NFL still ignoring its FB rival, but TV isn't

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—The National Football League stubbornly held to its ostrich policy today as far as the rival American Football League is concerned, but there were a few prophetic cracks in the armor.

A lucrative television contract which will pay the AFL clubs \$7,200,000 for each of the next five years drew a "no comment" from NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle. But that \$900,000 a year for each AFL club drew an admission from one NFL owner that his rivals now were insured of success.

The thinking is that within those five years the NFL finally will realize that the AFL is here to stay, and a "world series" will result.

The same man who was smart enough to admit that the AFL "now is in the major leagues" still held, however, that the rival conference can attain an equal balance of power only if and when there is a joint draft for the college talent which becomes available each year.

"You can't ever gain parity," he held, "if you get only two of the 28 top draft choices."

May Help AFL

What he would seem to be overlooking is that with the AFL admittedly assured of becoming a success, college players well may decide to throw their lot with a circuit in which they have a chance of becoming immediate stars instead of cracking their skulls against the well-established talent in the NFL.

One thing which the talkative, if unnamed, NFL owner admitted was that the AFL's new contract with NBC, added to the NFL contract with CBS, "was a tremendous tribute to professional football."

Considering that the NFL contract is for \$14,100,000 in each of the next two years, television is paying a total of \$21,300,000

Johnson gets bout decision

LONDON (UPI)—Don Johnson of Los Angeles, fourth-ranked featherweight in the World Boxing Association ratings, didn't win many friends in London but he did win one of the most important fights of his career.

Johnson unleashed a devastating body attack to decision British and European featherweight champion Howard Winstone before a roaring crowd of 10,000 at Olympia Arena Tuesday night.

Most of the roaring was reserved for referee Jack Hart gave the highly unpopular verdict to Johnson. Winstone had been rated third by the WBA before the fight.

Johnson, who weighed 125 1/4 to 125 3/4 for Winstone, used a two-fisted attack to both the head and body in the early rounds, but the Briton exhibited some flashy counter-punching to hold Johnson off.

However, the American began to score heavily from close range throughout the middle stages of the bout. By the seventh round, Johnson had forced his way through Winstone's defense and was raining punches on his opponent's midsection.

Little Davidson's win skein snapped by W.V.

Midnight struck one second too soon for little Davidson, and the Wildcats' star center Fred Hetzel was transformed into a pumpkin.

Davidson, a school with a total population of 1,000, had entertained fairy-tale hopes of going undefeated against the country's basketball powers until a crushing goal-tending violation against Hetzel in the last second of Wednesday night's game ended West Virginia to edge the Wildcats, 75-73.

The Wildcats stood 15-0 until substitute Marty Lentz let fly with a scorching 50-foot shot from midcourt with the score tied at 73-all. Hetzel, the Southern Conference player of the year in 1963 and Davidson's first authentic All-American candidate, leaped at the basket in self defense and inadvertently grabbed the rim and net for the costly penalty.

Hetzel, however, did score 19 points for Davidson, which led at the half, 44-38. Game honors went to Wildcat teammate Dick Snyder with 20. Davidson easily whipped the Mountaineers, now 10-8, in an earlier meeting, 93-82.

It was also a big night for upsets in the East. St. John's, led by the McIntyre brothers, turned back touring Creighton, 64-60, and senior Karl Vogel-sang came off the bench to spark Pennsylvania to a 66-51 victory over favored St. Joseph's.

In other major games, Temple topped Connecticut, 53-45; Loyola of Chicago swamped Western Michigan, 101-64; New York University rolled over Santa Clara, 79-64 and Iowa downed Massachusetts, 80-71.

Elsewhere, LaSalle scored a come-from-behind, 50-46 triumph over Gettysburg; Miami (Fla.) overpowered Tampa, 134-104; Louisville clipped Belarmine, 78-70; Georgia turned back Virginia Tech, 96-87; and Tulsa rolled to a 94-79 victory over Missouri.

Gill, Beavers fly to Seattle

Madras' Jim Ray gains '64 Match Game Championship

Jim Ray, a 183 average bowler from Madras, grabbed the 1964 Match Game Championship of Central Oregon last weekend, when he topped a field of eight finalists in round robin competition at Cascade and Greenwood Bowls.

Ray compiled 110.01 points on the Peterson system, averaging 187 pins per playoff game, to emerge winner. It was the event's 16th annual running.

Eight men compete. Each one rolls 24 games, bowling each final a three game series. Of the eight who competed in the finals, seven were top qualifiers among the 31 best mid-state bowlers.

An eighth man, Jay Scott, was seeded into the finals, as he was the defending champion from 1963.

Newell Second

Jim Newell, with 107.18 points was second. Others were, in order, John Werner, 107.11; Bill Koller, 105.17; Jack Cooper, 103.29; Al Harrington, 98.29; Jay Scott, 97.45, and Louie Mitchell, 96.38.

No more than two points separated the top four men at any time during the entire eight matches. At the end of two, Ray led by a fraction of a point over Werner.

Newell assumed the lead at the halfway point, and at the end of six matches, he was still out front. Things reached a showdown, however, in the seventh go-around. Koller picked up three straight games from non-finisher Al Harrington and moved into second place, only five pins behind Ray.

Ray, however, turned the tables on Koller in the final round, and beat him three straight games.

Ray shot the highest single game when he rolled a 258. Koller fired the second highest with a 255.
