

Johnson wants major voice in V-P selection

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson wants a major voice in selecting his vice-presidential running mate and frowns on anyone campaigning for the post "at this stage of the game." He has discussed this with Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy and denies any feud over the issue.

The President made his views known in a televised interview Sunday night in which he also said he expected Henry Cabot Lodge to remain as U.S. ambassador to South Viet Nam.

Johnson said he knew of no plan for Lodge to leave the post as a result of the ambassador's big write-in victory over announced Republican presidential candidates in the New Hampshire primary.

In that same primary, 25,094 Democrats wrote in Kennedy's name for vice presidential nominee, and there were 29,317 write-ins for Johnson as president. Kennedy has tried publicly to discourage his unofficial backers in New Hampshire and in Wisconsin.

Highlight of interview
The President's denial that he was feuding with Kennedy was a highlight of an hour-long interview conducted by William Lawrence of ABC, Eric Sevareid of CBS and David Brinkley of NBC. The program was taped at the White House Saturday.

On other points Johnson said:
—He has not seen or spoken to Robert G. (Bobby) Baker since the former Senate Democratic secretary resigned and Senate investigators began looking into his business activities. Johnson denied that Baker was his or anyone else's protégé.

—He believes that if South Viet Nam is lost "the whole of Southeast Asia would be involved and that would involve hundreds of millions of people."

For that reason, "we must stay there and help them, and that is what we are going to do."
—The administration will ask Congress for about \$3.4 billion in foreign aid next year. "We will ask only what we need, and we hope we get what we ask, but it will be appreciably under what was asked last year and approximately the same that we got this year."

—He wishes French President Charles de Gaulle were "more in agreement" with this country on matters such as recognition of Red China. But he does not expect the French action to lead to United Nations membership for the Chinese Communists.

May Meet Khrushchev
—It is "accepted as a possibility" that Johnson and Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev may have a get-acquainted meeting some day but no plans have been made or proposed.

—His first 100 days as President "were filled almost to the breaking point" with fast-paced activity. But he now has a steady daily schedule with this result: "I never felt better in my life."

—The United States had "been very close to agreement several times" with Panama toward solving the Canal Zone dispute but hitches were created through language difficulties and the fact "they have an election on." He was still hopeful for an agreement.

—He believes the Senate will approve the House-passed civil rights bill despite the long delay of a filibuster "and I am going to do everything I can to get it passed."

—The presidency is "a much tougher job from the inside than I thought it was from the outside." But the American system of government is what will win over the Soviet brand.

—His chief priorities following the assassination of President John F. Kennedy were to show the world there was continuity of leadership, convince Americans they must be unified, and let the potential enemy know "that we had closed ranks, and not to tread on us."

Bend hosts police school

Year's delay in BPA rate increase okayed by Udall

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall announced today he has conditionally approved a Bonneville Power Administration recommendation for a one-year postponement of a proposed rate increase.

In Portland, Ore., home of the agency, BPA administrator Charles Luce said he was mailing to all customers a proposed contract amendment which would serve as the basis for a one-year delay in any BPA increase.

Udall said the rate increase would be postponed for one year if all BPA customers sign the contract amendment.

At least three things could change the need for a rate boost, Udall said. The most important would be the proposed power intertie between the Pacific Northwest and the Pacific Southwest. Another would be the proposed treaty with Canada to develop the upper Columbia River.

The contract amendment would permit BPA to maintain its present rates for an extra year, he said, until a rate increase would be filed with the Federal Power Commission in 1965.

38 crewmen rescued from U.S. freighter

TOKYO (UPI)—A U.S. Navy minesweeper arrived in port today with 38 crewmen rescued in heavy seas from an American freighter which ran aground Sunday near the entrance to Tokyo bay.

The master and three crewmen of the freighter, the Taddai village, remained aboard the 8,000-ton ship although it appeared to be in danger of capsizing, a Navy dispatch said.

A spokesman for the freighter's owners said its engine rooms were flooded and the stern partly submerged.

The ship line identified the captain as Kai De Vermond of Lewisdale, Hyattsville, Md.

The crewmen were Mikael Kehler, Vancouver, Wash.; Arthur Harrington, Boston, and Robert Henninger, New York City.

The freighter, operated by the States Marine Line, grounded on a reef when going to the rescue of a 7,000-ton Greek freighter, the Manila G. L., which had run aground earlier.

The two freighters were sailing towards Yokohama from Long Beach, Calif. The 26 men aboard the Greek vessel abandoned ship Sunday.

The American seamen were rescued by two ocean mine sweepers assigned to the U.S. Seventh Fleet, the Persistent and Dynamic.

The Dynamic stood by the stricken American freighter to rescue the master and three remaining crewmen should it break upon the rocks.

Appeal awaited in Hoffa case

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (UPI)—Attorneys for Teamsters President James R. Hoffa are expected to turn to the Sixth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati this week in efforts to reverse Hoffa's conviction and eight-year prison sentence for jury tampering.

U.S. District Court Judge Frank Wilson formally ended proceedings here Saturday, by overruling final defense motions for a new trial and judgments of acquittal.

Hoffa and three codefendants, convicted of attempting to fix jurors during the labor leader's 1962 conspiracy trial at Nashville, have until March 24 to file their appeals briefs with the Cincinnati court.

Hoffa has said he would appeal all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Parisian street named for JFK

PARIS (UPI)—A broad stretch of tree-lined road along the River Seine, formerly the Quai de Passy, was officially named "Avenue du President Kennedy" today in memory of the late President of the United States.

Mrs. Rose Kennedy, John F. Kennedy's mother, was among a crowd of about 300 persons who stood silently in cold, overcast weather, as Mayor Jean Auburtin of Paris unveiled a simple sign to re-name the street.

Las Vegas hotel hit by blaze

LAS VEGAS (UPI)—A roaring fire, fanned by winds up to 40 miles an hour, whipped through a wing of the Showboat Hotel today and caused damage estimated at \$500,000.

Twenty-five of the 48 rooms were gutted in the wing and the remainder were damaged by smoke and water. There were no injuries.

Hotel purchasing agent Del Conyner discovered the fire in the wing to the rear of the casino. He routed the guests and turned in the alarm. Eight trucks manned by 40 firemen controlled the blaze in about an hour.

Bid opening set for rock removal

PORTLAND (UPI)—Army Engineers will open bids for a \$3 million Columbia River and Portland Harbor rock removal project April 16, the Portland District said today.

The bids will move the Columbia River 40-foot channel a step closer to realization.

The invitation calls for removal of 140,000 cubic yards of rock at Warrior Rock and Wau-na in the Columbia River and in Portland harbor on the Willamette River.

The bulk of the work will be in Portland harbor where 104,000 cubic yards will be removed to provide a channel depth of 24 feet.

DEATH REPORTED

PORTLAND (UPI)—Franklin L. Davis, 84, a former assistant Oregon public utility commissioner, died Sunday at his home as a result of a heart ailment.

Davis was assistant to then Public Utility Commissioner Ormond Bean from 1939 - 1943. Later he worked in the planning branch of the U.S. Army Engineer District here.

Track operators rap Oregon's revenue policies

SALEM (UPI)—The operators of Portland Meadows, which opens its 1964 season Friday night—unleashed a blast at Oregon's revenue policies in letters mailed to track patrons.

Theme of the letter is that Longacres at Seattle, Wash., pays smaller state fees than are demanded of the Portland horse racing track.

B. J. Gilbert executive vice president of Portland Meadows, Inc., termed the contrast "galling."

He said the remedy lies with the state of Oregon.
"We pay \$500 per day license fee while Longacres pays \$100." "The state of Oregon takes 5 per cent on \$133,000, 6 per cent on the next \$67,000, and 7 per cent on all over \$200,000, while Washington parimutuel take is a straight 5 per cent."

"It boils down to this. We are in the entertainment business. Our success depends on you. You have the right to expect and get the best. If our big partner the state of Oregon keeps the present obsolete parimutuel law we cannot bring you the type of racing that you deserve."

Gilbert said the total handle in 1961 was \$8 million, went up to \$9.25 million in 1962, and last year topped \$10 million.

The Oregon parimutuel take was \$441,780 for 1961, \$518,382 in 1962, and last year went up to \$568,996.

Responsibility of parents, PTA subject

Botulism victim cousin of Bend man; once lived here

Two children of Mrs. Vernon Campbell of Camas, Wash., who died early Friday morning of botulism poisoning, were listed in critical condition today with the same illness, according to United Press International.

Mrs. Campbell, the former Frances Blanchard, was a cousin of Verne Blanchard, 931 S. Sixth Street, Bend. She lived in Bend during one school term in 1950-51, and taught school at La-Pine.

The children, Kenneth, 8, and Dorothy, 3, are patients at Vancouver Memorial Hospital. Their conditions deteriorated over the weekend. Kenneth was admitted to the hospital Saturday and Dorothy Thursday.

Campbell, the fourth member of the family to be stricken, was admitted to the hospital Saturday night. He was reported improved today. Source of the illness is tentatively attributed to home-canned string beans.

Two other children, Jimmy, 10, and Charles, 12, have not been affected so far, but are under observation.

Mrs. Campbell's funeral will be held Tuesday in Camas. Blanchard, her cousin, plans to attend.

Mrs. Campbell attended the Nazarene Church when she lived in Bend. Her father is a Nazarene minister. The parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Myron Blanchard, live in Tillamook, where Mrs. Campbell was born.
