Doctor on trial for Auschwitz role interviewed by UPI writer

FRANKFURT, Germany (UPI) — The waiter brought another glass of apple juice to the distinguished looking gentleman munching on a dish of pork chops and sauerkraut at the corner table.

The soft-spoken man with the halo of white hair surrounding a bald spot was just another customer to the waiter. In his spotless, tailor-made suit, he looked like a well-to-do businessman, a lawyer or doctor.

He was a doctor indeed. "This business card identifies him as 'Dr. Franz Lucas, gynecologist.' He looks like the benevolent fatherly type of physician who inspires confidence in a woman.

Lucas is also one of the 22 defendants in the Auschwitz war crimes trial. He is specifically accused of supervising the dropping of deadly 'zyklon b' pellets into the gas chambers and selecting the victims in the Nazi death camp.

Not in Custody

Like 11 of his co-defendants, Lucas is not in custody. He can go home on the weekends to his home and run his private medical office when the court is not in session Tuesdays and Wednesday.

How does he feel about being on trial as one of "Hitler's little helpers?" "Well, it's quite a burden, financially," he told United Press International.

It costs me 400 marks (\$100) a month to travel back and forth. And the lawyers fees go to the thousands."

What about your patients? They stay away when they learned you are a defendant here?"

"Oh, no, quite to the contrary. My clientele increased because of the publicity. Some are just curious. But in Elmshorn, we have only 35,000 people and they knew about me anyway."

But you were fired from your job as head of the women's clinic in Elmshorn, weren't you?"

"Yes, the City Council felt I should have told them about my role in Auschwitz. One of the city fathers said I cheated him because he proposed me for the job. I know now that was stupid of me. I should have

mentioned it."

"Is there any enmity against your family?" "No, most people are sympathetic. My two girls, they are 10 and 14, have encountered no hard feelings from their school mates."

"Some Dutch television reporters were in Elmshorn some time ago and asked people in the street about me. All the answers were positive."

Lucas emphasized that at least half a dozen former Auschwitz inmates wrote letters to the court testifying he helped them in the darkest days of their lives.

In court, Lucas is an outsider. Like most defendants, he has denied all charges against him. But unlike the others he does not seek their company in the intermissions and lunches by himself.

What would he do if he were acquitted in the trial?

"I would stay in Elmshorn, of course. That's where my home is and people know me."

In court, Lucas has said he always tried to act as a doctor, even in Auschwitz. "I helped where I could."

He has admitted sterilizing three men, but claims "that was customary all over Germany then."

What does he think about the horrors of Auschwitz?

"It was a nightmare. The worst experience of my life. I finally got transferred — to another concentration camp. But Auschwitz was the worst."

And the things that have come out in this trial. Like the squirtings (Lethal injections) of prisoners. You won't believe this, but I have no idea until it came out in this trial that prisoners were killed by injections into their heart muscles."

"I had heard about injections, of course, but thought they were given into the veins. I still don't understand this heart muscle technique. They must have had special hypodermic needles."

Lucas drained his glass of the last of the apple juice, stood up with a pleasant nod, and walked out.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Opposition to a government passage of import quotas on any items was announced today by the American Association of Port Authorities.

Michael M. Mora, Norfolk, Va., said a bill now pending in the Senate, which would cut down on frozen meat imports from Australia and New Zealand, and other similar bills would hurt the nation's seaports, which have large cold storage warehouses.

Mora said passage of the bill also would be a contradiction of the United States' reciprocal trade policy and could mark the beginning of restrictions on other imports.

The boy was able to put out the fire before he reached him, but he received burns on his body, arms and hands. Mrs. Parkinson returned from a dental appointment as the Redmond disaster car arrived on the scene, at 4:20 p.m.

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Rocky to give speech in Bend next Monday

Central and eastern Oregon will be in the national political limelight next week when Governor Nelson Rockefeller makes his second presidential campaign visit to the state.

The final stop before Bend will be a three-county public reception at The Dalles.

After an overnight stop in Bend, the governor will speak in Eugene and end his trip with a two-hour telethon from Portland.

The program, which will be telecast throughout the state, will be a question and answer period with questions submitted by the general public via telephone. Local numbers will be announced prior to the Rockefeller appearance.

The next stop for the blonde housewife from Long Beach, Calif., was Natal, Brazil. She is the wife of the commander of a Navy minesweeper.

Mrs. Smith is attempting to become the first woman to fly around the world alone in a light plane. She is following the route used by Amelia Earhart who disappeared over the Pacific 27 years ago.

8 lose lives in accidents over weekend

Traffic accidents claimed the lives of eight persons in Oregon during the weekend. Three members of an Oregon family died in a crash in Northern California.

Velda Nicely, 31, Mt. Vernon, was killed in a collision between a pickup truck and another truck near John Day Sunday.

George Brand, 49, North Bend, died at a Coos Bay hospital Sunday from injuries suffered in a one-car accident at Coos Bay Friday night.

Ira Zable, 37, Sweet Home; his wife, Joan, 32, and a son, Daniel, 10, died when their car crashed into a tree near Tulelake, Calif., Saturday. Three of the couple's other children were hospitalized at Klamath Falls and three others escaped injury.

Kenneth Baumgartner, 28, Oregon City was injured fatally when a car in which he was riding slammed into a stone railing near Oregon City Saturday.

Arthur Wafford, 51, Springfield, was struck and killed by a car near Cottage Grove Saturday.

Mrs. Nona Winter, 43, The Dalles, and her brother, Greenville Crookston, 56, Grace, Idaho, died when their car rolled down an embankment near The Dalles Saturday.

Karen Freeman, 21, Roseburg, was killed in a one-car accident near Roseburg Saturday.

Thomas LaSalle, 21, Gaston, died when his car overturned near Forest Grove Saturday.

Three in Oregon family killed

TULELAKE, Calif. (UPI) — The parents and one child of a family of nine were killed over Sunday night when their car skidded out of control on icy state Highway 139 and slammed into a juniper tree.

The California Highway Patrol identified the dead as Ira Lee Zable, 37, a school teacher from Sweet Home, Ore.; his wife, Joan Yvonne, 32, a son, Daniel Joseph, 10.

Zable, the driver of the car, was northbound about 21 miles south of here when the accident occurred.

Suffering major injuries were three other children, Coleen, 12; Donald, 13, and Timothy, 8. All three were taken to Klamath Valley Hospital.

Three other children escaped unhurt. They were Christopher, 1; Mickey, 3, and Benie, 2.

Scientist feels too much emphasis is put on space

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The United States is neglecting its underwater exploration in favor of too much emphasis on space, a scientist said today.

Ron Hinman, head of the Systems Management Division of Western Gear Corp., said, "This could be far more dangerous than forgetting about anti-missile missiles."

"We have as much need to worry about the missiles coming from an offshore submarine as we do from one coming over the North Pole," he said.

He noted that for 1963 the U.S. government allotted only \$124.5 million to oceanography—to study the mysteries of "inner space"—while \$5 billion went for "outer space."

Extensive Research

However, Hinman said the "average landlubber" has no idea of the extent to which scientists of his company and other firms are working to develop foolproof defensive measures against possible enemy attacks.

"The problems of working in water miles deep are apparent," Hinman said. "Take the search for the submarine Thresher, for example. This proved how lacking in underwater vehicles we really are."

"The Navy is interested in developing underwater robots which read like science fiction of a few years ago — vehicles

equipped with television cameras and mechanical arms and flood lights.

"We're building some of the exotic equipment for Subroc, the torpedo-missile that emerges from the water, flies through the air to the proximity of its target, then re-enters the water to complete its mission."

Value To Mankind

The scientist said there "could be much more value to mankind beneath the rolling seas than there is on all the way-out planets combined." He said there is food and minerals and "life-saving protection" to be found in the "inner space" of the seas.

"If the population growth causes worry that man can't produce enough food on land, there's a tremendous untapped food source in the sea," Hinman said. "If oil, vital to modern machinery, runs out in our proven fields, there's as much or more beneath the ocean."

"The appalling fact is that all of man's knowledge of oceanography is still meager," said Hinman. "We think it's time more people applied the concepts of space to the space beneath the ocean, which may be more meaningful to man than zipping around Venus."
