

Labor launches drive for new workmen's law

SALEM (UPI)—Organized labor, frustrated by the legislature and critical of industry, sparked what is expected to be one of the hottest political issues in Oregon this year when it formally launched its drive to initiate a new workmen's compensation law.

Labor proposes a straight one-way law to replace the two-way act now in effect, wants benefits increased an average of 18.5 per cent, and seeks coverage for almost all workers, including agricultural employees.

The preliminary initiative petition was filed Wednesday with the secretary of state.

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton has 10 days to assign a ballot title.

Opponents then have 20 days to challenge the title. If challenged, the Oregon supreme court must either approve Thornton's title, or draft a new one.

Only then can labor begin circulation of petitions. It must secure 37,096 valid signatures by July 2 in order to get the explosively controversial issue on the November general election ballot.

James Marr, executive secretary of the Oregon AFL-CIO, was asked why labor was launching the initiative movement.

"We don't trust the legislature to do the job," he said. He added, "We'll spend all we can get on this campaign."

"We expect a tough battle, our opponents are already out screaming 'communism and socialism,'" Marr said.

During the 1963 legislative session, labor's efforts to get a new workmen's compensation law enacted into a running, emotion-packed controversy that gave birth to much of the bitterness that clouded the end of the regular session.

At one period during debate on the measure, House Speaker Clarence Barton, D-Coquille, charged Marr was trying to influence votes from the galleries, and threatened to have him thrown out.

Labor wants a so-called one-way bill—which would have the State Industrial Accident Commission be the exclusive source for coverage.

The present measure is a two-way bill, allowing some larger industries to choose between the state plan and coverage they themselves can provide.

Oregon industry has been campaigning for a three-way measure, a choice between the present alternatives, plus coverage by private insurance firms.

Industry is expected to join vigorously in the battle, and a wide-open advertising war is expected as election day nears.

Injury results in civil suit

George L. Warn, Bend, has filed a damage suit in circuit court against Brooks-Scanlon, Inc., seeking \$50,000 for an on-the-job injury.

In his complaint, Warn charges the defendant with carelessness and negligence, and violation of the Basic Safety Code of the State of Oregon.

Warn suffered a back injury April 1, 1963 while employed at the local sawmill as a dry chain puller. He charges that he was required to perform his duties in said capacity "at too great a speed, and to pull pieces of lumber at times when it was unsafe to do so."

A Portland law firm is representing the plaintiff.

Burns is found guilty of 2nd degree arson

PORTLAND (UPI)—David Allen Burns, 20, was found guilty of second degree arson Wednesday after a sometimes wild trial in which he chased a television photographer twice around the fifth floor of the Multnomah County Courthouse.

Burns is scheduled to be sentenced Monday for starting the five-alarm Zidell Explorations, Inc., fire on the Portland waterfront in July, 1961.

The one-armed defendant pursued Allan Anderson of KATU-TV news after breaking away from his guard as he was being led into the courtroom Wednesday morning. Anderson had been filming the activity. An off-duty juror finally grabbed Burns and held him until the guard caught up.

Burns has been confined to the Oregon State Hospital for almost 2 1/2 years. His emotions during the trial ranged from laughter at some testimony to uncontrollable sobs.

He had pleaded innocent by reason of insanity. Defense attorney Charles V. Elliott said he would move that the conviction be set aside.

Damage action filed by Fuls

A transaction involving the sale of Thunderbird, motel and night club north of Bend, is the basis of a damage suit filed in circuit court by Bend Investment Co. and Mr. and Mrs. Jack M. Fuls of Bend.

Mr. and Mrs. Fuls received an apartment house in Portland as part of the consideration when the Thunderbird was sold. They seek a judgment for \$80,000, charging that gross rentals for 1962 were represented at \$38,322, but did not exceed \$33,333.66.

Named as defendants are Mr. and Mrs. Charles T. Grace, Mr. and Mrs. George D. Grace, Elmer A. Kohler and Thomas A. Higgenbotham, dba Higgenbotham Real Estate.

The transaction was negotiated by Higgenbotham and Kohler, as agent for the Graces, on Sept. 10, 1963, the complaint states.

The Thunderbird has since been re-sold by the Graces to Kohler.
