeJaeger had left the girl and her 4-year-old son with McCutcheon. The boy was not harmed.

"I must have done it," police quoted McCutcheon as saying. "It had to be me, but I don't remember." He was arrested at Santa Monica, 165 miles north of here in the stolen car of a neighbor. He was booked on suspicion of murder, criminal assault and car theft.

THEFT REPORTED
JAMES E. CURRIN, JR., 65 Lafayette, told police Friday a set of spinner-type hubcaps valued at about \$35 were stolen from his car while it was parked in front of his house.

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
