COC Foundation board planning meeting Feb. 13

The board of directors of the Central Oregon College Foundation met Thursday in Bend to discuss plans for the general meeting of the Foundation membership to be held February 13.

Business handled by the board included granting a request presented by Mrs. Betty Oakley that the Foundation receive funds to be set aside for the building of a little theatre, which would be a part of the Central Oregon College Cultural Center.

Plans for making up and sending out a brochure which would describe the activities and progress of the Foundation were discussed by the group. The members of the board expressed the belief that such an activity would serve to acquaint the public with the Central Oregon College Foundation.

Dr. Pence, COC president and executive secretary of the Foundation, reported that there are 257 charter members of the Foundation. The board agreed that the membership drive should be continued.

Pence also reported that approximately \$3,000 has been raised during the fund drive which started in January of 1963.

Pat Metke, board president, appointed Dan Heierman and Gordon McKay to serve as a nominating committee to nominate members for the board for next year.

Donald Wayne Farris, 33, formerly of Bend, died January 17 in San Francisco, as the result of a traffic accident. He was struck by an automobile while putting flares around his own disabled car. He had served eight years in the U.S. Navy, and was stationed in California.

Farris was the son of Mrs. Mildred Zumwalt, Chemult, and Bert Farris, former owner of Bend Troy Laundry and now a resident of Shady Cove.

He is also survived by his wife, Annabel, and four children, Mark, 8; Kathleen, 6; Cynthia, 5; and Bryan, 4, all in Cardiff, Calif., and two children by a previous marriage, Donald Eugene, 14, and Linda Darleen, 13, both of Bend. He also leaves two sisters, Dee Downs, Bend, and Barbara Krizo, Tulelake, Calif., and two brothers, Bob of Chemult and Ivan of El Monte, Calif.

Services were held January 22 at the Rose Crans Military Cemetery at Point Loma, San Diego. Local relatives returned earlier this week, after attending the funeral.

Farris attended high school in Bend, and played in the band. He left to enter the Army, where he earned his diploma, and later enlisted in the Navy. He was born July 9, 1930, in Los Angeles.

Dale Cowles

Dale Cowles, 56, formerly of Bend, died Thursday at the Virginia Mason Clinic in Seattle. He had been hospitalized intermittently in the past two years, for treatment of cancer.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 1 p.m. at the Batstone Funeral Home in Shelton, Wash.

Millar quizzes sororities on discrimination

PORTLAND (UPI)—Dr. Bradford P. Millar, president of Portland State College, today asked six national sororities if their local chapters had freedom of choice in membership selection.

Dr. Millar also asked the sororities if the national organizations would join with Portland State in opposing racial discrimination.

The school president said that if the answers to these questions were no, then Portland State would not object if the sororities wished to make themselves independent.

Six sororities were placed under suspension by the school last September for alleged racial discrimination in rushing procedures. They are Delta Delta, Alpha Phi, Alpha Omicron Pi, Delta Zeta, Pi Beta Phi and Alpha Chi Omega.

"When the sororities sought recognition in 1960, they had a clear obligation to follow college regulations," Dr. Millar said. "They are free to leave PSC and carry on their own organizations if PSC's regulations are not acceptable to them."

The sororities contend that national constitutions contain no discriminatory provisions.

Dr. Millar said he had received letters earlier this week from national presidents of the six sororities which did not indicate clearly what course of action they proposed to take.

He said today that "separation of the sororities from the college would be altogether preferable if there can be no agreement on basic policies and intents."

Hope dwindles of salvaging lumber barge

ASTORIA (UPI)—The Coast Guard indicated today there was little hope of salvaging either the lumber barge George Olson or its cargo of lumber.

The 351-foot one-time coastal steamer went aground on Clatsop Spit Thursday. The stern section later was severed by pounding waves near the mouth of the Columbia River and the 3.5 million board feet of cargo was being washed away or smashed into the jetty rocks.

The barge went aground when the line from the tug Miki Miki parted as it was outboard from the Columbia River. Coast Guard vessels from Cape Disappointment, Wash., pulled it off the sand, but had to cut their lines when the barge began taking water through a hole in the stern.

Swells at the mouth of the Columbia then pushed it against the jetty on the Washington side of the river.

Officials of the Oliver J. Olson Co. of Los Angeles, the owner, conferred with tug officers Thursday but no salvage attempts were made.

Gale warnings were flying in the area today.

The Coast Guard said four vessels had gone aground near the mouth of the Columbia in the last four months, including the lumber ship C-Trader which was lost after its crew got off safely.

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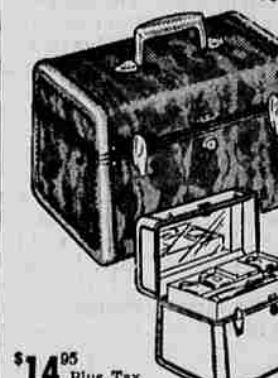
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Wallace eyes California bid

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI)—Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace has moved closer toward entry in California's presidential primary.

Secretary of State Frank M. Jordan confirmed Thursday that spokesman for Wallace telephoned from Alabama this week with a request for information on procedures.

Wallace, a Democrat, indicated earlier this month during a western tour that he might enter the primaries of several states. He would campaign on a segregationist platform.

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
