

Board approves new contracts for teachers

Directors of the Bend School District last night authorized Superintendent R. E. Jewell to offer one- and three-year contracts to a group of teachers currently serving in the district.

The vote to approve the contracts was taken following a discussion of extra duty assignments for those teachers receiving three-year contracts.

It was decided that the extra duty assignments would be subject to review by the board on an annual basis.

The matter of extra duty was raised by Director Bert Hagen. Discussion indicated that he was especially concerned about coaching duties, which he felt should not be "locked" into the provisions of a three-year contract.

During the discussion, several directors expressed concern over criticism which has been brought against Bend Senior High School athletic teams in recent years.

The former Knickerbocker home was destroyed by fire last Friday. Its occupants were Mr. and Mrs. Newton Fuller, and Charles Voshall.

Melvin Knickerbocker bought the ranch in 1909, moved his family there in 1912, cleared the land and started cattle ranching.

Excursion train promotion set by Rotarians

A delegation of Bend Rotarians left for Portland this morning, to outline for residents of the metropolis plans for a ski and excursion train proposed to be operated up the Deschutes gorge to Bend.

Dates are set for the excursion, with some 500 residents of the Portland area expected to take part in the excursion for a weekend of fun in the sun and the snow. Bachelor Butte will be the goal of most of the skiers and sightseers aboard the train.

Heading the delegation that left for Portland this morning, for a tour of the city in several cars, was Fred H. Meyers, general chairman of the Rotarian's excursion train committee.

Visits were to be made to newspaper offices, TV and radio stations and, other places, also the Oregon Trunk office. A newly published pamphlet will be widely distributed in Portland.

Plans for the train call for two nights in Bend. The train would arrive on the evening of Friday, April 10. The schedule would make it possible to spend a full day in the Bend area, for trips to Bachelor by bus, or drives to other spots of interest. The return trip to Portland would be on Sunday, April 12.

On the trip up the Columbia and Deschutes gorges to Bend, guides aboard cars of the tourist train would explain spots of geologic and historic interest.

Much of the trip would be through the area where the Hill and Harriman interests engaged in their costly and epochal railroad race to Bend in 1909-1911.

Canadians set Columbia River treaty debate

OTTAWA (UPI)—The Columbia River development treaty—one of the government's toughest legislative hurdles—was being set up today as the first item of business for the House of Commons this session.

The government decided to start off with a hot one which has been simmering on both sides of the Canada-United States border for three years.

External Affairs Minister Paul Martin will introduce debate on the controversial treaty and its new protocol which was signed in Washington by himself and U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk last month. The treaty, if ratified, will enable development of the multi-million dollar power project.

Considering the background and duration of talks leading up to this final treaty, debate is not expected to be brief.

The Columbia, whose waters wind through the two countries, has been the object of bilateral study for at least 15 years.

Under the treaty agreement the United States will pay Canada a lump sum of \$274 million for additional downstream power generated by the U.S. plus about \$70 million in flood control payments. On the assumption that British Columbia will invest this money in advance of need at a 4.5 per cent return, the sale is expected to bring Canada a grand total of \$501 million.

Gov. Rosellini presented with Indian 'proclamation of protest'

OLYMPIA (UPI) — Indians from throughout the United States today marched to the state Capitol grounds here to present a "proclamation of protest" to Gov. Albert D. Rosellini.

The Indians urged Rosellini to "order an immediate halt to the policy of arresting Indians fishing in their usual and accustomed fishing places both on and off the reservations."

The proclamation also asked the governor to appoint a state Indian advisory committee consisting of both Indians and palefaces.

Rosellini also was asked to "give top priority in the 1965 session of the legislature to repeal of Senate Bill 56."

The bill, passed by the 1963 legislature, extended state legal jurisdiction to reservation lands regardless of whether the Indians wanted to accept it.

The proclamation charged that the measure was unconstitutional.

Screen actor Marion Brando accompanied the Indians when they presented the proclamation to the governor.

Indians from as far away as New York State are here to participate in the demonstration.

Melvin Thom, Shurz, Nev., president of the National Indian Youth Council, said the demonstration here was the first of a series planned by Indians throughout the nation.

"This is the beginning of our efforts to present our story to the public," Thom said. "We have our backs to the wall. If we don't like the way we are being treated, we must fight."

Thom said Indians today were more united than at any time since Custer's last stand at the battle of Little Big Horn.

He said that was about the last major victory for the Indians. But he said he hoped more victories would come up in the future.

The Indians held a rally Monday night at an Olympia hotel, ending with the Makah war song.

Brando and an Episcopal clergyman were arrested and released Monday when they participated in a fish-in demonstration on the Puyallup River north of here.

Increase noted in building here

Building construction in Bend in February reached \$180,500, according to figures released by city hall.

The figure represents an increase of \$65,600 over the \$114,900 recorded in February, 1963. The best single project was \$43,200 expended for a new grandstand and shower rooms at the senior high school.

A breakdown of building expenses shows \$100,400 expended on miscellaneous projects, \$76,000 for new dwellings, and \$4,150 for dwelling alterations.

The actor and the Rev. John J. Yaryan, canon of the Grace Cathedral in San Francisco, were arrested for violation of state fishing laws. But they were released when Pierce County Prosecuting Attorney John G. McCutcheon refused to prosecute.

McCutcheon said Brando engaged in the demonstration "for show only." He said there would be no purpose "in letting him sit in jail."

Brando said at a news conference Monday night that he believed the fish-in had accomplished its purpose.

He predicted Indians "with the aid of white people and white money" would demonstrate throughout the nation to dramatize their grievances. He noted that the Indians' complaints differ from place to place.

Western Washington Indians claim the Treaty of Medicine Creek, signed in 1855 by the U.S. government and several tribes, guarantees them unrestricted fishing rights in their "usual and accustomed grounds."

The State Game Department contends that unless Indians are forced to obey the same conservation laws as other fishermen that soon there will be no fish for anyone.

Brando and Mr. Yaryan fished with a drift net from a canoe. They were accompanied by a Puyallup Indian, Bob Satacum.
