

Robert Oswald again before Warren group

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Robert Lee Oswald continued today to tell a presidential commission in private what he has refused to say in public: His personal feelings about why his younger brother might have wanted to kill President John F. Kennedy.

Oswald has maintained an absolute silence publicly about the assassination and about his brother Lee Harvey Oswald, the suspected killer who was himself slain two days after the assassination.

Robert Oswald was expected to take only a day or less to give the Warren commission his account of the early life of the brothers and of their later, apparently infrequent, contacts. But his testimony drew into its third day today.

Allen W. Dulles, former CIA chief and a member of the blue ribbon presidential commission investigating the assassination, said again today that he expected the elder Oswald's testimony to be concluded in a few hours.

Dulles said Oswald has given "helpful" but "not startling" information to the commission headed by Chief Justice Earl Warren. Dulles said the 29-year-old Denton, Tex., brick company employee was very cooperative.

Oswald refused here as he had in Texas to talk with newsmen. About the only words he had spoken to reporters were "good night" on Thursday as he left a long commission hearing and "good morning" as he arrived today.

Battered British freighter sinks

NEW YORK (UPI) — The battered British freighter Ambassador sank in the Atlantic Friday night, the Coast Guard reported, while rescue vessels carried 20 survivors toward port.

Fourteen of the Ambassador's seamen were presumed lost when the freighter was abandoned Feb. 18.

The freighter sank about 735 miles southeast of Halifax, N.S., as the Coast Guard cutter Coos Bay steamed to its home port of Portland, Maine, with 11 survivors and the body of the Ambassador's captain. The Norwegian freighter Fruen was proceeding to Rotterdam with 9 other survivors.

Beatles return to London

LONDON (UPI) — The screams and squeals of thousands of British teen-agers greeted the Beatles at London Airport today when they returned in triumph from their "conquest of the American colonies."

Police said at least 4,000 fans turned out to welcome the mop-topped vocal quartet in what was believed to be the biggest, wildest and noisiest reception in London Airport's history.

South Carolina blaze claims family of eleven

CHERAW, S.C. (UPI) — A family of 11 burned to death today when a pre-dawn fire whipped through their three-room frame home, collapsing the roof before any of them could escape.

Sheriff Don Hill said at least nine bodies were found in the ruins, along with what appeared to be the remains of two others. Authorities said they were told all 11 members of the family were inside the dwelling when the blaze erupted.

The victims included Moses James, his wife, Mary Agnes, and their children, Mary Frances, 13, Lola Mae, 12, Moses Jr., 11, Mary Alice, 9, Ollie Belle, 7, John Robert, 5, Mitchell, 4, Earl, 3, and Patsy, 1.

The James home was in the Cash community on U.S. 52 eight miles southeast of Cheraw.

The cause of the fire was not immediately determined.

"A lady from North Carolina driving down the highway saw it first," said Ollie James, 20-year-old first cousin of Moses James. "We live four houses from Moses' house and she woke us up."

"I was the first person to get down there. The whole side of the house was in a blaze and the wind was blowing it. But there was nobody in the house making any fuss or nothing."

"Somebody called the rescue squad from Cheraw. When it got here it had to wait a long time before anybody could get inside."

15 Sisters students to take merit tests

SISTERS — Fifteen students at Sisters High School plan to take the 1964 National Merit Scholarship qualifying test, W. Johnston, school superintendent, has announced. The test will be administered at the school March 10, at 9 a.m. by Gene McDonald, guidance counselor. All students who wish to be considered for merit scholarships to be awarded in 1965 should take the test at that time.

The qualifying test is a 3-hour examination of educational development. This is the first step in the tenth annual competition for four-year merit scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and other sponsors.

The test scores of students who are examined in March will be reported to their schools before May 15. The scores are used by counselors in many high schools to help students make decisions about college attendance and field of study.

False arrest suit dismissed

PORTLAND (UPI) — A \$27,500 false arrest suit against Klamath County Dist. Atty. Dale Crabtree and Sheriff Murray Britton has been dismissed by Federal Judge John F. Kilkenny.

John Weber, an investigator in the district attorney's office, and Alvie Youngblood, a deputy sheriff, also were named in the suit.

The suit was filed in behalf of Osborne Gallagher, 19, by his mother. It charged that the youth was held for 105 days in the Klamath County Jail last year without being charged with a specific crime, without benefit of legal counsel and without due process of law.

Judge Kilkenny ruled that the defendants were acting in the discharge of their duties and there was no collusion to deprive the plaintiff of his rights.

Gun proposal to be discussed

SALEM (UPI) — Proposed restrictions against carrying loaded guns in motor vehicles during the hunting season will be discussed by sportsmen at public meetings scheduled by the Legislative Interim Committee on Wildlife at Medford Friday and at Eugene next Saturday, it was announced today.

Sen. Andrew Naterlin, D-Newport, committee chairman, said discussion also would include the questions of whether the game commission should have its own staff of conservation-enforcement officers to be drawn from present State Police game enforcement ranks and whether the fish and game commissions should be merged.

The taking of antlerless deer and livestock trespass on game commission lands also will be reviewed, Naterlin said. Stated for Thursday in Portland is a conference with Umatilla Indian tribal leaders over their claims of treaty rights for unrestricted hunting and fishing on public lands in the state at all seasons of the year.

Bradley to quit Democratic post

PORTLAND (UPI) — William Bradley, Troutdale, chairman of the Multnomah County Democratic Central Committee, said Friday he is resigning that post to run for elective office. He did not disclose which office he will seek, however.

His resignation is to be effective when a successor is elected, probably at a March 19 meeting of the committee.

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Cascade Locks may secede from Hood River County

CASCADE LOCKS, Ore. (UPI) — Officials of this small Columbia River community 40 miles east of Portland said Friday they would circulate initiative petitions in an attempt to secede from Hood River County and join Multnomah County.

City Manager Herbert Wenzel said petitions have been prepared in Portland and will be presented March 2 to a citizens' committee for approval.

The city manager said the movement stems from two basic factors:

—Cascade Locks interests, largely industrial, are those of Multnomah County, while Hood River County's interests are agricultural.

—The Hood River County Commission says it plans to abolish the town's high school as well as grades 7 and 8 in the elementary system and transfer the students to Hood River schools 22 miles away.

The secession movement began when about 300 citizens attended a Feb. 3 meeting and overwhelmingly approved the idea. A citizens committee was

set up to handle the implementation.

The move would require voters in Hood River County to approve the release of the city and Multnomah County residents would have to vote to accept it. The city is just over the present county line.

The area involved roughly conforms to the city limits. Some 700 residents live in the community.
