

Scribbling on wall says golfers to gun Palmer, Nicklaus

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (UPI) — The handwriting is on the wall, Lew (The Chin) Worsham predicted today, that the tee-side troops are about to make a big run at the likes of Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus.

Worsham, who beat Sam Snead in a playoff for the 1947 U.S. Open championship, pointed to the results of the year's first three tournaments as a barometer. They were won by Paul Harey, Art Wall and Tony Lema.

"It's not going to be a private party any more," said the husky Virginian who is winter time pro at Coral Ridge Country Club. "The success of Julius Boros last year gave them all a big mental lift."

Boros was named "Golfer of the Year" when he recaptured the Open after an 11 year span and finished third among the money winners with more than \$77,000.

"When I went on the tour in 1946 after getting out of the Navy," said Lew, "I was the fifth leading money winner, you know how much I won? I made \$5,000. Now the guy finishing 25th makes more than that."

"In those days," he added, "there were only about 10 players capable of winning a tournament. Today you could name 25, and more, and still not come up with the winner, Nicklaus and Palmer can't win them all, or even most of them, in this kind of competition."

Lew is not one of those who are ready to take a blacksnake whip to the touring pros for slow play.

"Man," he explains, "when you have a putt that means the rent or that fur coat Mama wants, how can you blame a guy for studying the roots of the grass? It's their living. Then, too, the courses have been toughened up and stretched out that they don't think anything of a layout of less than 7000 yards."

Large galleries also have a slowing effect, he analyzes, even in such well marshalled events as the Open, PGA and Masters where the fairways are roped off.

"Hit one off line and you have to wait while they get the you have to wait for them to crowd back," he said. "Then 'bed down' around the green before you can chip or putt."

"The size of those purses," chuckled the man who confines his play to the years largest tournaments, "is enough to give you the shakes. And also to keep attracting an ever larger group of increasingly better players."

The summertime pro at Pittsburgh's Oakmont Country Club averred that golf has arrived at the stage — thanks to better facilities and equipment for the housewife — where there are more women players percentage-wise than there are men. So you can blame the electric can opener, men, if Mama isn't home when you come from the office.

But as a one-time tee tourist, Worsham at 46 still looks longingly at the ever increasing prize fund and wishes that you and I were younger again. Maggie, Yet his occasional visit into the field is a lot easier on the nerves because he is backed by his two club jobs. "The Chin" knows when he is well off, and when Palmer and Nicklaus aren't.

During his five years there, he inaugurated several special programs for women and built one of the outstanding junior golf programs in the Northwest.

Chet Corryell, president of Bend Golf Club, said, "We feel that we are indeed fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Dudik. We think he will be of help to us in several areas where we have been weak in the past."

Dudik and his family plan to move to Bend in early February. He will take over the pro shop at Bend Golf Club officially March 1.

The former Bend pro, Spence, will take over at Clarkston on February 1.

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Lema, January in golf tourney lead

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Tony Lema, gunning for his second win in a row, and Don January were the pace-setters today with five under par 66's as the second round of the \$50,000 Lucky International golf tournament began.

Lema started off with three birdies in a row — two of them on fantastic putts of 20 and 30 feet. He went four under par on the fifth hole with a six footer and picked up a birdie two at Harding Park's tough 11th hole with a 20 foot putt from off the edge of the green. A sixth birdie fell on the four foot putt on the 16th.

His only mistake all day was a three putt green from 25 feet.

Had No Bogies

January had nary a bogey. The tall Texan, whose last tournament victory was at Tucson a year ago, played all pars for seven holes — then caught fire. In the next 11 holes, he racked up five birdies, one coming on a 35-foot chip shot. Close on the heels of the leaders came the always-dangerous Arnold Palmer and young Jerry Steelsmith, both only a shot back at the 67 mark.

Palmer, who hasn't been up to his usual form so far this year, showed he is rounding into condition by firing five birdies on his first round.

Steelsmith's round was highlighted by an eagle two on a 300 yard, par four hole when he knocked in a full four-iron from 170 yards out.
