Book on Oregon Desert due for publication on May 1

FORT ROCK — R. A. (Reub) Long, Fort Rock stockman, and E. R. Jackman, Corvallis, now retired from the Extension Service, Oregon State University, co-authors of *The Oregon Desert*, completed arrangements this week for the May 1 release of the book.

Published by Caxton Printers, Ltd., Caldwell, Idaho, the book is the first to tell the story of the pioneering and developing of the desert and the life of the homesteaders.

Ninety-six photographs will depict animal life as well as incidents from the life of a buckaroo and the days of freighting with teams as settlers arrived. Four pages of color photos record the vividness of desert flowers and plants.

Autograph parties are already being planned for several Central Oregon and Willamette Valley cities, as well as Portland. Ten weeks ahead of the date of publication Eriksen's Stationery, Bend, has more than 100 orders for the book, the authors were informed.

"An increased interest in the area is evidenced by the large

sale of Phil F. Brogan's book, "East of the Cascades," Jackman pointed out.

This first book about the Oregon desert is done by men who have experienced it. Long, a lifetime cowboy, lived the pages depicting the cattle drive, the era of the homesteaders, the capturing of wild horses.

North Lake County became home to Reub when he was still a toddler. He can't remember learning to ride but gained appreciation for fine horses from his father at an early age.

Jackman's interest in people has led him up nearly every country road as he served with the Extension Service. He worked with farmers and ranchers unceasingly at overcoming problems of erosion, improving fields and increasing the wealth of Oregon.

His particular skill for selecting and arranging words for the printed page make everything he writes interesting and heart warming. This was his goal as he wrote news articles about new research or an annual report, then acquired a reader audience in nearly every farm paper in America.

Writing became his hobby. "I used to travel a lot by train," Jackman tells. "I always made it a point to carry something with me to write on. If a midnight train didn't come until four a.m. I could always write. On the train I'd get a table from the porter."

When he tells of the desert's little creatures, of the serenity and beauty of sunset and dawn or captions photos of wild flowers that bloom in splendor, the author imparts a warm appreciation for the Oregon desert.

Ex-FBI agent facing charges

PORTLAND (UPI) — A man being held on an attempted bank robbery charge here was identified today as a former Federal Bureau of Investigation Agent.

Robert Hangeston, 35, who gave a Culver City, Calif., address when he was arrested last week, told local FBI officers he worked in Baltimore, Detroit and Kansas City with the FBI and that he was employed from 1951 to 1952 and again from 1954 to 1955.

John H. Williams, special agent in charge of the local FBI office, said fingerprint checks confirmed that the suspect was with the FBI.

Hangeston was arrested last Wednesday after a man handed a note to an official of the Metropolitan branch of the U.S. National Bank here and demanded \$20,000. The suspect was thwarted by two assistant bank managers who held him until police arrived.

HART PROPOSES BILL
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., proposed a bill today to allow Cuban refugees to practice their trained professions in this country.

The measure would allow the Cubans to adjust their immigration status to that of permanent residents.

Film presented on Washington Freedom March

Brotherhood Week was commemorated at First Methodist Church last night with a film presentation of Portlanders who participated in the Freedom March in Washington last summer.

The film, prepared by Joseph Erceg, Portland graphic artist, was shown to a near capacity audience.

In his introduction to the slide showing, Erceg said the march has been described as "the greatest religious pilgrimage our country has ever known."

Richard Celsi, Portland school teacher and president of Catholic Council on Human Relations, gave the introductory explanation. He said groups working in Portland for the alleviation of restrictions faced by Negroes in general are four-fold. First is education; second, housing; employment, third, and job training, fourth. He said food and money are being solicited nationally for relief of freedom workers in the South.

In Oregon the aid may be sent to Highland Congregational Church, 4635 N.E. 8th Street, Portland, which spearheads the local coordinating committee on non-violent action.

City attorney heard by group

Ron Marceau, Bend city attorney, was guest speaker at the regular dinner meeting of the Bend Business and Professional Women's Club Wednesday evening.

He gave a resume of parliamentary law as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order, highlighting many of the points from his own experience. A set of rules for parliamentary procedure were first evolved in England in 1876, he said.

Teachers' group names officers, okays budget

Election of officers and approval of a budget for the coming year were the main items of business at a general meeting of the Bend Education Association February 12 at Kingston School.

Mrs. Laurie Smith, English and German teacher at the Bend Senior High School, was selected to serve as vice-president during 1964-65. By virtue of this office, she will become president the following year. Other officers to serve the coming year will be Miss Faye Shearer, second grade teacher at Yew Lane, secretary, and R. Arlen Hollinshead, fourth grade teacher at Bear Creek, treasurer. Nick Norton, fifth grade teacher at Allen, is currently serving as vice-president and will automatically assume the presidency at the end of this school year.

A budget for 1964-65 was approved. A portion of the budget provides for delegate fees to the National Education Association convention, which this year will be in Seattle. Names of persons interested in serving in this capacity are currently being accepted by the executive board so a selection may be made by the organization members.

Lease offering on offshore land announced by Jackson

WASHINGTON (UPI) — More than a million acres of submerged lands on the outer Continental Shelf off the Washington and Oregon coasts will be offered for oil and gas leasing Oct. 1, Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., said Saturday.

Jackson, chairman of the Senate Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, said the October lease offering will include 863,000 acres off the Oregon coast and 254,000 acres off Washington.

Six major oil companies have expressed interest in five large areas, ranging from 11,970 acres to 85,850 acres off the Washington coast, Jackson said. Another six firms have shown interest in exploration off Washington and may be expected to participate in the October bidding, he added.

Jackson described the areas selected as 57,600 acres located offshore from the mouth of the Hoh River; 11,970 acres off Taholah; 46,080 acres off Pacific Beach; 52,440 acres offshore from the coastline between Copalls and Point Brown, and 85,850 acres offshore from the coastline between Point Chehalis and Cape Shoalwater.

The areas range from three to 20 miles offshore. Each area is subdivided into tracts of 5,760 acres.

The Interior Department will announce a rental fee of \$3 per acre with each firm to bid at least another \$5 per acre for the right to lease and explore. Rental fees are uniform, but oil companies will competitively bid for leases by increasing the bonus to be paid, Jackson explained. Producing wells will pay a one-sixth royalty to the federal government.

The lease sales will be conducted by the Bureau of Land Management in Los Angeles.
