Royal pair set Canadian visit

LONDON (UPI)—Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip will make a seven-day visit to Canada in October, Buckingham Palace announced today.

The announcement said they accepted Canadian Prime Minister Lester Pearson's invitation "to attend the special centennial celebrations commemorating the visits of the fathers of confederation to Charlotte-town and Quebec City in 1864."

There are no plans for them to visit any other parts of Canada or cross the border into the United States.

Johnson offers housing, urban renewal plans

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson asked Congress today to approve a far-ranging housing and urban renewal program aimed partly at providing better homes for America's poorest citizens.

The Chief Executive advocated expansion of public housing and a series of new measures to cushion the financial blow to families who are forced to move because of slum clearance projects.

He also reaffirmed his intention to enforce an executive order issued by the late President John F. Kennedy which bans racial discrimination in housing built with federal assistance.

"Whether we achieve our goal of a decent home in a decent neighborhood for every American family rests, in large measure, on the actions we take now," Johnson said in a special message to the House and Senate.

Didn't Estimate Cost
He did not estimate the overall cost of the omnibus legislation.

Warning that rising population and increasing congestion in cities would create greater problems in the years ahead, Johnson asked Congress to elevate the federal housing agencies to cabinet rank by creating a "department of housing and community development."

He also launched a major new program by requesting federal aid to help develop self-sufficient "new towns" containing thousands of homes in areas outside of crowded cities or suburbs.

In other highlights of his message, Johnson recommended:

—Authorization of \$1.4 billion to continue urban renewal grants for an additional two years and increase the ratio of funds for non-residential projects from 30 to 35 per cent.

—Provision of 240,000 public housing units over the next four years, including 60,000 through purchase and 40,000 of rental of existing homes.

Boost Home Mortgage
—Boosting the maximum home mortgage the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) will insure from \$25,000 to \$30,000 on a single-family home.

—New programs for federal aid in planning subdivisions to meet the needs of growing cities and another loan-grant program to assist farm workers obtain housing.

—A new federal-state program, financed by matching grants, to train state and local officials in housing and urban development techniques.

Johnson said the start of work on 1.6 million new homes and apartments last year cannot hide the fact that too many minority, low income, elderly, rural and military families have not shared in the improved housing available.

The nation must act now to meet their needs because by 1970 it will need two million new homes a year just to keep pace with the population growth, he added.

14 planes search for missing C124

HONOLULU (UPI) — A fleet of 14 planes fanned out over the Pacific between Hawaii and Wake Island today in a second search for a possible survivor of an Air Force plane crash nearly four weeks ago.

The C124 Globemaster, with nine men aboard, disappeared New Year's Day and touched off the largest air-sea search in the history of the Pacific. However, the effort was called off after nine days.

The search was renewed last Wednesday when crewmen aboard another C124 spotted an orange raft with what appeared to be a man aboard about 1,200 miles west of Honolulu.

However, four days of continual daylight flights have produced no sign of the reported raft. Fourteen planes which went out Sunday covered a 104 by 150-mile area.

An Air Force spokesman said he believed that if today's effort also proved fruitless, the search probably would be called off.

Crab boat runs aground

COPALIS, Wash. (UPI) — The crab boat Skookum ran aground off Copalis Sunday night but both men aboard were rescued.

The Skookum's crew, Walter W. Godfrey, 51, believed to be from Alaska, and Louis L. Sfonduris, 28, Seattle, managed to get a line ashore and it was tied to a car wrecker.

Godfrey and Sfonduris then jumped into the surf and tried to make their way to shore by holding onto the line between the wrecker and the crab boat. Godfrey was torn loose from the line but was rescued by Deputy Sheriff Dave Ravletich and Bob Dixon.
