

Rocky backers pleased with state reception

PORTLAND (UPI)—Supporters today termed New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller's Oregon campaign debut a success and said they were enthusiastic about his chances to win the May 15 Republican presidential primary.

Rockefeller and his wife, Happy, flew to New York early Sunday after a four-city swing through western Oregon.

Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater, Rockefeller's leading announced contender for the GOP nomination is scheduled to launch his Oregon campaign Tuesday at a Lincoln Day dinner here.

State campaign chairman William Walsh said, "Rocky received a tremendously good reception. We feel the trip was a real lift and believe we have won over some Goldwater people. There was no negative reaction. I am tremendously encouraged."

Rockefeller said he found the crowds in Oregon bigger than he had expected. He said Oregonians were "curious" about him and said, "I feel we are gaining their enthusiasm."

He said he would resume campaigning in Oregon after the March 10 New Hampshire primary. Rockefeller indicated he would take a swing through Eastern Oregon.

Grounded by Fog
The New York Governor arrived in Portland Thursday night and addressed a Portland luncheon audience of 1,000 Friday noon. That night he spoke before 1,000 persons at a Lincoln Day dinner in Medford.

Grounded by fog, he took a chartered bus to Roseburg Saturday to address 300 at a luncheon. He then drove to Eugene where he boarded a plane for the flight to Salem where he addressed 1,200 at a Junior Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Throughout the trip Rocky charged Democrats failed to provide leadership to solve foreign and domestic problems and urged election of a Republican president to "guide the nation back to fundamental principles."

A donkey cart with a sign proclaiming "Democrats, too, love Rocky" greeted the campaign special at the Salem airport. Mrs. Rockefeller said, "I'm crazy about donkeys," and started feeding it rosebuds from her bouquet. Rockefeller whispered, "You don't feed roses to donkeys in Oregon," then climbed aboard the cart and drove it about the cargo ramp.

Goldwater is scheduled to arrive in Portland shortly before noon Tuesday, hold a news conference at the Multnomah Hotel and speak to a luncheon meeting of Coast-to-Coast store owners and managers. His banquet address is scheduled in the evening at Memorial Coliseum. He leaves Portland early Wednesday.

Engineers favor dam

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Construction of \$6.7 million Willow Creek dam near Heppner, Ore., is favored by the Army Engineers. It was reported here today.

A joint statement from Rep. Al Ulman, Sens. Wayne Morse and Maurice B. Neuberger, all D-Ore., said a favorable report on the project would be released this week by the Corps of Engineers.

The report by the corps' division office in Portland will be reviewed here by the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors.

"There is still a long way to go before ultimate construction of this important project," the statement said, "but this recommendation of the district and division engineers is crucial."

Star Raiser, a Brittany Spaniel owned by Norman R. Clow of Sisters, picked up four points toward her championship.

The Portland show attracted 716 dogs.

Lincoln Democrats propose legal gambling, lotteries

NEWPORT, Ore. (UPI)—A resolution calling for legalizing and taxation of gambling devices and lotteries in Oregon was adopted Sunday by the Lincoln County Democratic convention.

Among those supporting the resolution were County Judge Mike Miller and County Commissioner Sid Knox. Only a few of the 21 persons attending the meeting voted against the proposal which was approved by a voice vote.

The resolution calls for repeal of existing state laws which prohibit "lotteries and certain games of chance and gambling devices."

The resolution called for legalized gambling to be made permissive, "and that a gross revenue tax be imposed upon them as well as a fee for state permits, county permits and city licenses."

Meanwhile, State Sen. Edward Fadeley, D-Eugene, commenting on a story by Albany Weekly Publisher J. Francly Howard that results of a poll in his weekly newspapers indicated people favored a state lottery, said in a statement at Eugene: "It doesn't surprise me that the closest supporters of Mr. Howard favor financing the state through gambling. They would have to be people who believe you can get something for nothing."

Howard successfully spearheaded the drive which led to the Oct. 15 tax defeat.

Marine's arrest

NAHA, Okinawa (UPI)—Reinforcements were called out last Saturday night to quell a rock-throwing demonstration by a group of Negro servicemen protesting the arrest of an AWOL Negro Marine, the Army reported today.

An Army spokesman said two Negro military policemen (MP's) fired warning shots into the air when the protesting servicemen "came too close."

The spokesman said it was not racial violence because "all personnel involved were Negroes." The local press reported a white MP broke up the demonstration, in Naha's "Old Koza" bar and cabaret district frequented mostly by Negro servicemen.

Hafield hopeful his trip will pay dividends

PORTLAND (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield said Sunday night he was hopeful his cross-country trip would produce results for Oregon.

The governor flew home after a 10-day trip during which he visited and spoke in several states.

Hatfield said he was particularly impressed with interest shown in Oregon by the Battelle Institute of Columbus, Ohio, a nonprofit research and development organization.

He said he was asked to draw up a list of persons with scientific backgrounds from which it might pick a man to staff an office in Oregon. He said the institute is interested in the Northwest because of its natural resources. It also has expressed interest in the Hanford, Wash., area.

The governor also met with a number of Michigan industry leaders. He said he was hopeful of attracting investments to Oregon.

Hatfield said his absence last week "should not be construed as unfriendly" to Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York, who was campaigning here. Hatfield said prior commitments, including the President's prayer breakfast, took him out of the state at that time.

In Macon, Ga., Saturday night Hatfield said citizens of the United States should work to make state governments "more responsive to the will and needs of the people."

Speaking to about 800 members of the Georgia Junior Chamber of Commerce, Hatfield said human rights cannot be changed by laws, but are concerned with "men's hearts."

Earlier, at a news conference, Hatfield was asked if he was interested in the Republican vice presidential nomination.

He replied: "I am not a candidate in the sense that I am running since you do not run for the post."
