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Sen. Goldwater says it's time 'to rock boat'

CONCORD, N. H. (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater says it's time to "rock the boat" to snap the United States out of its "drifting and dreaming."

The Arizona conservative Friday charged that President Johnson has been maintaining a strict "don't rock the boat" foreign policy.

With the March 10 presidential primary only three days off, Goldwater today campaigned throughout southern New Hampshire. He was to fly to Washington tonight, thus concluding his campaign here.

Goldwater said Friday night if persons do not understand government policies, it is because "they don't make sense. What we're really getting from Washington today is the command: 'don't rock the boat.'"

"I think it is high time to rock that boat a little. Maybe it will stop us from drifting and dreaming while our problems mount at home and little fires become 10 alarm emergencies abroad," he said.

Goldwater said he is tired of "razzle dazzle politics" and that "I am not a lollipop candidate and I could never be a soft soap president."

"I will not sugar-coat the task we face. No office in the land is worth that sort of compromise with your conscience," he said.

NASHUA, N. H. (UPI)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller says the United States should have forced Russia to knock down the Berlin wall in exchange for wheat shipments.

The New York governor said Friday night the wheat deal should have been treated as an opportunity to accomplish such ends as taking down the wall. Russia also should have been told, "You need food. O.K., we'll sell it to you," he said.

This would have diverted money used for subversion and other activities aimed at "overthrowing, undermining and burying us," he added.

With the first-in-the-nation presidential primary only three days away, Rockefeller today pushed his vote-hunting tour through five southern New Hampshire communities.

A giant rally and traditional New England bean supper were scheduled for Manchester tonight.

Accompanied by his pregnant wife, Happy, Rockefeller at a rally in Hudson Friday night hammered away at the Johnson administration for what he labeled a "leadership gap" and the "steady deterioration of the bonds of alliances" in NATO, SEATO and other similar organizations.

Unilateral action by the United States in negotiating with Russia on the nuclear test ban precipitated a "breakdown in the united front," he said.

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Conservative congressmen train guns on urban renewal program

ROCKFORD, Ill. (UPI) — Conservative congressmen Friday attacked the federal urban renewal program as an "uncontrollable monstrosity" and "monster program" that feeds and grows on the tax dollars of the American people.

House members of both major political parties told industrial, business and farm leaders that public housing developments have become a "politician's paradise." They called for destruction of the federal urban renewal program in its present form.

"The bureaucratic urban renewal program has fed upon itself to become an uncontrollable monstrosity which is so dangerous that in its present form it must be destroyed," Rep. Bruce Alger, R-Tex., chairman of the meeting, said.

Hoffa heads for Detroit, ailing wife

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (UPI)—Teamsters Union President James R. Hoffa headed home to Detroit today, but will return next week for sentencing on a federal jury tampering conviction.

Before leaving, an aide of the Teamsters leader said Hoffa planned to go immediately to the hospital bedside of his wife, who is suffering from a heart ailment.

The labor leader could draw a 10 year prison term on the jury tampering conviction. Hoffa, 51, and three others were convicted in U. S. District Court Wednesday of attempting to corrupt jurors during the labor leader's 1962 conspiracy trial at Nashville.

It may be many months before Hoffa learns his fate, however. A lengthy appeals fight is expected. Defense attorneys planned to launch the battle with new trial motions early next week.

If the motions are rejected, Hoffa attorneys are expected to take the case to the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals at Cincinnati. It could go to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Federal Judge Frank Wilson Friday overruled last minute defense efforts to have the verdict thrown out, formally ending courtroom proceedings after seven weeks of trial.

The defense sought the mistrial on grounds of illegal government surveillance. Wilson ruled the arguments "wholly without merit."

DON'T SLAM DOOR HOLBROOK, England (UPI) —This village's firemen are under orders not to slam their station's doors or make loud noises lest the fire house falls down.
