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Jury selection near completion in Evans trial

PORTLAND (UPI) — Selection of a jury was expected to be completed today in the first degree murder trial of Robert Joseph Evans, 27, a former garage mechanic from Honolulu. The trial got under way in Circuit Court Tuesday. Evans is charged with the strangulation death of Mrs. Irene Davis, a 41-year-old cattle heiress from Payette, Idaho, whose body was found in her hotel room bathtub last Aug. 6. Evans later was arrested at Fremont, Neb.

County shares in foreign-U.S. youth exchange

OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY — An international "young ambassador" program, in which Deschutes county has shared, will mark a milestone this summer in Oregon when the 50th International Farm Youth Exchange delegate leaves the state for an overseas stay in a foreign country.

At the same time, the number of foreign youths who have lived in Oregon under the exchange program will pass the 100 mark. Deschutes county claims two of the 50 Oregonians chosen to go overseas. Viola Klobas (now Mrs. Jerome Shepard), was a 1957 delegate to Austria, and Shirley Frakes (now Mrs. Edward Schwartz), a 1960 delegate to Sweden. Both are from Bend. Four Deschutes county families have been hosts for foreign youths. They include: Bend — Rex Dick, Oswald Hanson, Robert Welsmann; and from Redmond — Willard Cyrus.

The other chimney fire, causing no damage, was at the 932 E. 12th residence of Mrs. Louise Jennings. Firemen said children with matches caused the brush fire, at the 400 block on Drake Road. No damage occurred.

Loss figures noted at hearing on SP service

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Southern Pacific spent \$192,486 advertising the Shasta Daylight train between Portland and Oakland during the five years from 1959 to 1963, a company official testified Tuesday. R. M. Jochnner, special representative of system passenger traffic, told an Interstate Commerce Commission hearing that the figure included only the cost of advertisements that mentioned the Shasta Daylight.

The commission is holding a hearing into an application by SP to discontinue the Shasta Daylight service except during the summer months. Jochnner testified that the advertising expenditures dropped from about \$64,000 in 1959 and 1960 to about \$6,000 last year. He said that the ads were not changing the pattern of downward trend for passengers on the train.

In the morning session the question was brought up of SP's obligation to carry the mails. William A. Barr, chairman of the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors, raised the issue before ICC Examiner Thaddeus B. Benton. Barr argued that federal land grants for the route carried a moral and legal requirement for mail service.

Nelson's term trimmed to 15 years Tuesday

PORTLAND (UPI) — Kenneth J. Nelson, 51, who told a judge in 1953 to "pile it on," got a 60-year prison term reduced to 15 years Tuesday. Circuit Judge Virgil Langtry gave Nelson the reduced sentence following the latter's successful post-conviction relief appeal which contended the 1953 sentencing by another judge was "not conducted in judicial calm."

Nelson had been convicted of armed robbery. He said he had been sentenced in 1953 to concurrent 15-year terms but that the judge then changed it to consecutive 30-year terms after Nelson said, "Go ahead and pile it on; see if I care."

Nelson is expected to be released soon on parole.

Two local BLM employees share in \$500 award

Arthur Burke and Joe Urbanek, two local employees of the Bureau of Land Management, Prineville, jointly received a \$500 award this week for development of specialized equipment used in laying plastic pipeline in range improvement projects. These accessories consist of a laying foot and hose reel, and are attached to a motor grader blade. The foot excavates a trench approximately 16 inches deep, lays and buries the plastic pipe in a continuing operation. The Prineville District has used the attachments in laying 59.43 miles of pipe lines, extending from large livestock water storage tanks and reservoirs on the federal range in the vicinity of Hampton. Pipe can be laid at the rate of one mile per hour where surface conditions are favorable.

No moisture for February?

Central Oregon faces less than normal moisture in the five-day period that will end the month, and as a result it appears February will go into the books deficient of moisture. No measurable moisture has been recorded in Bend so far this month, but there is a small carryover from the final day of January. Temperatures in the five-day period will remain close to the late February normal, the forecast indicates. Mostly fair weather is forecast for the ensuing 24 hours. A low of 22 was recorded in Bend last night. Mountain roads remain in good winter condition.

Chairman Arthur Hays Sulzberger said the purpose of the proposed split is to make the Times' stock more marketable.

There are now 90,000 shares of Class A and 10,000 shares of Class B outstanding. The directors also voted the regular quarterly dividend of \$1.25 a share on both classes, payable March 26 to shareholders of record March 16.
