3 kidneys fail to save woman

PORTLAND (UPI)—A woman who received two baboon kidneys and a human kidney died Thursday afternoon at the University of Oregon Medical School hospital.

The 40-year-old mother of two children was being kept alive with an artificial kidney despite the presence of her own diseased organs and the three transplants.

The latest transplant, which doctors had hoped would function normally, was made Tuesday. The donor was a cancer victim at the hospital with the same blood type as the woman's.

The baboon transplant was made Jan. 21.

The operations were the first of their kind attempted in Oregon.

The woman was Mrs. Gayle B. Reicks, Beaverton. Funeral arrangements were pending.

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Shots claim burglar suspect

SPRINGFIELD, Ore. (UPI)—A burglar suspect was killed early today in an exchange of shots with a police officer at a supermarket here.

Police Chief Floyd Clower identified the dead man as Jerry Dean Morris, about 23, Portland. The chief said another suspect, Robert James Shannon, about 21, also Portland, surrendered after the shooting.

Clower said police answered a burglar alarm at the Paramount Market about 1 a.m.

Officers found the doors pried open and surrounded the building. Inside they located two men on a mezzanine storage area in back of the store and ordered them to give up.

When they refused to surrender, Clower said, officers went after them. The chief said officer Jess Adams met face-to-face with Morris and that both men fired almost simultaneously.

The policeman's bullet entered the suspect's head. Officer Adams suffered a powder burn on his hand as the suspect's bullet missed him.

Clower said Morris had a .32 revolver and that the other suspect had a .25 automatic.

The chief said a set of burglary tools was recovered.
