

Improved state economic picture may eliminate need for hike in tuition

SALEM (UPI) — Chancellor Roy E. Llewellyn said today "I'm delighted," when advised that the state's improved economic picture may have eliminated the need for \$90 higher education tuition hikes scheduled for September.

A \$12.5 million boost to the state's income estimate for the current biennium was announced Monday, and there were indications additional millions might be added before the biennium ends.

Llewellyn said the Board of Higher Education was already on record to give priority to halting the tuition hike. "If the Emergency Board releases the money, the tuition hike will be canceled," he said.

As the result of income boosts, Gov. Mark Hatfield has recommended \$2,829,709 be added to the basic school appropriation for the 1964-65 school year, and that \$2,081,255 be restored to higher education's budget to eliminate the need for the scheduled \$90 a year tuition increase.

Meeting Due Friday
Hatfield has recommended that the Emergency Board — made up of legislators — restore a total of \$5,559,418 to agency budgets at its meeting Friday.

Finance and Administration Director Freeman Holmer said improved economic conditions caused the State Tax Commission to add \$6.5 million to its estimated income tax collections. He said the federal income tax cut would add another \$6 million to state revenues this biennium.

Transfer of the Boardman project to the Veterans' Department late last year added \$900,000 to the general fund balance. Hatfield said personal income

tax collections for January ran significantly ahead of expectations.

Holmer said collections in January were about \$1.5 million above expectation.

Oct. 15 Election Noted
Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. commented "as time goes on it appears there was less, and less, and less need for the \$60 million tax increase."

Voters Oct. 15 struck down the tax increase measure adopted by the 1963 legislature, resulting in cutbacks.

Holmer indicated if the federal tax cut has the pyramiding effect on the economy that many economists expect, the state revenue estimates may have to be hiked again later in the biennium.

In addition to the basic school and higher education restorations, Hatfield is asking release of \$162,848 for an 80-man dormitory at Oregon Correctional Institution, and \$50,528 to the scholarship commission to trigger release of \$454,753 in federal funds under the national defense education act student loan program.

Hatfield repeated his plea for restoration of \$743,428 to agency budgets. The request, made in January, was at that time postponed by the emergency board.

Hatfield recommended that \$8,145,525 of the increased revenue estimate be held in reserve pending determination of two issues which could be costly to the state's treasury.

A recent attorney general's opinion on welfare department accounting procedures may take from \$500,000 to \$1 million from the biennial budget.

And a recent California Supreme Court ruling outlawing support payments from relatives of persons housed in state mental institutions could cost \$4 million or more if the same ruling is found applicable to Oregon.

Property tax levies in state show increase

SALEM (UPI) — Property tax levies in Oregon for 1963-64 increased 3.4 per cent — about half the average annual increase noted in recent years, the State Tax Commission reported today.

Statewide levies totaled \$240,880,451, compared with \$232,866,968 for 1962-63.

Tax levies were virtually unchanged in Douglas and Wheeler counties, were down in 11 counties, and up in 23 others, the commission said.

The lessened rate of increase for 1963-64 "was probably the result of additional basic school support contributions from the state general fund," the commission noted.

This trend will be reversed for the 1964-65 school year because of the slash in basic school support funds resulting from the Oct. 15 tax referendum.

Greatest tax reductions were noted in Curry County, which was down 19.1 per cent, and Harney County, down 9.3 per cent.

Largest increases occurred in Grant, up 14.4 per cent, Sherman, up 10.7 per cent, and Josephine, up 10.2 per cent.

UAL ready to give up some points

United Air Lines indicated Monday it was willing to give up its service to Medford, Eugene and Salem because of financial losses.

The line will not oppose a request by West Coast Airlines for an investigation to determine if the latter should have exclusive service rights to those cities, R. G. Matheson, special assistant to the chairman of United's board of directors, said in Eugene.

Matheson said United lost \$200,000 last year by serving the three cities, despite the fact that the twin-engine Conquairs being used on the run have been depreciated off the books.

He said United's passenger business has declined 24 per cent since 1959 in those cities and added the firm is running out of airplanes to service feeder lines.

He pointed out that no economical airliner has been developed to improve service on short hauls.

United officials informed employees of their policy in the three cities and then called on civic officials to explain their stand. Matheson also visited at Gov. Mark Hatfield's office, but the governor was out.

Eugene Mayor Edwin E. Cone said he was shocked by the decision. Eugene is building a new terminal which provides space for United's ticket office, baggage facilities and warehouse.

Budget committee feeling pinch from state tax veto

The Bend School District Budget Committee held its first meeting last night on a 1964-65 budget proposal and — not unexpectedly — received some bad news.

If the district is to continue its program at the present level, taxpayers in the district will have to dig deeper.

Failure of Oregon voters last fall to approve an increase in state income taxes for the next biennium will hit hard at local school districts. This was apparent last night.

Superintendent R. E. Jewell offered the committee a preliminary budget — subject to revision — which he estimated would increase the current district levy by approximately 14 mills.

Inland group offers position on water use
BOISE (UPI) — The Inland Empire Waterways Association was on record today in opposition to use of other than surplus water outside the Columbia River Basin.

The resolution opposing attempts to get any but the Northwest's surplus waters was submitted by George Crookham, a director from Caldwell, Idaho.

It provided that since all waters of the Snake River are needed for development of the Snake River basin, "these waters be reserved for uses in the Columbia River Basin."

Action on the resolution came Monday after discussion by regional Reclamation Director Harold Nelson of a Los Angeles proposal to divert 2.5 million acre feet of water annually from the Snake to the Colorado River system.

Nelson said the California officials may be taking another look at the proposal and the situation in the Northwest. However, John Sweat, executive secretary of the Columbia Interstate Compact Commission, said he was not as optimistic as Nelson over the future.

He said California is "very much interested in water from the Northwest."

Applying plans announcement on candidates

SALEM (UPI) — Names of Republican presidential and Democratic vice presidential candidates who will be on the Oregon primary ballot will be announced Friday morning, Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. announced today.

Deadline for filing for the May 15 primary is 5 p.m. March 6.

Appling said Oregon law gives those named until 5 p.m. March 9 to withdraw as candidates.

He said the announcement would be made a week early so that all named would have sufficient time to file affidavits of withdrawal.

Under Oregon law, Appling lists those whom he finds are "generally advocated throughout the United States" as candidates. The only other way to get on the ballot is by petition.

"As a practical matter," Appling said, "the three day withdrawal period does not constitute sufficient time for a named person to be notified and file his affidavit of disavowal, particularly if he may be out of the country at the time."
