

Beardsley selected by Midstate as conservation farmer of '63

REDMOND—Andrew Beardsley, owner of the A. B. Ranch, Terrebonne, has been named conservation farmer of the Midstate Soil and Water Conservation District for 1963.

He will receive the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company certificate of merit, to be presented at the annual meeting of the Midstate Soil and Water Conservation District at the Pine Forest Grange Hall in Bend this evening. The dinner will start at 7:30 p.m.

Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Beardsley and family came to Deschutes County in 1958 and purchased their A. B. Ranch the same year.

They have an 80 acre ranch with 76 acres of irrigation water. They operate a Midstate Soil and Water Conservation District farm plan on their

ranch.

They were chosen conservation farmer of the year because of their outstanding irrigated pastures, good livestock operation, good use of irrigation water and active interest in community affairs, reports Ted Thorson, SCS technician.

Their ranch has been converted from a hay ranch to irrigated pastures. Many of the fields have been land leveled or land smoothed and reseeded to irrigated pastures.

The Beardsleys were the first registered purebred breeders of Red Angus cattle in Oregon, having started on their A. B. Ranch in 1958. The American Red Angus Purebred Association was founded in 1954 in the United States. The Red Angus cattle were developed from the Black Angus. Beardsley has a herd of 53 cows and bred heifers, plus 14 weaner bull calves. He sells Red Angus for breeding stock and bulls for cross breeding. He exhibited his Red Angus at the Pacific International Livestock Show in Portland in 1961 and 1963. In 1961, he had the grand champion female of the breed; and in 1963, a senior yearling heifer which placed first and a senior bull calf which placed third. He has sold breeding bulls as far away as Florida and Alabama.

Beardsley came from Ohio at the age of 16 and has lived in Oregon most of his life. They lived in Southern California from 1932 to 1936 for Beardsley's health, but have found Central Oregon climate healthful and plan to remain here.

The youngest daughter, Nancy, was graduated from Redmond Union High School in 1963 and now is married. Their oldest daughter, Joanna, was graduated from Oregon State University in Home Economics.

Mrs. Beardsley is a native Oregonian, born in Salem, and a graduate of University of Oregon in art. She also has been a 4-H leader in home economics.

Hostetler named to milk group

REDMOND — George Hostetler, Redmond, is one of five men appointed to a state milk quota advisory committee by the State Department of Agriculture.

According to K. W. Sawyer, milk audit and stabilization division chief, the committee was named to "advise with the department and assist in establishing policy and guide lines on quota allocation problems." Studies also will include exemptions on low months of milk production, a matter coming up when quotas are re-allocated March 1.

Other members of the committee, all milk producers, are: Albert Straus, Gold Hill; John Drelage, North Bend; John Rasmussen, St. Paul; and Ray Lagler, Vancouver, Wash.

County figures on measures, weights given

Weights and measures men of the Oregon Department of Agriculture checked a total of 493 scales, service station pumps and meters in Deschutes County in 1963.

In their checks of these measuring devices inspectors condemned 19 for inaccurate weights or measurements. However, after being repaired they are rechecked and sealed by the state. The state seal is the sign of accuracy of those scales and meters tested.

The inspections in Deschutes County included 85 small scales ranging up to 399 pounds; 60 medium scales in the 400 to 7,500 pound class; 26 stock or vehicle scales of from 7,501 to 60,000 pound capacity; four vehicle or grain hopper scales in the more than 60,000 pound class; 258 service station pumps and 62 meters, including 11 liquid petroleum gas liquid meters.

The department's figures on weights and measures work in 1963 show a total of 37,653 inspections made statewide with 1,569 condemnations. In 1962 checks were made on 35,848 measuring devices and total condemnations numbered 1,404.

Dog licenses selling briskly

Dog licenses are selling briskly in the office of County Clerk Helen Dacey. Dog owners are making their annual trek to the courthouse, to take advantage of the lower rate before March 1.

All this month, the fee is \$2 for males and spayed females, and \$3 for natural females. After March 1, the price goes up \$2 in each category.

Renewal cards have been mailed by Jess H. Smith Jr., county enforcement officer and claims investigator, to persons who bought licenses last year. These may be returned by mail, with the necessary fee.

Smith will be in Redmond, on the remaining four Saturdays of the month, to issue dog licenses. He will be available in the city council room at the Redmond Fire Hall, between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Judge upholds dentist in his suit challenging state regulations restricting advertising use

PORTLAND (UPI) — Circuit Judge P. K. Hammond has ruled against several regulations by the Oregon Board of Dental Examiners to restrict the right of dentists to advertise and to operate branch offices.

Dr. J. C. Campbell of Portland filed a suit challenging the regulations.

Alex Parks, executive secretary of the board, said the decision would be appealed.

The judge made the following rulings in favor of Dr. Campbell:

— The board cannot prohibit use of the word "clinic" even when the dental office involved does not offer all types of dental treatment.

— The board cannot prohibit use of a dentist's name on a branch office even though the dentist may not actually be on duty in the branch.

— Advertising which describes services offered by all dentists or available to them cannot be prohibited.

— Statements such as "scientifically equipped," "modern methods" and similar phrases in advertising cannot be prohibited.

— Advertising describing special equipment of drugs which are available for use by all dentists cannot be prohibited.

— The board cannot prohibit advertising describing credit terms for payment for services.

— The board cannot regulate the size of type used in newspaper advertising nor the size of other advertisements on the page with a dental advertisement.

ONPA Ruled Out

Judge Hammond ruled that the Oregon Newspapers Publishers Association did not have adequate grounds for participation in the suit.

The association entered the suit as plaintiff-intervenor and

argued that some of the regulations on advertising amounted to an infringement on constitutional guarantees.

Judge Hammond also ruled that the board could keep a number of regulations challenged by Dr. Campbell.

The judge upheld the board authority to regulate the following points:

— Requiring advertisement of drugs or methods to name accurately the drug or method and its correct usage.

— Prohibiting usage of misleading advertising, including advertising which might lead the public to think that teeth extraction is common treatment, that any dental service can be completed in a fixed

period of time, that some services might be obtained without charge or that artificial teeth may be equal or superior to natural teeth.

— Prohibiting advertising of "dental plates on free trial" or "no obligation" or similar words or phrases.

— Defining "advertising by large display" to include signs, newspapers, television and other visual media and allowing a size standard for determining the legality of such advertising.

— Limiting signs to a size not more than 2,400 square inches.

— Prohibiting the use of flaring lights or lighting materials in gaudy, ostentatious or conspicuous manner.

Water content above average

REDMOND — Water content of snow on courses surveyed this week by the Soil Conservation Service and water districts far exceeds that of last year and the 15-year (1943-57) average, reports Ted Thorson, SCS, Redmond.

The survey, which ended January 31, was conducted by Darwin Gregg, Madras, and Maurice Benson, Redmond, both SCS technicians, and Wilbur Hunt of the Arnold Irrigation District.

Despite stormy conditions while traveling through Windigo Pass, the group was able to complete the survey in sunny weather. At Dutchman Flat, they found 116 inches of snow with 39 inches of water, compared to 46 snow and 11.6 water last year.

At Tagent, 67 inches of snow with 19 water were measured, compared to 24 with 3.8 last year. Hungry Flat has 21.5 with 6 water. Last year there were 13 inches with 1.6 water.

Snow at Windigo Pass stands at 108 inches with 33 water, compared to last year's 26 with 8.9. Only a trace of snow was found at Crescent Lake last year, but there are 46 inches now with 13.5 water. Willamette Pass has 105.5 snow with 32 water, compared to 25 with 9.1 last year. Mowich was bare last year, but now boasts 19 inches with 5 water.

Waldo Lake has 81.5 snow with 24 water. Last year, surveyors found 12 inches with 3.2 water.
