Wigwam-type mill burners spark hassle

PORTLAND (UPI)—The State Sanitary Authority clashed with lumbermen Thursday over plans to clamp down on more than 200 wigwam-type burners at sawmills.

The agency adopted a program prepared by its staff which calls for denial of applications to build the burners after next Jan. 1 unless adequate facilities are provided to prevent air pollution by smoke and particles.

"We are going to eliminate air pollution by these burners even if it means stopping all burning," declared B. A. McPhillips of McMinnville. But Eugene Mayor Edwin Cone, who operates a mill at Goshen, contended the restrictions would saddle the Oregon lumber industry with heavy costs which do not face operators in other states or Canada.

"We need jobs much more than we need an answer to air pollution," Cone said. He said the Sanitary Authority should hold meetings to educate mill operators on how to use the burners.

The program also calls for operators of existing burners to submit plans for controlling pollution by their facilities near urban areas.

The agency decided to encourage lumber industry representatives to work with Oregon State University's forest products laboratory and engineering experiment station to find new ways to dispose of wood wastes.

A letter from property owners along the McKenzie River which complained of river pollution by Weyerhaeuser Co. at Springfield was received. The authority decided to send representatives to a public meeting called by the firm to explain its pollution problems as a result of a plan to triple the size of its Springfield plant.

The operator of Bigger-n-Better Poultry, Inc. of Milwaukie was given 60 days in which to come up with a plan to dispose of wastes which now are polluting Kellogg Creek.

Camp Fire, Blue Bird Girls planning annual candy sale

Final plans for the upcoming candy sale of the Deschutes County Council of Camp Fire were made at meetings of Camp Fire and Blue Bird leaders held yesterday.

The annual sale will be held this year the week of February 8-15.

As in the past, the fresh hand-

dipped candy will be provided by a Portland firm. It will be available in boxes of chocolate creams or chocolate covered mints.

Main activity of the sale will be staged Saturday, February 8, when Blue Bird and Camp Fire girls will cover assigned districts of Bend, Redmond and Tumalo.

Proceeds from the sale will be divided between the individual group and the Deschutes County Council. The Council uses its share to finance summer camp activities. Last year, 5,360 boxes of candy were sold, with the profit totaling over \$2000.

A highlight of this year's candy sale is a poster contest, which is being sponsored by the Horizon group of senior high school girls.

As in the past, girls will receive honor badges to wear on their costumes, for reaching an assigned quota of sales. Yesterday's leaders meetings were held in two sessions, morning and evening, at Brooks Hall.

Discussion of the candy sale plans was led by members of a special planning committee. Serving on this committee are the following leaders: Geraldine Arney, Betty Johnson, Joy Turner, Barbara Harbison, Ruby Ward, Gay Kaiser and Virginia Yates.

Slide showing set by COC Lyceum

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Bailey says GOP in 'dazed' shape

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Democratic National Chairman John M. Bailey said today Republican efforts to pick a presidential candidate have left the GOP in a "dazed condition."

In a speech prepared for delivery to the 1,000 Young Democrats at the 14th biennial convention of the Young Democratic Clubs of America Bailey said:

"At the moment the Republicans seem to be in the dazed condition of a slot machine player who has been up all night."

"They have pulled the Rockefeller lever, the Goldwater lever, the Nixon lever, the Romney lever and so on, but they haven't hit the jackpot once."

Bailey spoke out against all the leading GOP possibilities for the presidential nomination. He said former Vice President Richard M. Nixon "made the national sacrifice" in 1960 when he lost in a bid for the presidency to the late President Kennedy.

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
