Bohlen returns to Washington to make report

PARIS (UPI)—U.S. Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen left by air for Washington today to report to President Johnson on the situation created by growing conflicts between French and American policy.

Bohlen said he expects to spend a week in Washington, conferring with Johnson and Secretary of State Dean Rusk on "all problems of interest to France and the United States, particularly the development of the situation in Southeast Asia."

It was Bohlen's second such trip in less than three months. The ambassador's recall for talks apparently was inspired mainly by U.S.-French discord over French President Charles de Gaulle's plan to "neutralize" Southeast Asia.

The proposal was launched by De Gaulle last summer and renewed at his Jan. 31 news conference.

Gov. Scranton says he'll remain in Oregon primary

Gov. William W. Scranton of Pennsylvania said Friday he would remain in the May 15 Oregon presidential primary but reiterated he is not a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination.

In a telegram to Oregon Secretary of State Howell Appling, Jr., from Harrisburg, Pa., Scranton said he "cannot in conscience sign the affidavit" which would strike him off the ballot. However, he asked Appling not to put his name on the election slate, if possible.

In Salem, Appling said Scranton would stay on the ballot. Under Oregon law, Appling must certify for the ballot all persons who have been prominently mentioned by news media as presidential prospects.

Scranton is among seven Republicans and one Democrat officially listed today as candidates in Oregon's primary.

Civil rights fight expected to start Monday
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate leaders, their farm bill fight behind them, expect to begin the long-expected civil rights battle Monday.

The move almost certainly will mean the beginning of the threatened civil rights filibuster, which Senate leaders have forecast could last weeks or months.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., told the Senate after passage of the wheat-cotton bill Friday night that he will move to take up the House-approved civil rights bill Monday. Mansfield made the announcement with the Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., standing at his side.

"I am no fool, I know what will happen," said Mansfield. He noted that his motion to take up the civil rights bill will be debated and fair game for talk by opponents of the bill.

Mansfield said he hopes all senators realize that the ensuing days will not be easy. He expressed the hope that no senator thinks "there is going to be political profit in it for him."

Wallace enters Wisconsin race

MADISON, Wis. (UPI)—Gov. George Wallace of Alabama, apparently less interested in national office than in putting a state's rights stamp on the Democratic party, will vie for Wisconsin presidential primary votes with favorite son Gov. John Reynolds.

Wallace's last minute entry into the state Democratic presidential preference primary dashed the hopes of Wisconsin Democrats for uncontested balloting April 7, which would preserve the campaign chest for November and restore amity to the faction-torn party.

His entry also for the first time in many years placed Wisconsin voters in a position of possibly deciding a political party's philosophy but having little voice in the choice of the candidates who will implement or oppose it.

There is no contest in the Wisconsin Republican presidential primary, in which Rep. John Byrnes will run as a favorite son.

Wallace made it clear civil rights and his plea for "state" rights would be a major part of his campaign in Wisconsin, the only primary the Southern governor has entered.

Bunker Hill blast, sinking still mystery

SEATTLE (UPI)—The shattered remains of the tanker Bunker Hill rested on the bottom of northern Puget Sound today with the cause of her death still a mystery.

The Coast Guard will begin hearings Monday to try to find out why the 10,590-ton ship exploded, broke in two and sank, claiming the lives of five seamen Friday.

The skipper and four of his crewmen went down with the ship when the accident occurred off the coast of Whidbey Island before dawn. Twenty-five others were saved in a dramatic Navy-Coast Guard rescue operation.

No bodies were found during an extensive search of the chill waters where the 504-foot tanker sank after three explosions ripped her in half. The Coast Guard said chances were zero that any of the five aboard would be found alive.

The Bunker Hill was on her way from Tacoma, where she discharged her cargo, to Anacortes, where she was to take on a new load at the Shell Oil Co. refinery.

While there was no indication of the specific cause of the blast, the slightest spark can ignite the highly volatile fumes left in a tanker after its cargo has been discharged.

The men who died with the ship were Capt. M. J. Abraham, Los Angeles; Chief Mate R. H. Blake, Long Beach, Calif.; Chief Steward Harold Schmidt, Spokane; Third Junior Mate Ronald Lockwood, Mountlake Terrace, Wash.; and Robert Smith, Seattle.

The Coast Guard said the Board of Investigation, headed by Rear Adm. R. D. Schmidtman, commander of the 13th Coast Guard District, would form Monday and begin open hearings on the tragedy—one of the worst in Puget Sound history.

FPC asked to reconsider its Snake dam decision

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Interior Department, the Washington State Department of Conservation and a public power group today asked the Federal Power Commission (FPC) to reconsider its decision permitting a private company to build High Mountain Sheep dam.

The petitions were the first step toward a possible court test of last month's 3-2 FPC decision to permit Pacific Northwest Power Co. of Portland, Ore., to build the \$257 million dam on the Snake River.

The Washington Public Power Supply System (WPPSS) of Kennewick, Wash., formed by 16 Washington state public utility districts, said in its petition that the FPC had erred in granting the firm priority to the site between Oregon and Idaho.

WPPSS said the FPC decision "enlarges the property rights of private applicants at the expense of the preference rights of public applicants." It said that as a public agency it should have had first call on the site.

The Interior Department, which wants a federal dam, criticized the FPC decision as contrary to law and not backed up by sufficient evidence or finding.

The federal department said private licensing will not provide the "flexibility" needed to safeguard the future value of the natural resource involved. It also warned of possible damage to fishery resources and said the dam should be a federal project because every dam downstream is federal and the system is interlocked.

Both WPPSS and the Interior Department asked the FPC to stay application of the opinion in the light of the expected legal battle.

The commission has 30 days to rule on the petitions. Failure to act within that time would amount to an automatic denial and would open the way to court appeals.

PORTLAND (UPI)—Pacific Northwest Power Co. Friday named Ebasco Services, Inc., as consulting engineers for the High Mountain Sheep dam on the Snake River.

The New York-based firm will handle engineering and construction management for the private power combine's \$257 million dam and power plant between Oregon and Idaho.

Kinsey M. Robinson, board chairman of Pacific Northwest, said filings made by a group of Washington public power agencies for reconsideration of the Federal Power Commission's decision to grant a license to his company will not hold up engineering work on the project.
