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3 transients ruled not guilty in theft trial

A jury of seven women and five men deliberated about an hour, at the end of a day-long circuit court trial Friday, to find three transients not guilty of larceny charges. The defendants were Albert Daniel Downes and Chester Jones, both 40 and from Spokane, and James Christmas Bryant, 27, from North Carolina.

The men were arrested Nov. 29, 1963, on a Redmond justice court warrant. They were accused of taking a quantity of copper wire from the Tite-Knot Pine Mill, and selling it at the K & B Welding shop in the same city. They were held at the Deschutes County Jail.

District Attorney Louis Selken called six witnesses, William F. Schinkel, office manager for Harold Barclay Logging Co., told of reporting the theft of copper wire to Redmond police. Harry K. Behrmer told of paying a man by check for some wire, and said that he was one of the three defendants.

Charles B. Conaway of the State Police, and Dallas Monical, Redmond patrolman, told of the defendants' arrest and of finding copper wire cached near their campsite near the railroad tracks in Redmond. Ronald Knapp of the Bend police force said that the men had been released from the Bend City Jail a few days before being arrested in Redmond. Melvin O'Day testified as to the value of the copper material.

Charles Boardman, the court-appointed attorney for the defendants, based his case on questionable identity.

Chamber urges retention of JP

Special to The Bulletin REDMOND — At a special meeting Friday of the Redmond Chamber of Commerce board of directors, a resolution urging retention of the justice of peace court in Redmond was prepared for presentation to the county court.

Signed by Donald W. Redding, president, and Alice McCormick, secretary, the resolution reads:

"The board of directors of the Redmond Chamber of Commerce after hearing arguments both pro and con concerning the removal of the justice of the peace court of the City of Redmond, and after an investigation by a four man committee from the board, wishes to recommend that the county court retain said justice court in the city of Redmond.

SOLDIERS ON TRIAL NAIROBI, Kenya (UPI)—One hundred of the Kenyan soldiers who mutilated against their officers last month will go before a court-martial, Premier Jomo Kenyatta announced Friday. He said the 11th Battalion of the Kenya Rifles, which participated in the revolt, will be disbanded and a new battalion formed to take its place. An additional 170 members of the 11th battalion will be dismissed from the army, the premier told a news conference.

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
