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Jantzen faces 'fix' charges

PORTLAND (UPI)—Four leading manufacturers of women's swim suits were indicted Thursday on charges of conspiring to fix prices.

An indictment handed down by a federal grand jury accused the firms of restraining trade in violation of anti-trust laws.

Companies named in the indictment are Jantzen Inc., Portland; Catalina Inc., Los Angeles; Cole of California Inc., Vernon, Calif.; and Rose Marie Reid, a Los Angeles corporation.

The indictment charged that the companies conspired to force retailers to sell the swimsuits at prices set by the manufacturer before shipment. These prices were to stay in effect until "price break" dates which the companies also agreed upon, the indictment said.

The indictment said the "price break" date is set for the end of summer when most consumers lose interest in buying swim wear. After that date, the manufacturers allow the retailers to reduce their prices.

Maximum penalty would be a \$50,000 fine.

Paul DeKoning, president of Jantzen, said he had not seen the indictment. "We feel, however," he said, "that we have done nothing, either morally or legally, wrong."

Jantzen has annual sales in excess of \$57 million and sells about \$10 million worth of women's swim wear annually.

Railroad far from obsolete

PORTLAND (UPI)—A railway executive told a business conference here "that old workhorse, the railroad, is far from obsolete."

The speaker was Ben W. Heineman, chairman of the board of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway. He addressed the University of Oregon School of Business Administration's annual conference.

Heineman said the future of the railroad as well as other modes of transportation was tied up with cost issues. "This is a fact which science fiction writers conveniently overlook, but business management cannot," he said.

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Idaho crash cause sought

MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho (UPI)—The Air Force today sought cause of the crash of a B-47 bomber which carried four Mountain Home officers to their deaths Thursday.

The Air Force aircraft accident investigation board had little but the twisted wreckage and charred bodies to go on to determine the reason why one of the Strategic Air Command's long-winged bombers flopped on to the Snake River plains desert Thursday night after takeoff.

Killed in the crash were pilot Lt. Col. Daniel Wolf, 39, Aransas Pass, Tex.; Capt. Virgil R. Krull, 29, co-pilot, George, Iowa; Lt. Col. Frederick L. Butler, 42, navigator, South Lakemont, Pa.; and Lt. George J. Toffel, 23, extra co-pilot, Tuscaloosa, Ala.

Increase noted

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Unemployment climbed by 719,000 to 4,565,000 in January, the Labor Department reported today.

The government announcement showed that joblessness increased as expected in mid-winter as stores cut back on employment after Christmas and outdoor activities were curtailed.

The number of Americans holding jobs declined by 1,387,000 but nevertheless stood at a record January total of 67,228,000.

A Labor Department spokesman said the job figures showed the "usual sharp seasonal changes from December to January."



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DRAFT CALL SET
WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Defense Department today announced a draft call of 12,000 men for April. All will go into the Army.

The April quota is the same as for February but below the call for March. The January draft was 16,000 men. The Pentagon said the Army will need 18,500 recruits during April to maintain its 860,000-man strength.

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
