

Write-in push for Lodge due in Oregon

PORTLAND (UPI)—Two men who organized the write-in victory of Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge in the New Hampshire Republican presidential primary arrived Thursday to begin efforts to repeat their triumph in Oregon.

David Goldberg, 34, a Boston attorney and field director for the Lodge campaign, and Robert Mullen, 56, a Washington public relations man, said they will be in Oregon "most of the time" until the state's May 15 primary election.

Mullen plans trips to Seattle, Los Angeles and Chicago during that time.

Goldberg said he considers the Oregon primary more significant than the June 2 vote in California because all the important Republican candidates will be on the ballot. That includes Sen. Barry Goldwater, Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, Gov. William Scranton, Sen. Margaret Chase Smith and former Vice President Richard Nixon.

"Any candidate who makes a poor showing in Oregon will not have a chance of nomination in San Francisco," he said.

"I think Ambassador Lodge will emerge from the Oregon primary as the national favorite son."

Goldberg declined to speculate whether Lodge would return from Viet Nam to campaign in Oregon, but he did not rule out that possibility.

He said he hoped to have a state headquarters open in Portland next week. Sally Saltonstall, niece of Sen.

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FBI agent lists 5 'musts' in handling of sex crimes

"A sex criminal is arrested every 6 1/2 minutes in the United States."

Those were the words of Harold Clark, special agent from the Portland office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation speaking at a special police school at the Bend City Hall Thursday.

Clark told his audience of local law enforcement officers that the purpose of the school was to acquaint the departments with all phases of crime.

Because such crimes are committed by abnormal people, Clark said that investigators of such crimes must have a comprehensive knowledge of the subject to make any headway in solving them.

"There is much pressure on the local department to solve a sex crime because there is much concern and alarm when one takes place," Clark continued. Reports of such crimes appeal to the public and Clark criticized the press for the role it sometimes plays in sensational cases.

Clark listed five steps which he indicated were "musts" when investigating sex crimes.

1. Cooperation between agencies — There must be cooperation between all law enforcement agencies working on the case. There is no room for "glory hounds."

2. Adequate dissemination of the news — Information of any sex crime should be made available to all area police agencies. One department should not try to hide facts.

3. Coordination of effort — Where several agencies are working on the same case one individual should be in charge so each agency isn't working in opposite directions.

4. Specialization — One man in every police department should be in charge of all sex cases in the area so he can become somewhat of an expert on local sex crimes.

5. Organization — All departments should use the same information forms so as to make

Agreement set on fire effort

MADRAS — Basic agreement between the North Unit Rural Fire District and the City of Madras that would maintain a joint operation of fire protection equipment for both bodies was announced this week by spokesmen for the two groups.

General terms of the agreement would provide for the city furnishing manpower, alarm, dispatching and other services outside the field of purchase, maintenance and operating expenses for the vehicles. Each group would purchase, maintain and operate its own fire fighting rigs.

The North Unit will also share in costs of a building to house additional equipment to be purchased.

Spokesmen said the entire contract between the two bodies now hinges on the outcome of a rural fire district election to be held concurrently with the May primary election.

investigative work easier. These forms should be filed with the state police who coordinate the gathering of all sex crime information in Oregon.

Clark said the reason for a lack of knowledge and instruction in sex cases is that normal people recoil from the subject. In addition, there is a feeling in some circles that sex criminals should be handled by physicians and psychiatrists instead of policemen.

The Portland FBI agent said that prevention is the most difficult aspect of sex crimes because no official action can be taken until a crime has been committed. The interview is the most important device in the prevention and solving of such crimes. The special agent stated that one must prove in court that a crime took place to get a conviction on a sex charge.

Clark concluded that the swift apprehension of sex offenders does much to put trust in a local police department by its community.

Students to get chance to hear Gov. Rockefeller

Wacker emphasized that it is important for all persons wishing to register for Spring term courses at COC to be present during the regularly scheduled time for registration.

Georgia chief scores Rosellini in Cauthen case

ATLANTA, Ga. (UPI)—Gov. Carl E. Sanders said Thursday the State of Washington must accept the "burden of guilt" of a convicted murderer Gov. Albert D. Rosellini refused to extradite to Georgia.

"It is they who must assume the responsibility of the actions of a man, who in court, admitted murder and then escaped to flee the imposition of justice as decreed by the court," Sanders said.

Rosellini Monday freed Charlie Will Cauthen, 26-year-old Negro under the death sentence for the 1959 slaying of a Pike County white merchant, Melvin E. Perkins of Milner.

Cauthen escaped before action had begun on an appeal of the conviction.

Last year he was found living in Washington State and Georgia sought to have him returned.

"The burden of Cauthen's guilt rests now upon the State of Washington," Sanders said. "I regret that the governor of the State of Washington has refused to extradite this man. I know of no reason why Cauthen should not be returned since he was tried and convicted in a Georgia court of respect and esteem."

Rosellini, in announcing the extradition refusal, said he did not believe the defendant had received "justice" in Georgia as the term is understood in the State of Washington. He announced he had twice conferred with the Georgia governor before making the decision.

Sanders, warning he would renew extradition attempts if Cauthen moves from Washington to any other state, issued a formal statement to clarify "confusion and misunderstanding" over Rosellini's action.

"The report that Gov. Albert Rosellini conferred with me twice is incorrect," Sanders said.

Sanders said Rosellini telephoned last Friday "and informed me that he was doubtful that he would grant the State of Georgia's petition for the extradition."

Sanders said this was the one and only telephone call he received from the Washington governor.

Surgery due for Mrs. Sprague

SALEM (UPI)—Mrs. Charles A. Sprague, wife of the Oregon Statesman publisher, was slated to undergo surgery today for a fractured hip suffered in a fall in Paris, France, Wednesday.

Word received here indicated Mrs. Sprague was resting comfortably in a hospital.

The Spragues were on a tour of the Middle East and Europe when the mishap occurred.

Good Samaritan law proposed at safety meet

SALEM (UPI) — Support of "good samaritan" legislation, and increasing the driving age to 18 were among recommendations made by the governor's traffic safety conference which ended a two-day meeting Thursday.

"Good samaritan" legislation would exempt doctors from court suits for giving emergency aid at the scene of an auto accident. Oregon doctors do not now enjoy such exemption.

Drivers licenses would be issued at age 16 for those who successfully completed a school driver training course, but others would not be able to get a license until they were 18, if another conference recommendation was followed.

Implied consent and fixed speed limits were recommended. periodic vehicle inspections were called for, and it was suggested that persons over 70 be required to take a renewal examination every two years to maintain their drivers license.

The scores of recommendations adopted by the conference will go to the Traffic Safety Commission for screening, then will be recommended to the legislature for adoption.

School budget increase noted

MADRAS — An increase of 12.3 per cent in the general fund budget and 9.96 per cent in the budget for all funds was revealed this week with the publishing of the proposed budget for Madras school district 509J.

Total estimated expenditures for the general fund for the coming school year are pegged at \$1,286,069 for the coming school year as compared to \$1,144,611 in the current year's budget.

Increased instruction costs, largely resulting from the addition of 10 people to the district staff in teaching and counseling fields are responsible for most of the increase.

Continued heavy enrollment, need to relieve crowded classrooms and expansion of special services are primary factors in the increased budget, spokesmen said.
