## Proceeds from ball game go to JFK library

BOSTON (UPI)—The Boston Red Sox and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., announced Tuesday that proceeds of the team's opening home game, April 17 against the Chicago White Sox, would be donated to the John F. Kennedy Memorial Library.

Red Sox Vice President Richard O'Connell and Sen. Kennedy announced the planned contribution to the memorial to the late president during a joint news conference at the Algonquin Club.

O'Connell said that as far as he knew, this would mark the first time the proceeds of a "championship defense" had been earmarked for special donation.

Kennedy, who had just finished appearing in the St. Patrick's-Evacuation Day parade, said the memorial library fund now totals \$4.5 million, slightly less than half of the estimated \$10 million cost.

## Student safari brings Portland group to area

On a vacation safari that will take the group into the heart of a region flooded long ago by huge lakes, some 15 Portland high school students moved through the Bend area today.

The occasion is the second annual Oregon Museum of Science and Industry outing into the old lake country, with a former Bend resident, Jim Anderson, OMSI naturalist, in charge. Objective of the group on the current outing will be the collection of fossils along shores of the old lakes, where elephants, camels, horses and, among other creatures, ground sloths, once lived.

Tonight's camp site will be near Fremont Well, on the Reuben Long ranch of the Fort Rock country. From that camp, the young OMSI scientists will radiate to various points of interest in the Fort Rock valley.

Tomorrow, the main party will hike through the Fossil Lake area, in search of fossils and artifacts. This is the area first studied in the 1870's by Thomas Condon, father of Oregon geology.

Anderson said evenings will be spent in discussion groups, and walks into the desert while observing night animals. There will also be some star gazing, with the OMSI telescope to be included in the baggage.

The return to Portland will be this weekend.

## Murder trial gets under way

PORTLAND (UPI)—The state began presenting witnesses Tuesday at the first degree murder trial of Arlyn Bredahl, 31.

Bredahl is accused in the slaying last year of John Pihlak, 37, whose body was found in a car parked by a southeast Portland tavern.

Deputy Dist. Atty. Charles Merton told the jury in his opening statement that Bredahl killed Pihlak "by crushing him in a manner and by means unknown."

## Wildlife Week program given

Growth of interest in outdoor recreation and problems faced as a result of the rapidly increasing lure of the outdoors were noted by Milton J. Griffith of the Deschutes National Forest headquarters staff in a talk before Lion Club members here Tuesday noon.

He was on a program headed by Ashley A. Poust, Deschutes National Forest supervisor who touched on provisions of the federal antiques act, suggested that hunters of artifacts leave shovels and bulldozers at home, then mentioned that they not fear citation for picking up "points" that are on the surface. The act, it was stressed, is primarily for the protection of ancient treasures excavated from caves and old burial areas by archaeologists.

Griffith directed his talk, and the showing of colored slides, to the local observance of National Wildlife Week. He prefaced his narration of slide material with a short talk relative to the outdoor recreation.

In 1941, Griffith said, some 87,000 persons visited the Deschutes National Forest. This number increased to 163,000 in 1947, then jumped to 540,000 in 1959. This past year, it is estimated that 1,280,000 persons visited the Deschutes woods.

By the year 2,000, it is expected that the total will be in the three to four million range. Slides presented by Griffith covered various fields of outdoor recreation in the Deschutes country — mountain climbing, skiing, hiking, horseback riding, etc.

Glenn O. Ratcliff, president of the Bend Lions, presided at the luncheon meeting.

Two persons died in Oregon traffic accidents Tuesday night and six persons were killed in the neighboring state of Washington in accidents Tuesday night and early today.

Robert Eugene Weyer, 21, Gladstone, was killed in a one-car crash near Gladstone, south of Portland. May Ida Vandenberghe, 17, Oregon City, suffered a fractured pelvis. Police said their car left the road about 11:30 p.m. and rolled into a field.

Mrs. Udith Brown, 40, Salem, was killed in a two-car collision on State Highway 22 about 10 miles east of Salem Tuesday night.

In Washington, two members of Patrol Squadron 17 at the Naval Air Station on Whidbey Island near Oak Harbor were killed early this morning in a two-car crash about six miles north of Bellingham.

The victims were Michael A. Bell, 20, and Richard Hill, also 20.

John Chandler, 28, LaCrosse, was killed early this morning in a two-car collision about five miles west of Colfax on Highway 285.

An Everett couple was killed Tuesday night about one-half mile east of Mount Vernon when their car was involved in a collision while backing out of a private driveway onto State Highway 538.

The victims were Gerald Ludwig, 63, and Rhoda Ludwig, 62.
