Updated biology effort initiated at conference

Efforts to update biology education at the high school level were initiated Saturday during a Biological Sciences Curriculum Study conference which drew more than a dozen Central Oregon high school instructors, as well as others throughout the state.

The all-day conference, held at the Bend Senior High School, was presided over by Calvin Elshoff, Bend High biology instructor. Head lecturer was Francis W. Smith, Jr., Los Altos, Calif., High School teacher and BSCS consultant.

Basic design of the BSCS program is to place emphasis on the nature of inquiry in biological studies, rather than merely study facts. Locally, Elshoff said, the biology department will give more stress to laboratory work as an incentive for students to form their own inquiries and seek their own solutions.

The conference included films, panel discussions and lab demonstrations. It is one of seven scheduled in various parts of Oregon this year.

The BSCS program was organized in 1959 by the American Institute of Biological Sciences. Its major financial support comes with grants from the National Science Foundation.

China compares LBJ, Soviets to 'Siamese twins'

TOKYO (UPI) — Communist China today compared Soviet leaders and President Johnson to Siamese twins.

The Peking People's Daily, quoted in a Communist New China News Agency dispatch monitored here, was replying to an article published in the Soviet Communist party newspaper Pravda.

The Pravda article had criticized Peking for its attitude to Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's disarmament plea. Pravda also charged that no Chinese Communist newspaper had published messages sent by Johnson and Khrushchev to the 17-nation disarmament conference in Geneva.

The Peking paper said: "Once upon a time there was a story of the Siamese twins. It was said that when one of the pair was hit, the other felt the pain."

Niskanen finds travel interest high, but notes knowledge lack

There is a great interest on the part of California travel agencies in the Pacific Northwest — but there is a woeful lack of knowledge there relative to this scenic corner of America.

William Niskanen, Bend, chairman of the National Trailways board of directors, noted this fact today following his return from California, where, with Norman Kneisel, Portland, Trailways tour director, and Dick Turner, advertising director, he called on travel agencies from California and Arizona and met with Western Airlines officials.

Various tours operated by Trailways were discussed. One of these is the Oregon Grand Circle Tour, which goes down the Oregon Coast to the California redwoods and returns by the Oregon Caves and Crater Lake and Bend to Portland.

Because of the lack of information about the Pacific Northwest, agencies are making plans to establish an Oregon and Washington information bureau, which will have offices in San Francisco, Los Angeles and Chicago, with Western Airlines cooperating with Pacific Trailways.

One of the group's slogans will be: "Start your tours where scenery begins."

County Demos pick delegates

In a busy session Sunday night, Deschutes County Democrats elected delegates to the state organization's pre-primary platform convention, voiced a recommendation to Congressman Al Ullman for filling a rural mail route and named a new secretary.

Delegates to the February 29 convention in Corvallis will be Sheriff Forrest C. Sholes, Ole Grubb, Ila Grant Hopper, Donald Hanks, Ophelia Phelps, all of Bend, and Howard Morgan of Sisters.

Alternates were Kay Bartolat, Robert Schrage, Helen Weeks, Jack Dempsey, Bernice Hanks and John Hopper.

Al Weeks and Kathryn Schrage, chairman and vice chairman of the Deschutes County Democratic Central Committee, are automatic delegates to the convention because of their membership on the state committee. This will give Deschutes county eight votes at the Corvallis meeting.

The central committee voted to recommend Clayton P. Woodall, 461 Broadway, for the vacancy of rural mail carrier out of the Bend office. This action will be forwarded to Congressman Ullman for action.

In other action, the committee accepted the resignation of Orval J. Hansen as secretary of the committee. They elected Rose Glasheen to the post. She previously had served as assistant secretary to the party.

Figures given on expansion

SALEM (UPI) — New industrial plants and plant expansion representing a combined investment of nearly \$4 million were included in the state's industrial expansion report for January, Gov. Mark Hatfield advised Batelle Memorial Institute officials in Columbus, Ohio, today.

Among new industries were the logging equipment plant of Ramey Self Loader Co. near Roseburg, the new particleboard plant of Forrest Industries at White City, and the cabinet manufacturing plant of Modern Woodcrafters, which relocated from Pasco, Wash., to Portland. The month's plant expansions were headed by the \$1.5 million project of Evans Products Co. at Corvallis.

January fairly damp in area

The year 1964 got off to a fairly damp start, with 1.95 inches of moisture measured in a comparatively mild January. Average temperature for the cloudy, stormy month was 32.9 degrees, which compares with a longtime normal of 30.3 degrees.

Bend's normal moisture in January is 1.82 inches.

While frequent rains and occasional snow was falling over the Mid-Oregon plateau, heavy snow was piling up in the Cascades. Bend measured a total of 14 inches of snow in the month, in seven different storms.

January was mild throughout Central Oregon, with 14 degrees recorded as the low for the month which frequently is marked by sub-zero weather. Highest temperature of the 31 days was 59 degrees.

Deputies aid mercy flight

PORTLAND (UPI) — Clackamas and Multnomah county sheriff's deputies got a young airman from Adair Air Force Base near Corvallis on a mercy flight with two minutes to spare Sunday night.

Airman 2C Steven J. Rosenzweig was visiting in Portland for the weekend when the base was notified that his father was critically ill in the east. Air Force officials appealed to commercial radio stations for help in locating him.

Rosenzweig heard the message and returned to the base to pick up his papers and clothes. On his way back to Portland his car broke down.

Clackamas deputies picked him up and gave him a ride to the county line, from where a Multnomah County deputy rushed him to Portland International Airport just in time to catch his flight to New York.

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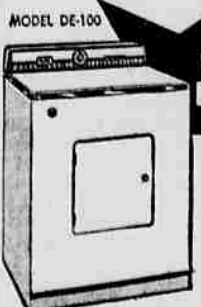
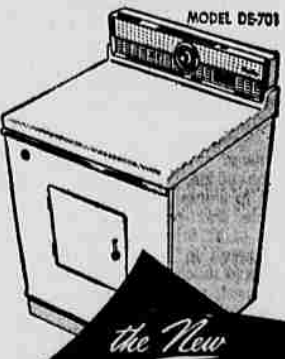
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
