Court reverses ruling, favors spectator case

OLYMPIA, Wash. (UPI) — A baseball is not an athletic appliance, the majority of the State Supreme Court ruled today.

The decision prompted Chief Justice Richard B. Ott to conclude that if the court's definition should gain wide acceptance "we could be watching the world series in pantomime."

In effect, the decision limits the immunity of school districts from damage suits resulting from injuries on school playing fields.

Directly involved by the court's decision was a dispute between the Seattle School District and Hobart R. Barneut.

The high court reversed a lower court decision in favor of the school district.

Barneut attended a baseball game between Queen Anne and West Seattle high schools in May, 1961. He was hit in the mouth with a baseball while sitting in the bleachers and sued the school district for \$3,500.

State law prohibits a lawsuit that relates to "any park, playground or field house, athletic apparatus or appliance." On that basis Barneut's argument was dismissed by the lower court.

The court's majority decision, written by Judge Robert C. Finley, said an athletic appliance is "more or less permanently located equipment." Therefore something as highly mobile as a baseball should not be included.

Judges Matthew Hill, Hugh Rosellini, Frank Hale, Robert Hunter and Orris Hamilton agreed.

But Ott and Judges Charles Donworth and Frank Weaver sided with the Seattle School District's argument that the ball is an athletic appliance because "you just plain cannot play the game without the ball."
