Paper company official seeking to change title on initiative

SALEM (UPI)—The title assigned by Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton for a workmen's compensation initiative measure was appealed to the Oregon Supreme Court late Monday.

Peter Schnell of Oregon City, an official of Publishers' Paper Company, filed the appeal just 2 1/2 hours before the deadline.

Schnell charged Thornton's title was "not a true and impartial statement of the purpose of the measure."

Thornton declined comment other than to say "I'll comment via my brief in court."

The appeal will delay circulation of initiative petitions by organized labor, which is promoting the initiative measure.

The Oregon AFL-CIO announced it would attempt to initiate a one-way workmen's compensation measure to replace the present two-way law.

Industry and management groups want a three-way bill—state insurance, self insurance, and private insurance for workmen's compensation coverage.

Schnell said Thornton's ballot title "does not make clear that the initiative would deprive an employer of the opportunity to select the form of coverage which would give his employees the best and most complete protection available."

He suggested a ballot title include the words, "establishing compulsory state monopoly in workmen's compensation."

Named on the petition in addition to Schnell were E. W. Stowers, a Tillamook logging company owner; Trygve S. Vik, a Eugene contractor; the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation, the Oregon Trucking Association, the Oregon Funeral Directors Association, the Oregon Medical Association, the Multnomah County Medical Society, the Oregon Bakers Association, the Oregon Automobile Dealers Association, Associated Oregon Industries, the Oregon State Pharmaceutical Association, and Georgia-Pacific Corporation.

Schnell charged the proposed initiative "would create a state compensation monopoly, eliminating all the benefits and economies of businesslike competition."

The Supreme Court will now call for briefs from the petitioners, and the attorney general, and then will rule on whether Thornton's title shall stand, or whether new wording should be substituted.

Labor cannot circulate petitions until the court approves a title.

Labor has until July 2 to collect 37,096 valid signatures in order to get the proposal on the November ballot.

Two to instruct at ski school

Two members of the Deschutes National Forest staff next week at Crystal Mountain in the Snoqualmie National Forest in Washington will be instructors at a school designed to provide safer skiing.

Some 25 Forest Service men representing 12 national forests will participate in the training sessions, from February 24 to 28. The school will be for snow rangers — key men in the administration of national forest lands used by skiers and other winter sports recreationists.

The starting of made-to-order avalanches and simulated avalanche rescues will be among the highlights of the five-day training session at which the two men will be among instructors.

Other courses will include ski mountaineering, winter search and rescue, feasibility studies of proposed winter sports areas, and ski lift safety standards and inspections.

Yasui sworn in as member of education board

SALEM (UPI)—Ray Yasui, 48, Hood River orchardist, was sworn in Monday afternoon as a member of the board of higher education.

He succeeds William Walsh of Coos Bay who resigned to head the state campaign of Republican presidential hopeful Nelson Rockefeller.

Yasui's appointment marked a complete turnover of board membership in the past 10 years.

All but one of the nine members currently on the board were either appointed or reappointed by Gov. Mark Hatfield. The exception is Allan Hart, Portland attorney, whose term expires March 2. He was named to the board by Gov. Robert Holmes.

Yasui is the first non-Caucasian ever to serve on the board, and one of two Democrats currently on the board. The other is Hart.

J. W. Forrester Jr., Pendleton publisher, is an independent. He was first appointed by Holmes, then reappointed by Hatfield.

All other board members are Republicans.

Other Hatfield appointees include Mrs. Sam Johnson of Redmond, George Layman of Newberg, John C. F. Merrifield of Portland, John Snider of Medford and Dr. Ralph Purvine of Salem.

Charles Holloway Jr., who was first named to the board by Gov. Paul Patterson, then reappointed by Hatfield, is currently vice chairman. He is expected to succeed Walsh to the chairmanship.

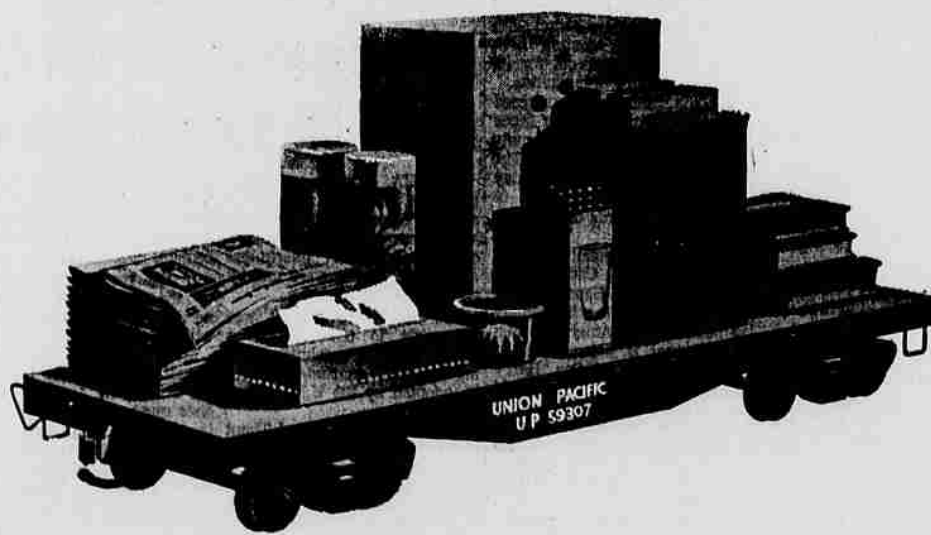

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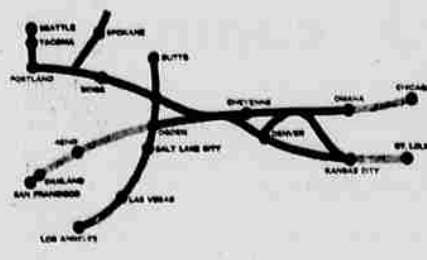
