

Commercial fishing schedule for '64 adopted

PORTLAND (UPI) — A 1964 commercial fishing schedule for the Columbia River was adopted Friday at a joint session of the Oregon Fish Commission and the Washington Department of Fisheries.

The schedule is subject to revision if any of the runs prove too sparse for heavy commercial pressure.

There were only minor adjustments in last year's salmon netting season, which will run 100.75 days compared to 98 days in 1963.

The dead season, from May 27 to June 18, opens five days earlier than last year in order to obtain better roe. The later season in 1963 found the roe too ripe, according to testimony Friday.

A five-day special dead season from May 27 to June 2 in Youngs Bay near Astoria was authorized as a means of obtaining information on abundance of fish and quality of roe.

Before adopting the regulations, the commissioners heard a letter from the Association of Northwest Steelheaders asking that the commercial fishing season be reduced to 60 days. The group also called for tighter restrictions on commercial fishing gear.

The Washington Game Commission also repeated a request that there be no commercial fishing during February and that the June-July season be curtailed to protect steelhead. That species is considered a game fish in Washington.

The schedule for waters from five miles below Bonneville Dam to the mouth of the Columbia is:

Winter season, Feb. 15 to March 1; Spring season, April 30 to May 27; summer season, June 18 to July 15, with a five-inch minimum mesh size for protection of blueback salmon; early fall season, July 20 to Aug. 25, and late fall season Sept. 14 to Oct. 31, with a closed period from Oct. 15 to Oct. 28.

Figures given on brucellosis

Vaccination of calves for brucellosis showed a slight decline in Deschutes County in 1963 from 1962 and there was a slight increase in percentage of cattle reacting to the brucellosis tests.

Figures released recently by the Oregon Department of Agriculture on the state-federal disease control program showed calf vaccinations in Deschutes County dropped from 1,991 in 1961 to 1,814 in 1963.

Last year, 1,113 cattle were tested for brucellosis and four reactors found, or 0.338 per cent. In 1963 five reactors were found among the 1,551 tested, with the average .322.

Statewide tests for brucellosis in the county showed one reactor among the 3,417 tested. In 1962 the county had one reactor out of the 618 tested for brucellosis.

Statewide the 1963 figure on calf vaccinations for brucellosis was 159,173, the third highest since the program started.

Concert trio to play here on Tuesday

Speaker policy changed by UW

SEATTLE (UPI) — The Board of Regents of the University of Washington approved a new speaker policy Friday which will permit Communists and other controversial speakers to appear on the campus.

The action followed recommendations of the faculty senate and student groups that the existing policy be modified in the interests of free inquiry. A special committee report recommending screening of speakers was rejected.

The statement emphasized the appearance of non-University speakers on the campus implies neither approval nor disapproval of them or their viewpoints by the university.

In addition, the university president is authorized to prescribe conditions for the conduct of the meetings.

The new policy closely resembles the widely copied speaker plan instituted at the University of Oregon, known as the Oregon statement.

DOPE SLIPS THROUGH

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A presidential advisory commission reported Friday that an estimated 3,000 pounds of heroin is smuggled into the United States annually.

It said customs agents manage to intercept "less than 100 pounds a year" on the way in. Last year, the bureau of narcotics seized 165 pounds of illegal heroin inside the country. The rest presumably is consumed by narcotics addicts.

8 musicians injured as bus spills Friday

DAYTON, Wash. (UPI) — The touring Kansas City Philharmonic Orchestra, with 11 musicians unable to complete the circuit because of an accident, will try to salvage what it can from its western tour.

A chartered bus carrying 25 members of the group skidded off a snow-covered highway Friday, causing eight of the musicians to be hospitalized.

Nons of the injured was hurt critically and hospital authorities said most were in good condition.

Orchestra Manager George Morgulis said that dates in Boise and Burley, Idaho, would be filled by a recital by violinist Zvi Zeitlin with the orchestra taking up at Provo, Utah, Monday.

Morgulis said the group was contacting other musicians to fill in for those unable to make the remainder of the trip because of injuries.

Hospital attendants said the injured were Alvin Pells, Ralph Watilo, Mrs. Norma Miller, Robert Scagliatti, Ben Udell, Sarah Funkhouser, June Doren and Barbara Potter. They said Watilo was probably the most seriously injured. His condition was listed as "stable." He was still undergoing examination to determine the extent of his injuries.

The orchestra had been on tour since Jan. 9 when it flew to Palm Springs, Calif. The tour is scheduled to end Feb. 1 at Grand Bend, Kan.

The bus was the last of three carrying the 80 members of the orchestra from Lewiston, Idaho, to Boise. The bus was on U.S. 419 in Washington to avoid going over treacherous Whitebird Hill on U.S. 95 in Idaho.

The bus rolled into a ditch one and one-half miles north of Dayton, about 66 miles southwest of Lewiston.

The accident occurred on a sloping right-hand curve after about two inches of snow had fallen. The bus came to rest on its wheels.
