## Death claims James T. Brand

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) — Judge James T. Brand, presiding judge at the Nuremberg war crimes trials of 1947 and once an Oregon Supreme Court justice, died here Friday. He was 77.

Brand died in St. Luke's Hospital of bronchial pneumonia and a gastrointestinal ailment. He was vacationing in the Phoenix area with his wife, Irene, when he was stricken.

A native of Oberlin, Ohio, Brand was graduated from Oberlin College and Harvard Law School, class of 1914. He practiced law in Coos Bay, Ore., for 13 years before becoming city attorney in 1927 and later a circuit judge.

He was appointed to the Oregon Supreme Court in 1941 and served there until 1958. He was a partner with his son, Thomas B. Brand, in a Salem, Ore., law practice until his death.

Brand also wrote a column for the Portland Oregonian.

His body will be returned to Salem for burial.
