

Lava Bears sink Prineville 5 in wild 82-58 fracas

PRINEVILLE — Led by senior forward Jack Ward, the Bend High School Lava Bears turned a race-horse tumbling match into a scoring fest here last night and turned over the Prineville Cowboys, 82-58.

Ward shot 27 counters through the hoop to walk away with high point honors. George Woodworth, Bend's slender 6-4 center stood like the Colossus at Rhodes and did his damage with 19 tallies.

Tonight the vanquished Cowboys trek to Redmond for a duel that may go right down to fundamental foul shooting. There certainly was a lot of it here last night.

Bend Host Tonight

Bend, who hosts Madras tonight, got the benefit of the referee's whistle tools for most of the game. . . and Prineville Coach Wayne Lunde was unhappy.

He said, "this officiating is atrocious. . . it's positively the worst I've seen in my three

years here."

From about the first quarter on, the game got somewhat out of control. The officials, however, began tooling to get things back on the right track.

They had troubles, the game moved lightning fast. Prineville's little guard John Huntley came alive with long howlers which put the Cowboy fans into frenzy. When the dust cleared the small, scrappy Poke had 16 points.

He tied with teammate Kim

Christoffersen for high point honors. Christoffersen did a yeoman's task, too, making a constant nuisance of himself close-in and under the hoop.

As well as Christoffersen did, however, he had his hands full trying to stop Bend's Ward and Woodworth. Action under the hoop turned into a veritable elbowing, shoving contest. Woodworth, by and large, out-battled him. Ward went past him.

Last night's spectacular gave the Lava Bear reserves some experience under stern combat

conditions. Richard Horne put through 9 tallies, Jerry Curl 3, Rod Pitcher 2, Bruce May contributed 6.

Both squads used the full court press from time to time. Both teams demonstrated ability to crack it.

Small Men Go

Prineville's Huntley and Ron Revis shattered the press, with rapid maneuvers on the dribble.

Bend's Ward potted a jump shot from the left side early in

the first quarter to put the Bears ahead 4-2. They were never headed or tied from that point on but the Cowboys made it tough right up until intermission. Prineville was down 13 by that time, however, 36-23.

At one point, Prineville had the count narrowed to 13-10 in the first period. Bend then opened up with a blitz on the hoop for seven straight points.

Later, in the third period, Prineville came back and closed the gap to eight, 41-33. Wood-

worth shot through a Prineville gap and scored on a diving shot under the hoop. May then tolled from the side, and Prineville was out of the contest.

OSU Beavers nip Seattle U. by 85-79 tally

SEATTLE (UPI) — The big man with the marvelous touch — Mel Counts — flipped in 31 points to lead tenth-ranked Oregon State to an 85-79 basketball win Friday night over a Seattle University team slowed by nervousness to a step behind its normal run-and-gun pace.

The Beavers picked up their 17th win against three losses and handed the Chieftains their third defeat in 16 games.

After the teams traded leads early in the first half, Oregon State pulled out by 8 points 38-30 at the four minutes mark and coasted to a 45-41 lead at the midpoint.

The importance of the game got the Chieftains in the second half, as they made numerous turnovers and missed forced shots.

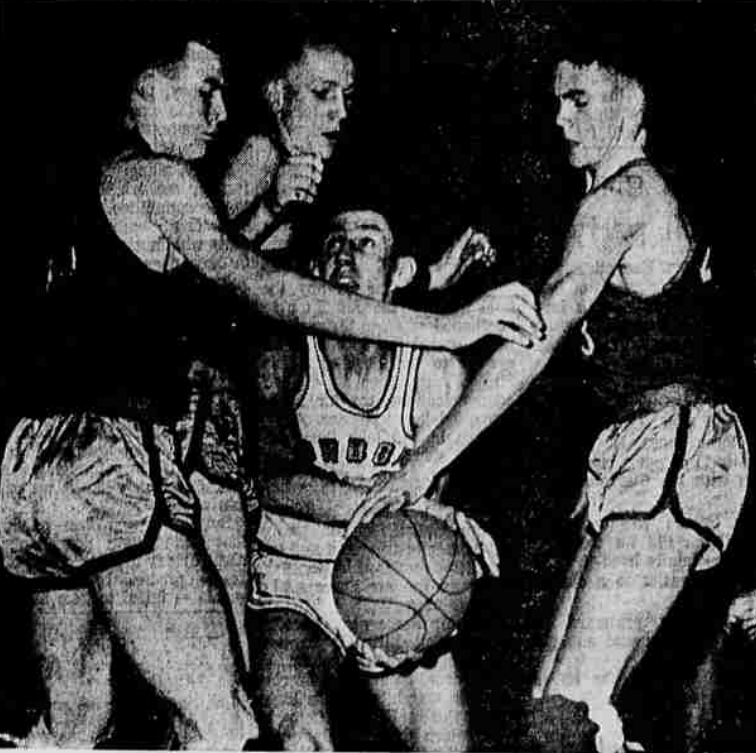

Barnett goes wild as Oregon bops Cal 77-63

EUGENE (UPI)—Sophomore guard Jim Barnett had his hottest night of the season as he led underdog Oregon to a thumping 77-63 basketball victory over Big Six second place holder California Friday night.

Barnett pumped in 10 of 17 field goal attempts and converted six of seven free throw chances for 28 points.

It was Oregon's fifth victory of the season against nine defeats.

California, with a 5-1 Big Six record, now is 9-6 for the season against college competition.

Barnett, from Riverside, Calif., also did a fine job of bringing the ball downcourt against a California pressing defense.

Forward Steve Smith led California with a dozen points.

Oregon's Jim Johnson hit 16 and Steve Jones added 14. Jones guarded Cal's big Camden Wall and held him to eight points while outrebounding him 12-5.

Oregon shot an even .500 from the field with 31 for 62 while California was 23 for 52 for .442.

The two teams meet here again tonight.
