## Idaho B47 crash takes 4 lives

MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho — (UPI) — A B47 bomber crashed on takeoff in heavy fog at Mountain Home Air Force base today, killing all four crew members.

The base information office said the craft smashed into desert sagebrush about a half mile from the main runway. The wreckage burned.

The Air Force declined to release the names of the victims pending notification of next of kin.

A spokesman said all the men aboard were officers.

They were members of the 99th Bomb Squadron of the Ninth Strategic Aerospace wing at the base.

The B47 ordinarily carries a pilot, co-pilot and navigator. The fourth man apparently was aboard for training purposes.

The bomber was making a training flight at the time of the crash. Fog had reduced visibility to a half-mile.

## Mahoney called for consultation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States, angered by anti-American riots in Ghana, is bringing home U.S. Ambassador William Mahoney Jr. for consultations.

Informal sources disclosed that Mahoney was expected in Washington shortly. His recall followed a State Department charge that the one-party regime of Ghana President Kwame Nkrumah "instigated, inspired or countenanced" the demonstrations.

While the mobs in Accra were shouting "Yankee go home," however, the Ghana government was asking the U.S. Peace Corps to send 80 more volunteers to the country.

Officials said that no decision had been taken to end or reduce U.S. aid to Ghana. Some officials felt that such action would simply play into the hands of those who whipped up the anti-American demonstrations.

The United States has committed a credit of \$147 million to Ghana for the Volta River project, of which only \$9 million has been drawn.

In addition, the United States has granted Ghana about \$8 million for agricultural extension work and education since the country became independent.

The impression in diplomatic circles here was that the vast majority of the people of Ghana are pro-American but that the Nkrumah government had stirred up the demonstrations through the controlled press to divert attention from political and economic mismanagement.

## Vote scheduled

SALEM (UPI) — Hop growers will vote Feb. 10-22 on the creation of an Oregon Hop Commission, the State Agriculture Department said today.

Paul T. Rowell, chief of the agricultural development division of the department, said 50 of Oregon's 61 hop growers registered for the referendum.

A commission will be created if two-thirds of the registered growers voting in the referendum favor its formation and if the hop production total of those voting represents at least one-third of Oregon's hop production.
