Network switch brings suit against KATU

PORTLAND (UPI) — Television station KPTV filed an antitrust suit asking damages of \$12,750,000 Thursday from station KATU, its owners and the American Broadcasting Company (ABC).

The suit in U. S. District court resulted from ABC's switch of its Portland affiliation from KPTV to KATU.

Oregon Television, Inc., owner of KPTV, claimed that pressure and an illegal agreement were used to gain the affiliation. It asked that KATU's contract with ABC be nullified, that the station's license be nullified and that it be prevented from competing for any network affiliation.

The plaintiff asked \$4,250,000 damages and moved that they be trebled under provisions of the Sherman Antitrust Act. The station charged that loss of its network affiliation will prevent it from competing for advertising revenues and will result in additional costs from purchasing programs so that it may function as an independent.

Named as defendants were Fisher Broadcasting Co., Inc., KATU owner; Fisher's Blend Stations, Inc., of Seattle, owner of KOMO-TV in that city; Fisher's Flouring Mills Co., Seattle; and American Broadcasting-Paramount Theaters, Inc., of New York.

William Hubbach, manager of KATU, said the suit was entirely unexpected.

"I am amazed at this reported filing of such a preposterous action," he said. "I certainly don't know what it is all about and emphatically deny any such claims as have been reported to me."

He said he would have no further comment until he had seen the suit.

The complaint alleges the Fisher interests threatened to cut ABC out of the Seattle market unless it switched its network affiliation in Portland. The suit states that when the pressure was applied, the Columbia Broadcasting System was looking for a new affiliate in Seattle and ABC had no choice but to comply or lose its affiliation with KOMO-TV.

Morgan gets bank promotion

Tax defeat makes two mill COC budget goal doubtful

Hope of keeping the cost of Central Oregon College below two mills local tax for operation purposes for many years appear to have been ruined by the October, 1963, tax referral defeat.

Dr. Don Pence, president of COC, notes this in a budget document, being submitted to residents of the big district in compliance with provisions of a new law.

A preliminary explanation of the document was made by Pence at a district budget board meeting Tuesday night. Aside from the board members

and school officials, no one showed up for that meeting. The document proposes a total budget of \$1,727,645, covering operation, equipment, new construction, contracted programs and general contingency.

This compares with a current budget of \$1,123,838. The budget document includes items in the current budget and compares these with those in the proposed budget. It is noted that only \$345,000 of an item of \$550,000 under building construction for the current year will be spent, as the anticipated amount for this biennium was not received due to the October 15 referral. The referral also necessitated changes in several other items.

An increase in college enrollment is anticipated, but this will not offset costs. State participation is expected to show a decrease.

"I had hoped that we could keep the cost of Central Oregon College below two mills local tax for operational purposes for many years — and we could have; but loss of approximately \$80,000 in one year would seem to preclude any such possibility," Pence said in his detailed budget statement.

He said preliminary budget estimates show need to collect \$169,595 from local taxes as against \$102,613 this year.

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Over 1000 work for their checks from welfare

SALEM (UPI) — More than 1,000 people are working for their welfare checks on some type of public project, welfare Administrator Andrew F. Juras said today.

Of these, more than 600 are working on projects involving some type of on-the-job training.

The report to the Public Welfare Commission told of 76 community work and training projects operating in 15 counties.

Juras said unskilled, able-bodied welfare recipients were learning landscaping, carpentry, mechanics, restaurant work, building maintenance, masonry, equipment operation, clerical work, road construction, and hospital work.

The community work and training program is an outgrowth of 1962 amendments to the federal Social Security act, under which recipients of aid to dependent children can be required to work for the money welfare gives their families.

Oregon has been ahead of most other states in putting the federal law into effect, Juras said, because it had set up "work relief" crews several years earlier.

Still in effect in 18 counties, work relief involves mostly road work, brush clearing and other types of manual labor.

2 stop signs go up at corner

It was announced this morning by Bend police that new stop signs have been mounted at the E. 10th Street - Franklin Avenue intersection.

Hereafter the intersection will be a three-way stop, with unhindered passage permitted only to eastbound motorists traveling on Franklin. Formerly only east-west traffic was required to stop.
