Commission upholds administrator

County welfare recipient deprived of aid for dependent child in 'Roger the lodger' ruling

A case of "Roger and lodger" infraction was reviewed at the January meeting of the Deschutes County Welfare Commission, and the decision of John C. Kerns, administrator, to deprive a recipient of aid for a dependent child was upheld.

That was the most spectacular thing that has happened at a Welfare Commission meeting for some time, but not, Kerns said, as great a saving for the taxpayers as a less sensational factor.

The bright side of the picture is in the general assistance category. Deschutes county now has one - third fewer cases of general assistance than at any time in the past three years, and no employable able-bodied heads of families are receiving relief without working.

The county now has 41 general assistance cases on the rolls. This is a drop from 67 cases in January, 1963, and from 69 cases in January, 1962. The decrease is mostly due, Kerns said, to a recent ruling which prohibits a county from carrying any non-resident for a period of more than two weeks.

The cooperation of the local office of the Oregon State Employment Service in finding work for employable general assistance recipients has also been a factor in reducing the load, Kerns said.

Of the 41 cases now carried, eight are employable men who are engaged in the welfare-work program, and the others are transient short-term, disabled persons or elderly folks who have applied for old-age assistance, but need help until their grants are approved.

Aid to dependent children is slightly up over a year ago, (76 cases, one more than last January) and old age assistance shows a slight decrease.

It is the aid to dependent children category which has caused the most static state-wide, and the one on which the Deschutes County Commission took the precedent - making stand. The State Welfare Commission has had investigators on the job, visiting homes of ADC recipients at night, to see if any unrelated men are on the premises. One of these investigators was in Deschutes county on December 13, and checked three ADC homes. In two of them, men were found.

One was a husband, an unemployable disabled veteran, who had recently returned to

his home. The investigator and the local administrator told him that if he wanted to live with his family, there would be no objection; his veteran's pension would be applied against welfare, and his wife could still receive ADC funds. However, the man left home and has not been heard from.

At the other home, an employable unrelated man was found, and the recipient's case was closed without prosecution. His presence at the residence had been reported to the welfare office. The recipient took her complaint to the commission, but the administrator's decision was upheld.

The commission did not make the decision, apparently, without some soul-searching. What, they asked, would their decision have been if several children, instead of only one, had been involved? Is it fair to deprive a child of support because its mother has sex relations with a man?

The commission members justified their stand on the grounds that they were not acting on the basis of moral prejudice. If they are unwilling to make a decision when such an infraction is uncovered, they reasoned, they should ask that no investigations be made.

Kerns said that it is not the welfare policy that ADC recipients must take celibacy vows. Rather, he said, it is the policy that if employable males are in the home, they must assume responsibility for support of the family, whether or not they are

married. The county work program is proving satisfactory, Kerns reported. Four of the eight men are doing janitor and maintenance work at the courthouse; the other four are doing repair work at the county fairgrounds in Redmond. They work one hour for each dollar of welfare money received.

Besides giving the recipients a feeling of independence, Kerns said, the work program makes for a better home situation, where the man has an interest to occupy his time, and has an opportunity for on-the-job conversation with other men.

It is true, Kerns said, that Deschutes, like other counties, has a number of third-generation welfare recipients. There are about 10 such cases in the county.

"For some of these people," Kerns said, "welfare has become a way of life. I don't think welfare workers should attempt to deny it. But when such cases are pointed out, it is the welfare department that gets the blame."

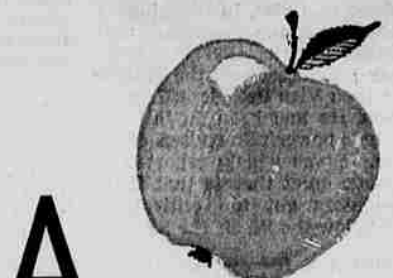
