

Higher Education Board votes to raise tuition next year by \$32 a term

PORTLAND (UPI) — It will cost still more money to go to college in Oregon next fall.

The State Board of Higher Education, with two members voting "no," decided Monday to raise tuition at the nine institutions in its system by \$32 a term, or \$96 a year.

The increase, which affects both resident and nonresident students, would go into effect next fall term. However, the board said the increase could be reduced if unexpected sources of revenue were realized or expenses were cut, or both.

Schools in the state system are University of Oregon, Oregon State, Portland State, Oregon College of Education, Southern Oregon College, Eastern Oregon College, Oregon Technical Institute and the Medical and Dental Schools in Portland.

The hike would raise resident tuition at Oregon, Oregon State and Portland State from \$330 to \$426 per year and nonresident tuition at these schools from \$900 to \$996 per year. At the colleges of education resident tuition will raise from \$294 to \$390 a year for residents and from \$534 to \$630 for nonresidents.

Oregon Technical Institute fees would go up from \$330 to \$426 a year for resident students and from \$690 to \$786 for nonresidents.

Dr. Roy Lieuallen, chancellor, told board members the increase was needed to raise \$2.5 million for the budget. He said an alternative plan such as reducing faculty salaries or not providing raises would cause permanent damage to higher education.

The board's two most recently appointed members, George Layman of Newberg and John Snider of Medford, voted against the increase.

Snider said he voted against the increase because of "luxuries" now in the state system. He cited "business office practices and maintaining alumni records which take several million over a budget period. I think the system acts as a Robin Hood in reverse—taking

from the little schools to give to the big."

John Merrifield, Portland, voted for the increase but added, "These tuition increases are like taxes—they have ways of becoming permanent."

Lieuallen said "Making faculty cuts would tend to reduce the quality of higher education in Oregon and if this happens the superior people in our institutions will start leaving."

PORTLAND (UPI) — The State Board of Higher Education Monday approved long-range expansion plans for Oregon State University at Corvallis and Southern Oregon College at Ashland.

The plan would permit Oregon State to expand from 10,500 students to 18,000 over a 10 to 20-year period.

It provides for land acquisition, continued predominance of physical science programs and more upper division and graduate students.

The plan for Southern Oregon envisions growth from the present 2,000 students to 4,000 by 1971. An eventual enrollment of 10,000 is seen.

In other action the board accepted preliminary plans for a seven-story outpatient clinic building at the Medical School here. It would cost \$2.4 million.

The board also:

Approved study of a proposal to build a \$220,000 cafeteria at the Medical School; appointed architects for planning two cooperative student housing units at Oregon State, which could be built for \$864,000; approved purchase of two pieces of property to be part of a multi-level parking structure at Portland State; passed preliminary plans for second and third additions to the proposed science building complex at Oregon estimated to cost \$4.7 million; approved final plans for a classroom, laboratory and office building at Oregon College for \$734,000 and approved a \$30,000 purchase of property for future development of Portland State.

Echo II puts on brilliant show here

Echo II, mankind's largest satellite which went into orbit from Vandenberg Air Force base in California on January 25, presented a brilliant show in Central Oregon skies last night.

It made its final visible appearance for the night at daylight this morning when it appeared in a reverse course from that viewed from residents of the area early last night.

About 7:30 a.m. today, the moonlet, some 13 stories high and 135 feet in diameter, came out of the north, passed just to the west of the Great Dipper and its extended "handle" stars, Arcturus and Spica, and disappeared in the mist to the south.

Echo II, as viewed this morning, was slightly more brilliant than the giant, distant sun, Arcturus, a first magnitude star.

Although in competition with a moon just short of its full phase, Echo II was distinctly visible last night as it made several passes over the area. At 7:10 p.m., it vied for attention with two lustrous planets, Jupiter and Venus, in the western sky.

Traveling over a nearly polar orbit and making a number of passes each night, Echo II circles the earth each hour and 49 minutes, crossing fringes of the Arctic and Antarctic wastes.

Echo II can easily be located because of its ever changing position among the stars. Its brilliance tonight will be dimmed by a full moon.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced today that some difficulty was being experienced with the moonlet. It appears to be circling the earth a little lower than planned, and is not keeping its shape.

Way is cleared on explorations for iron ore

SALEM (UPI)—The way was open for Bunker Hill Mining Company to begin iron ore exploration work on the Clatsop Spit area near the mouth of the Columbia River today after the State Land Board for a fully leased 960 acres of ore-bearing sand to the Idaho firm.

Gov. Mark Hatfield, Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr., and State Treasurer Howard penned their signatures to the lease at a brief ceremony.

No company representatives were present.

Clatsop County officials signed a similar lease with the company last week.

Federal Lease Seen

A lease for federally owned lands in the area is expected to be completed shortly.

Hatfield termed Bunker Hill's plan to extract iron ore from the black sands "important for the economy of Oregon, and the Astoria area."

He said exploration operations by the Kellogg, Idaho, firm open "very important possibilities of creating a supporting industry."

The company has announced that if its exploration work reveals there are sufficient mineral deposits in the area, a \$12 million processing plant which would employ 100 workers will be built near Astoria.

The lease calls for rent of 25 cents an acre for the first five years, and \$1 an acre thereafter, with ore royalties ranging up from 20 cents a ton.

Hatfield said the project "represents further potential for diversification of Oregon's economy."

She's finally running out of her '62 onions

Mrs. Peter Klobas, who lives east of Pilot Butte off the Bend-Burns Highway, is just now running out of onions that she raised in her garden in 1962. There are still about half a dozen, in good condition.

Mrs. Klobas raised the onions from sets, and had fresh onions until early fall in 1962. At harvest time, she cured the onions outdoors, then hung them in the basement.

Onions will be on her shopping list for her next grocery-buying tour, for the first time in 18 months.
