

Death of British tobogganer puts pall on Olympics

INNSBRUCK, Austria (UPI) — The death of a British toboggan competitor threw a pall over preparations today for the 1964 Winter Olympics although U. S. bobsled coach Stan Benham expressed high hopes for his team in the games opening next week.

Kazimierz Skrzytecky, 50, of Britain, died Wednesday after being injured in a spill while on a practice run. The London County council architect suffered a fractured skull, fractured pelvis, double fracture of the arm and other injuries in the accident Tuesday.

His death had been unexpected by doctors since his return to consciousness earlier Wednesday gave rise to the belief he was recovering after emergency surgery.

Meanwhile, preparations for the games advanced to the final stages with a total of 380 athletes from 19 countries already on hand.

Benham refused to be disillusioned over the Americans' poor showing in recent racing tests. None of the three American two-man bobsleds finished among the top six in Wednesday's runs down the glazed ice chute at nearby Igls.

"There are still a couple of days of training ahead and I am sure my boys will improve," said Benham. "We have a good chance of winning a medal in the two-man and an excellent chance of a Gold Medal in the four," he insisted.

Go to Canada

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Oregon State trackmen will find their indoor competition in Canada this weekend.

Graduate student George Kerr of Jamaica will run the 600-yard event in the Maple Leaf Games in Toronto Friday night. That is the same meet in which Oregon's Harry Jerome is scheduled to start his sprint comeback after a serious muscle injury in 1962.

Kerr will join four other Beavers at Winnipeg Saturday night. OSU coach Sam Bell has entered Jan Underwood in the 1,000, Gary Baker and Pete Mewett in the mile, and all three plus Iain Colpitts in the two-mile relay. Kerr will run the 600 again.

\$50,000 golf go

Golf stars face up to stormy weather

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—An international field of golf stars faces up to the weather again today when play opens in the \$50,000 Lucky International tournament—with those young-old standbys, Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus, in the role of favorites.

After a storm-ravaged finish at Pebble Beach on Sunday; and a day at Sacramento spent in freezing temperatures, the crack field opens in the mud here — with the possibility of rain.

"This tournament should join the fall tour, when the weather is good in northern California," said Tommy Jacobs after wallowing through the rain, hail and mud Wednesday in the pro-amateur event.

But mostly there were few complaints from the touring throng of shotmakers. The Harding Park course, which is 6,722 yards long and plays to a

par of 36-35-71, has been swept by rainstorms during the past week. The greens are waterlogged and the fairways soggy.

During the pro-am, many of the stars were putting with their two-irons to get the ball through the water.

Palmer has shown flashes of his championship form after the winter lay-off, but Nicklaus says he is not near his peak. He had a 75 Wednesday.

"I'm not playing well," said the Masters and PGA champion. "And I don't think I'll be back on my stick until we reach Phoenix. I don't even expect to do a good job of defending my title at Palm Springs next week."

Palmer fooled around the course in even-par 71 Wednesday, but he so inspired his partners that they came in with a best ball of 53. This won Palmer \$400 in the pro-am department.

UO students against 'ban'

EUGENE (UPI)—University of Oregon students do not agree with their faculty members that use of compulsory student fees for athletics should be banned.

That was the conclusion drawn by the Opinion Research Committee of the Oregon Daily Emerald, the student newspaper, which ran the survey. It said 69.6 per cent of the students polled preferred compulsory fees instead of outright purchase of tickets.

And 63 per cent said they would buy a season ticket if it were voluntary.

A companion survey showed 75.9 per cent of the students attend football games, 56.6 go to basketball games, 37.3 to track events, 16.9 to baseball games and less than 10 per cent to other sports.

A recent vote at a faculty meeting showed a majority of the professors against using compulsory student fees to support intercollegiate athletics.
