

Negroes said to be growing impatient

CORVALLIS (UPI)—Negroes all over the nation are willing to try to find an answer to the racial problem, but many are becoming impatient, the president of a Birmingham, Ala., Negro college said Wednesday night.

Dr. Lucius Pitts of Miles College called for "a rebirth of freedom in America." He said Negro young people are "getting itchy or anxious" in the face of continued human injustices.

Dr. Pitts spoke to 700 students and faculty members at Oregon State University. Students have organized a drive to collect 10,000 books for the Alabama institution. The drive has brought in 2,000 volumes this week and will run until Feb. 2.

The Negro educator was bitterly critical of Alabama Gov. George Wallace, who spoke at Oregon last week.

Possible blow to Panamanian economy seen

PANAMA CITY (UPI)—The departure for home of hundreds of dollar-spending Americans may prove a blow to Panama's economy, observers here said today.

The U.S. Air Force already has flown more than 1,200 relatives of American servicemen in the Canal Zone back to the United States, and an undetermined number of others are under orders to leave.

Reliable sources say many of about 300 U.S. diplomats and other government employees forced out of Panama by last week's diplomatic break will be sent home soon for reassignment.

Contact between the zone and Panama proper has been virtually cut off since anti-American violence erupted in Panamanian communities near the canal. Panamanians are complaining already about "very bad" business.

Hotels in Panama cities are reported cutting back slightly on employees' working hours because of the loss of U.S. trade.

Canal Zone purchases of food, beer and other products from Panama were totally suspended for about a week, and they are still only a fraction of normal, mainly because U.S. food inspectors do not yet consider it safe to return to Panama.

In 1962, the latest year for which figures are available, U.S. official and private agencies spent more than \$28 million in Panama.

House offered for museum

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89-year-old bailiff wins court fight

PORTLAND (UPI)—James Cormack, 89-year-old Multnomah County Circuit Court bailiff who won a court battle to retain his post against an order of compulsory retirement, said Wednesday he would retire.

Cormack said he would withdraw his suit and retire Feb. 1. He filed the suit contending the county could not force him to retire under its compulsory retirement law because he was not a county employee.

In announcing his retirement, Cormack said there have been repercussions from the suit. He said court appointed personnel were fearful they were no longer eligible for retirement benefits, sick leave and a health insurance plan, since in view of his court victory, they would not be county employees.

He indicated that colleagues once friendly have been giving him the cold shoulder.

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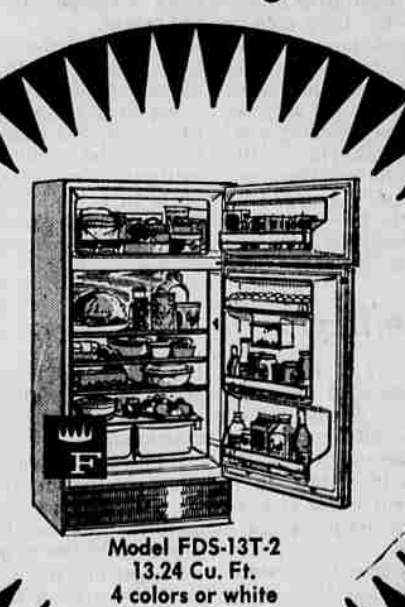
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
