## More of same for soggy Western Oregon

The weather man promised soggy Western Oregon more of the same today—recurring rains with the total amount heavy in the next five days.

Six families had left homes on a sliding, suburban hillside at Yaquina Heights near Newport on the coast.

The slide area extended about 1,200 feet along the side of a hill overlooking Yaquina bay. Some homes were damaged, water mains were broken and fissures were opened in yards and streets.

The area was hard hit by heavy rain last week.

Rivers continued to go down, including the Tualatin which caused a scare early Tuesday when residents near a 12-foot dam near Lake Oswego were asked to evacuate.

Ken Batchelder, president of the corporation which owns the dam, said there was no danger of it breaking. City officials at Lake Oswego said the evacuation warning was a mistake.

Heavy rain hit coastal areas during the night with Astoria reporting .94 of an inch and North Bend .67 in the 24 hours ending at 4 a.m. PST today.

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## APPROVED FOR BALLOT

PORTLAND (UPI) — Special levies totaling more than \$3 million were formally approved for the May ballot by the City Council Tuesday.

The measures include a \$2 million bond issue for rebuilding the Public Auditorium, \$300,000 for a new elephant house at the zoo and a one-shot levy to rebuild a condemned viaduct in northeast Portland.

The bridge project, which has failed twice before, would cost approximately \$750,000.
