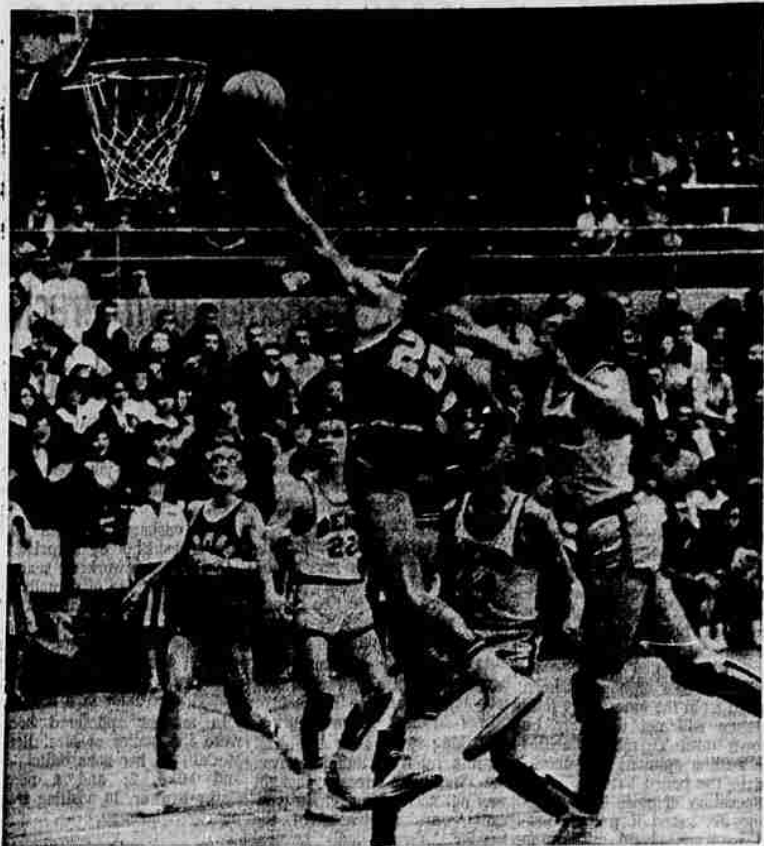

Culver trio hits 46 as 'Dogs nip Dufur, 62-41

DUFUR — The visiting Culver Bulldogs came up with a trio of hot-shooting gunners who totaled 46 points between them to lead the Bulldogs to a 62-41 Deschutes League basketball win over the Dufur Rangers last night.

Don Steinback, Bob Van Orsow and Rick Urbach all scored in double figures to lead the visitors to their second league win against a single loss. Dufur is still looking for their first league win of the season.

Steinback earned high point honors for the evening by dumping in 17 points. He was followed closely by Van Orsow with 16 counters and Urbach with 13. Hood led the losers with 15 points.

Culver led from the opening whistle and built up a 22-12 halftime lead.

Coach Art Ellis' crew outshot the Rangers percentage-wise, hitting 33 per cent of their shots while the home team only managed to get only 21 per cent of theirs in the bucket.

Culver hosts the Bend high school sophomore team in a non-counting battle this afternoon.

Hodge 'living' goalie role for Canadiens

A trade, an injury and persistence have wiped away 10 years of frustration for Charlie Hodge.

Hodge admits he was almost resigned to the role of a substitute goalie for the Montreal Canadiens after spending 10 years in the shadow of Jacques Plante. But Plante was traded to New York last summer for goalie Gump Worsley, who subsequently was injured in November.

The jockey-sized Hodge got the jockey call up from Quebec of the American Hockey League but this time Hodge was determined to be more than a stand-in and now Worsley has the Quebec job.

With Hodge in the Montreal nets the Canadiens began to move and Wednesday night they finally caught the Chicago Black Hawks, who have led the National Hockey League all season and at one point were threatening to make a runaway of the race.

Hodge, 30, blanked Toronto Wednesday night 3-0 for his third shutout of the season to pull Montreal into a tie for first place with Chicago. Gilles Tremblay, Dave Balon and Henri Richard scored the Montreal goals.

Indians add Buffalo b-ball pelt, 57-35

THE DALLES—Madras High School will have to buck up its shooting tonight if it expects to stay on the same court with Hermiston.

The Dalles High School's hustling Indian basketball squad put on the fast break here last night and shot visiting Madras right off the court, 57-35.

Madras managed to hang-on with an effective defense for most of the game but found the lid nailed down tight on the basket. Ralph Minnick, Madras' usual high scorer, had a dismal evening. The 5-9 guard was limited to a lone point.

Larry Barnes, Minnick's running mate at guard, had to take over the Bufo's tally chores, hitting 12. Jay Cane, a junior forward came off the boards with more than his share of rebounds, and burned the twine for 16 tallies and high-point honors for the evening.

Ken Jacroux and Bill Todd each garnered 8 for The Dalles, while Bud Miller tallied 6 for Madras.

Shooting percentages from the field were nothing to write in the record books. The Central Oregonians hit 14 of 54 field goal attempts (a .259 average), and converted 7 of 16 from the foul line for a 30-40.440.

The Dalles, however, only fared a little better. The Indians shot up 21 of 67 for a .313 average from the floor.

"I know I'm healthy, but I'm worried about my brain," he said after taking the mental test Friday. "They didn't have any questions about poetry."

The "Louisville lip" lined up at 7 a.m. with 89 other draftees at the Coral Gables induction center and promised he wouldn't open his mouth except for a yawn to start the day.

The silence didn't last. "You know," he said, "Liston was rejected by the Army because he was too ugly."

After completing his physical examination, Clay observed: "I'm getting the army more publicity than anybody since Elvis."

Then Clay, who will challenge Liston for the heavyweight title at Miami Beach Feb. 25, took the mental examination. When he finished, he said the test was tough.
