Indian fishermen to tempt jail in Washington

TACOMA (UPI)—Indian fishermen will tempt jail Monday by dropping their gillnets back into the Nisqually River, their attorney said Wednesday.

Jack Tanner of Tacoma said his clients urged the organizers of an Indian march on Olympia, scheduled for Tuesday, to join the fishermen at the river.

But Bruce Wilkie, coordinator of the Olympia march, in effect told Tanner to keep out of Indian affairs.

Wilkie, a Makah Indian from Neah Bay and a vice president of the Inter-Tribal Council of Western Washington Indians, said no decision has been made yet as to whether the march would be moved up a day to coincide with the "fish-in."

The march, he said, "is an Indian endeavor. Indian organized. No part of it will be under the influence of the NAACP."

Tanner, a Negro, is Northwest regional president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Tanner said if the Indians planning the march are sincere, "they will join these people who are putting their freedom and their rights on the line."

"The issue will be joined on the Nisqually, not in Olympia," he said.

Tanner said his clients hoped actor Marlon Brando, who has said he will participate in the march, would join the fish-in.

Pierce County Superior Court Judge William LeVaque found six of the fishermen who Tanner represents guilty of contempt of court last week for fishing in violation of an injunction.

He sentenced each of the defendants to 30 days in the county jail. Then he suspended the sentences on the condition the Indians do not violate the injunction again.
