Echo 2 shot is postponed

VANDENBERG AFB, Calif. (UPI)—Technical difficulties in the television camera system of the giant Echo 2 balloon satel-lite forced a second postpone-ment today in the scheduled launching of the first joint space venture of the United States and Russia.

The Echo 2, mankind's larg-est spacecraft, now is slated to be sent aloft from this Pacific missile range base shortly after 5 a.m. PST (8 a.m. EST) Sat-urday. Originally scheduled to be launched Thursday, the huge sphere nicknamed "Satellon" remained grounded because of prevailing gusty winds for a day. Nearly ideal weather had been forecast for today, but the launch had to be put off again because of the technical trou-bles.
