

Damage heavy in spectacular Portland fire

PORTLAND (UPI)—A spectacular fire roared through two buildings of the Tempo Furniture Corp. north of Portland Wednesday night.

Owners estimated the damage at between \$250,000 and \$300,000. The two-story frame buildings and large quantities of prefabricated furniture stock inside were destroyed.

Thirteen city and county engine companies, three ladder trucks and one fireboat brought the flames under control a little more than an hour after the first alarm was sounded at 9:07 p.m. The clean-up continued through the night.

Cause of the fire has not been determined. It was discovered by two employees of the adjacent Moore Dry Kiln Co., who put out a small blaze on their roof and kept flames from spreading to that firm.

Firemen said they were hindered by lack of water in the small, privately-maintained lines outside the city. One crew was forced to flee when their lines suddenly went dry, but no firemen were injured.

The heat was so intense that it cracked a windshield and melted a running light on one truck.

Hearing due on Redmond grade budget

REDMOND — Public hearing on the new grade school budget, up some \$43,000 over last year, will be held April 6 at 8 p.m. in the John Tuck School, reports Superintendent Hugh Hartman.

The budget proposes an increased tax levy for 1964-65, amounting to approximately 13 mills. The increase is due, in part, to a loss in revenue in excess of \$70,000. Redmond's grade school system suffered one of the largest percentage cuts in state funds, said state officials, because of the district's valuation increase. Loss in equalization alone cost the district \$28,000.

This does not account for all the increase, however. Teachers' salaries are up approximately \$35,000, including increments due the existing staff and the addition of five new teachers to the faculty. Loss in revenue accounts for about 8 mills of the proposed 13-mill levy.

Total budget has been set at \$481,495.50. Amount of revenue necessary to balance the budget is \$317,930.60. Added to this is \$50,868.51 for delinquent taxes, bringing the total to \$368,799.20. The sum of \$41,636.99 is within the six per cent limitation; \$292,609.21 is outside the limitation. Payment on a previous bond issue, \$34,353, is not subject to the limitation. Hartman says fixed charges, such as social security, retirement and others, are up approximately \$2500. Because of increased community activities in the schools, utility costs have been higher than budgeted, he said. Included in the budget is \$1700 for painting the exteriors of Hill and Brown Schools.

Behan continues in critical shape

DUBLIN (UPI) — Playwright Brendan Behan, still in critical condition at Meath Hospital, today entered what doctors said was a key phase of his 10-day struggle against death.

"This could be a decisive day for Behan, if he can hold out through it," a hospital spokesman said. "He has shown extraordinary reserves of strength in his fight for life."

The spokesman cautioned, however, that the 41-year-old dramatist's condition was "very, very low" and said he had been alternating between semi-consciousness and coma for hours.

"We feel there is likely to be a change one way or the other in the next 12 hours, although it will be very gradual," he said.

The playwright's wife, Beatrice, 36, said, "I'm still hoping he will make it. Brendan has come through tough situations before."

Behan, the flamboyant bad boy of Irish letters, was rushed to the hospital March 10 following a drinking bout. He went into a coma Sunday but later rallied slightly. Doctors said he was suffering from jaundice resulting from a liver ailment, complicated by diabetes. He has had diabetes for several years.

Rotarians announced today that they have compressed plans for their Deschutes gorge train excursion into two days, to meet wishes of residents of the Portland area.

The excursion train, carrying some 300 persons, under the revised program will leave Portland at 7 a.m. on Saturday, April 11, and reach Bend around 2 p.m., for an overnight stop. The return of the train to Portland will be about 4 p.m. Sunday.

Fred Cartmill of the Rotarians visited Portland Wednesday to complete arrangements for the operation of the Oregon Trunk train up the Columbia and Deschutes gorges to Bend. The excursion was featured on Portland television programs Wednesday evening.

A special program is being lined up for the Portlanders, with Phil F. Brogan, Bend, author of "East of the Cascades," to be aboard to serve as a guide in pointing to geologic, historic and scenic features of the spectacular Deschutes gorge.

In Bend on Saturday night, April 11, there will be a dance for the visitors, at the Piliot Butte Inn. Evening drives to points of interest will also be arranged.

On Sunday, snow-covered Bachelor Butte will be the lure for most of the visitors, who will have the opportunity of skiing, or just viewing from close up the country ruled by the Three Sisters.

There is a possibility that there will be space on the train for Central Oregonians who care to go to Portland, then board the train for the gorge trip to Bend.

Portland urged to reconsider its CD decision

PORTLAND (UPI)—A report by the American Municipal Association says Portland should reconsider "at the earliest opportunity" its decision to abolish civil defense.

Portland was one of six cities studied in a 300-page report received by the mayor's office. The report said Portland's civil defense program, which included an underground municipal civil defense operations center, had been one of the best in the nation. It also praised its fallout shelter program.

Portland decided to do away with its CD agency after voters defeated a special levy in November of 1962.

C. Dale Robbins

C. Dale Robbins, 54, who for several years was Bend High School music director before leaving for San Bernardino, Calif., in 1946, died recently in the southern California community. He had been ill for about three months.

Mr. Robbins left Bend 18 years ago to accept the position of director of vocal and piano music at San Bernardino Valley College. He was widely known in southern California as a choral director. His madrigal groups were known through California. Mr. Robbins was the director for a number of performances of "The Messiah" for the San Bernardino Council of Churches. Earlier, he organized the "San Bernardino Chanters."

A native of Idaho, Mr. Robbins did his undergraduate work at the University of Oregon, and earned his master of music degree from Northwestern University.

Surviving the ex-Bend resident are his widow, Maureen; a son, Ray, in Los Angeles, and a son, John, at home. The family home is at 11815 Arliss Court, Grand Terrace, Colton, Calif.

PORTLAND (UPI)— Sheriff's deputies seized 28 pinball machines and made 15 arrests Wednesday night in a large-scale raid on taverns located in Multnomah County outside the Portland city limits.

More arrests were expected today. Sixty-five deputies took part in the raid which covered 20 taverns.

Those arrested were charged with making illegal payments on pinball games. Bail was set at \$500. The offense is a misdemeanor.

The arrests were made simultaneously. Tight security precautions were imposed with officers opening sealed instructions at 10 p.m.

Sheriff's officers said planning for the raid began last Dec. 23. There are no pinballs in the Portland city limits. The city outlawed them several years ago.
