North Pacific planning for new addition

North Pacific Products Co., on the Cascade Lakes Highway at the western city limits of Bend, is making plans for further expansion of its plant through construction of another addition.

This addition, 48 by 120 feet, will be built on the south side of the present building, original unit of which was 40 by 140 feet. Completion of the new unit will provide the firm with 38,360 square feet under roof.

The new addition will make possible an expansion of facilities and more efficient operation. Pumice block construction will be used, fitting into the pattern of the present units.

Jan Ward, Bend, will be the contractor. He also constructed the warehouse, which was erected in 1963.

Before work gets under way on the new addition to North Pacific Products, Ward is to insulate the warehouse. A foam plastic insulation, placed against the pumice walls and sealed with plywood, will be used.

North Pacific Product Co. is now nearing the end of its first decade of operation in Bend. Presently, the firm manufactures toys planes which have a nationwide market.

Charles H. Cleveland is president of North Pacific Products and his brother, Wallace T. Cleveland, is vice - president. Norma J. Cleveland is secretary - treasurer.

New student constitution to be voted on at COC

A revised constitution for the Associated Students of Central Oregon College will be submitted to COC students for approval on March 17 and 18, according to Bill Penhollow, chairman of the Constitution Revision Committee.

The constitution was revised to keep pace with the changing character of the local college, and to tailor it to suit the requirements of a campus institution, now that COC anticipates moving into its new quarters in the foreseeable future, Penhollow explained.

The revision committee, which has been working on the constitution since June of 1963, is comprised of Penhollow, chairman; Steve Kasserman; Bob Whitmeyer; Linda Garvik; Barbara Westfall; Vernon Crawford, president of ASCOC, and

Dr. Orde Pinckney, faculty advisor. Claudia Graves has served as the committee's secretary.

The new constitution which has been designed to place greater responsibility for student affairs on the student government, has provided for an expanded number of officers. This expansion calls for a student court, comprised of three judges; a student senate, which will be made up of eight students elected at large from the student body plus the student body president, vice - president, secretary, and treasurer; and various non voting members, such as the newspaper editor and annual editor.

A unique feature of the new constitution calls for a college crier, and assistant college crier. It will be the function of the crier, who will be appointed by the student body president, to make announcements, important to the student body, in the fashion of the old time Town Crier.
