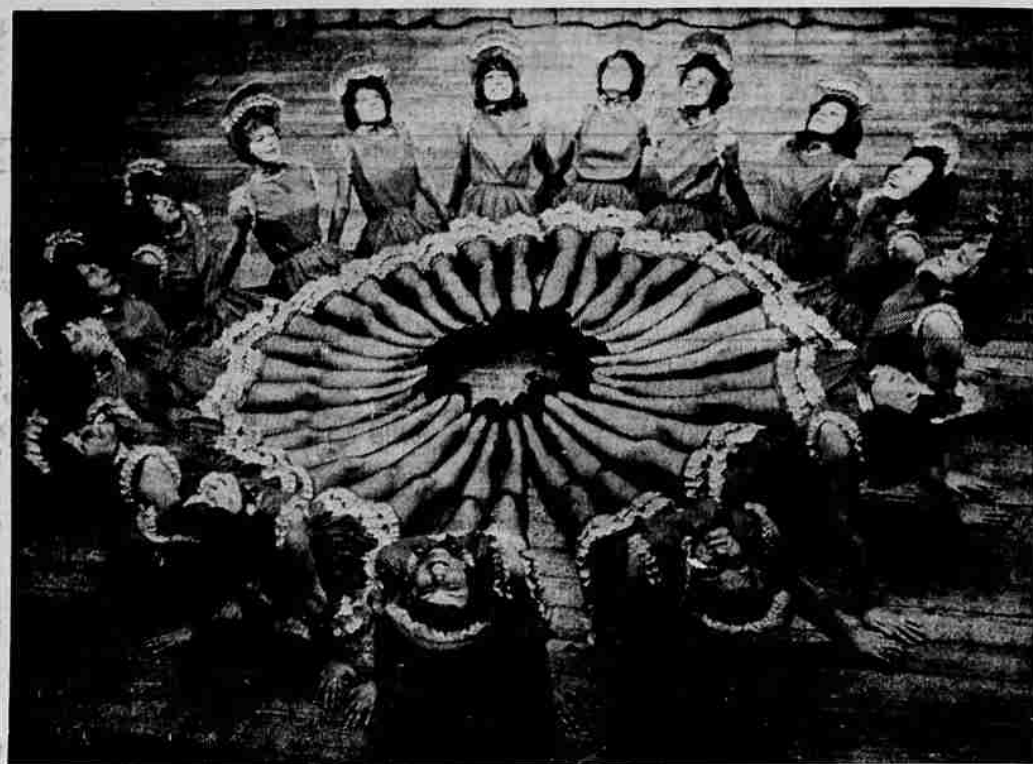

Candidacy set by Elmo Smith

SALEM (UPI)—Former Gov. Elmo Smith filed today as a candidate for Republican national committeeman.

Smith, publisher of the Albany Democrat-Herald, is the first to file for national committeemen from either party, according to elections supervisor Jack Thompson.

The present GOP national committeeman is Lowell Paget, Portland.

Smith served as governor in 1956 and 1957.

He also filed today for delegate at large to the Republican national convention.

Smith said he was seeking the committeeman position in response to requests from Republicans throughout the state who feel his background of public service can increase effectiveness of Oregon Republicans on a national level.

Smith had been scheduled to seek the position in 1960 but abandoned this plan to oppose Sen. Maurine Neuberger, D-Ore., for the U.S. Senate.

"I have good contacts with many communities throughout the state which keep me up to date with the needs and sentiments in all sections," he said. These interests are both business and political, he said.

Smith said he has received assurances of help from persons who had worked on previous campaigns for him.

Smith, a former state Senate president, also has interests in four weekly newspapers in Oregon.

Ivan L. Newton back from Iran

Ivan L. Newton, son of Mrs. Rose Newton of Bend, returned this past weekend to his home in Corvallis, on leave from Iran. He has served there the past two years with the Agency for International Development. Before he returns to Iran for another two-year assignment, he will take a two-week refresher course at the University of Florida.

Formerly a county agent for the Oregon State College Extension Service, Newton has also served as an agriculture adviser for the foreign aid program in Afghanistan and Korea. With AID, he was assigned to the Gilan Ostan province, which lies to the north and west of Tehran along the Caspian Sea.

Newton is involved in a program designed to double the production of tea, citrus, oil crops, vegetables and sugar in Iran in the next five years. All of these but sugar, Ostan produces in vast quantities.

Newton served in two wars, two years with the Army in World War II, and a year with the Navy during the Korean conflict. He was graduated from Oregon State University in 1948, and received his master's degree there in 1955.

PORTLAND (UPI)—A statewide Colleges for Oregon's Future organization has been reactivated with former governor Charles Sprague as chairman.

Sprague said the volunteer committee was organized to provide "a more comprehensive public understanding of the higher educational requirements of Oregon youth."

He said the committee "will assume a genuine grassroots function . . . in the long-range planning for higher education."

Classes planned on refinishing of furniture

Although pre-registration is not required, persons planning to attend are urged to call the Extension Office in Bend or Redmond for additional information, and to indicate which two meetings will be attended.

50 political hopefuls file

SALEM (UPI)—Fifty political hopefuls had formally filed their candidacies for the May 15 election through Thursday afternoon, Secretary of State Howell Appling said today.

The candidates included 23 Republicans, 15 Democrats and 12 for non-partisan judicial office.

Eleven Republicans and two Democrats had filed as delegates to the national conventions.

Legislators evenly divided on sales tax

PORTLAND (UPI)—Oregon's legislators are about evenly split on the question of a sales tax and most of them believe the public did not fully understand the 1963 tax measure which was voted down, the Oregon Journal said today.

The newspaper said about 60 per cent of the legislators responded to questionnaires containing more than 25 questions.

In its first report on the poll today, the Journal said most of the lawmakers felt they had received unjustified criticism from constituents, but many said this was a hazard of political life.

Those who were in the legislature prior to the 1963 session when salaries were raised said it cost them money to serve. The lawmakers feel lobbyists are helpful but believed by about a 2 to 1 margin that they should register.

Only three replied they were not candidates for re-election and most were satisfied with their colleagues.

The lawmakers were 90 per cent against a one-house legislature.

The Journal said the legislators were asked not to sign their names to the poll in the interest of complete frankness.

Fishing craft look for bodies

GOLD BEACH (UPI) — A Coast Guard motor lifeboat and private fishing boats were searching today for the bodies of two men who disappeared when their crab boat capsized Sunday afternoon near the Rogue River bar.

Missing were John Walker, 54, Bandon, and Ray Jones, 40, Gold Beach. They were aboard the Northwind, which sank within seconds after it capsized while attempting to cross the bar, the Coast Guard said.

Ships and aircraft from San Francisco and Port Angeles, Wash., found no trace of the men Sunday night. The 44-foot lifeboat from Brookings resumed the search today, but Coast Guard said visibility was poor and seas were building. Beach parties also were taking part in the search.

The Northwind was owned by Ray Nowling of Port Orford.

Winds up to 45 hamper search

SEATTLE (UPI)—A weather front carrying wind gusts up to 45 miles per hour was hampering a search today for two missing pilots from the Seattle area. Torvald Melvin (Milt) Andersen, 39, Seattle, a mechanic for Pacific Airborne Corp., has been missing since shortly after taking off from Port Angeles Sunday afternoon.

Dr. Clyde Secoy, 35, Seattle, has been missing since last Thursday evening when he took off from Shelton in his light plane for a flight to Seattle.

A well-known Oregon psychologist will be speaker at a meeting of the Central Oregon Mental Health Association, Thursday evening, January 30, in Redmond.

Dr. Walter Klopfer, director of the psychological clinic at Portland University, will discuss needs and recent developments in the fields of mental health. The meeting will be at 8 p.m. at St. Alban's Church, on the corner of 14th Street and the Sisters Highway in Redmond.

Everyone interested in the field of mental health is invited to attend, according to Dr. J. E. Hyatt of Bend, president of the area association.

"Increasingly important in our society," Dr. Hyatt said, "is the need to maintain and to improve mental health, and to provide for the care and rehabilitation of the mentally ill. The needs increase as population increases, but services do not always follow."
