Couple fails in damage action against county

An Idaho couple failed to collect damages from Deschutes county, in a trial this past weekend in Federal District Court in Portland. A jury found for the defendants, in Judge Gus J. Solomon's court.

Joseph and Estelle Wright, Nampa, sought damages totaling \$115,000, for themselves and their son, Lamar. The litigation resulted from an accident Jan. 29, 1962, just east of Pilot Butte.

The east-bound Wright vehicle, after passing one owned by Ralph Cooper, Bend, went out of control and after veering back from a soft shoulder, collided with an approaching west-bound County Road Department lowboy.

The Wrights filed a separate suit against Cooper, but that was settled out of court. The original complaint named as defendants Don Sholes, driver of the lowboy, and members of the county court. The judge ruled that the court members need not appear. Sholes, Cooper and Charles Plummer, county roadmaster, were called to testify.

Deschutes county was represented by Gordon Moore of a Portland law firm. The plaintiffs engaged lawyers from two firms, one in Milwaukee and one in Seattle, Wash.

Drip-drip-drip warning given to New Yorkers

NEW YORK (UPI) — New Yorkers were warned today that the drip-drip-drip in the kitchen sink or bath tub adds up to 100-million gallons of water a day. Home owners also were warned to make repairs within three days or face fines up to \$50. Faced with an "emergency" water shortage after last fall's severe drought, city commissioner of water supply, gas and electricity, Armand D'Angelo put 250 inspectors to work tracing leaky faucets. New Yorkers use a billion gallons of water daily.

School budget explanation due

Members of a state legislative committee will convene with county, city and school district officials in the three counties Wednesday, 1:30 p.m. to explain details of Oregon's new budget law. Purpose of the session is to show the regional bodies how to proceed with their budgets, under the new law. Meeting site is the Deschutes County Courthouse. Representing the City of Bend will be Manager Hal Puddy, Recorder Julia Johnson, and possibly Mayor Paul Reynolds and Street Superintendent Percy Drost. County Judge D. L. Penhollow has organized the session.

Sale of bonds set by agency

The Department of Veterans' Affairs will issue \$30 million in veterans' self-liquidating loan bonds February 11 to meet the agency's cash requirements for the current calendar year, H. C. Saalfeld, director, said today. While veterans will repay about \$42 million this year in principal and interest on their farm and home loans, Saalfeld said they are expected to borrow \$46 million for property acquisition, and the other outgo will include \$22 million to pay principal and interest on loan bonds outstanding. The last department bond sale was in January a year ago, for \$25 million.

Next month's bond issue will make a total of \$320 million in bonds sold by the department since 1945. Of this amount, \$26 million have been retired, so \$276 million will be outstanding after the sale. The cost per \$1 million on the \$246 million in bonds currently outstanding is 3.045 per cent effective interest rate. Veterans pay 4 per cent for the use of this money for home and farm purchase. The favorable difference enables the veterans' department to pay its administrative costs, the expenses of its veterans' claim service division, the interest cost on the bonds, and still accumulate a reserve fund.

Public hearings on zone change proposals due

Bend city planners last night set Monday, February 24 as the date for public hearings on the following proposed zone changes to C-3 (commercial zones):

1. Three lots beyond the east side of E. Third Street, to tie in with two commercial districts now existing at E. Third and Greenwood and Third and Penn.
2. The Allen School property and all residential property lying west of E. Third Street over to the Pilot Butte Canal, which lies north of Franklin Avenue and south of Irving, as well as the first three lots east of E. Third Street between Hawthorne and Irving.

In other business the planners accepted a proposed subdivision plat submitted by Louis Selken, on the condition that a provision is made for extension of E. Revere Avenue in an easterly direction through the Selken property. The board also required an alteration in the plat to remove an offset in the Revere Avenue right-of-way.

In an overall future plan of the city, Revere is being designated as one of the major arterial routes through the city.

Serving his first session with the commission Monday was Dick Maudlin, who was appointed by the mayor to replace Robert Libby, who recently resigned the post.

Marina Oswald thanks U.S. for its generosity to her

DALLAS (UPI)—Marina Oswald, unsure of her English but calm and determined, Monday night thanked Americans for their generosity and told them they "have very big hearts."

The attractive Russian-born widow of Lee Harvey Oswald, accused of assassinating President Kennedy, told a national television audience she had roots in Texas and wanted to stay here.

She said she did not want to believe her husband was the assassin but "I have to watch facts and facts tell me that Lee shot Kennedy."

Her appearance, an exclusive copyright interview with News Director Eddie Barker of

station KRLD, was broadcast on Walter Cronkite's "News Roundup." (CBS).

"I want to be (an) American citizen after I study English," she told Barker. "Rachel (her 3-month-old daughter) was born here and Lee's funeral was in Texas and I like to stay. I want to live here."

After the interview Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, Lee Oswald's mother, said from her Fort Worth home that Marina was disillusioned because she had been held in seclusion by the Secret Service too long. "Her facts" that led her to believe that Lee killed the President are only conclusions, "the 56-year-old grandmother said.

The elder Mrs. Oswald said the Secret Service "whisked" her daughter-in-law away when the two met by chance Sunday at Oswald's grave in Fort Worth.

"This is not the American way..." Mrs. Oswald said. The 22-year-old widow requested protective custody by the Secret Service shortly after the assassination.

But she said "I am not under arrest. I am free to go shopping or any place else."

She said she visited her husband's grave once or twice a week and felt sorry for him "because he died very young."

Marina Oswald was a pharmacist in Minsk, U.S.S.R. when she met and married Oswald after he defected to Russia. Recently she began to study English.

The mother of two thanked the nation for donations exceeding \$35,000.
