Efforts to upgrade police standards underway in area

Efforts to upgrade minimum police standards in the Central Oregon region were initiated during a Thursday assembly which drew law enforcement authorities from the city, state, county and federal governments.

Les by Ralph Miles, Portland assistant agent in charge of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the session was part of a movement to organize regional councils throughout the state for the

purpose of upgrading police standards on all levels of operation.

Miles is one member of a nine-man advisory board on police standards and training which was formed by an act of the Oregon Legislature in 1961. He was accompanied by Capt. J. Bardell Purcell, board chairman, Portland Police Department; Sheriff Rupert L. Gillmouthe, vice chairman, Hood River County, and Les Bown, board executive secretary.

Miles' talk ranged over a number of objectives which the board wishes to pursue on a statewide basis by coordinating with the eight regional councils covering the state. The local council, as Region 6, takes in portions of Deschutes, Crook, Jefferson and Wheeler Counties.

Chosen during the session as tentative members of the regional board were the following: Sheriff Jim Summerfield, Jefferson County; Prineville Police Chief Mike Thompson, Robert S. Johnson, Central Oregon College administrator; Bend Police Chief Emil Moen, Deschutes County District Attorney Louis Selken, Deschutes County Sheriff Forrest C. Sholes, and Redmond Police Chief Mel Mooney.

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Black Butte Library honors memory of Zoa K. Burdick

CAMP SHERMAN — The Zoa Kathleen Burdick Library was dedicated at Black Butte School Wednesday evening in ceremonies honoring the memory of Zoa, who was killed in an automobile accident last September 7. A memorial to the girl, who had attended Black Butte School and who was just entering her junior year at Sisters High School when she died, was made possible by gifts from some 40 different donors from all over the state of Oregon as well as locally. Zoa's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bronson Burdick and her twin brother, Bronson Jr., were honored guests at the Wednesday service.

The Rev. Rustin R. Kimsey, rector of St. Alban's Episcopal Church of Redmond, gave the memorial service, and Kathy Roberts, daughter of the Maurice Roberts of Camp Sherman, classmate of Zoa, spoke. She called the library a living memorial to the girl whose own interest in books caused local friends to establish the new library.

Upper grade girls, Pamela Foster, Karen Morton and Jackie Odem, sang three songs accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Jim Thomas, and introductions of speakers and singers were made by Mrs. Flossie Odem.

At the close of the service, Jackie Odem, librarian of the memorial library, and her assistant, Pamela Foster, unveiled the newly constructed shelves marked with a nameplate bearing Zoa's name, and friends gathered to inspect the nearly 100 new volumes.

Among the books, which include a wide variety of subjects, is a 15-volume set of Britannica Junior Encyclopedia and the latest world atlas put out by the National Geographic Society. A subscription to the National Geographic magazine for the current year is included, while the books range from classics, poetry and plays to famous dog and horse stories, western history and outstanding suspense and mystery stories. The sturdy case housing the selections was built by Laurence Dyer.

served after the dedication. Hostesses were Mrs. Joe Brown, former teacher at Black Butte, Mrs. Quentin Smith, Mrs. Flossie Odem and Mrs. Leonard Lundgren, who poured at the coffee table.
