

Wilson touches on his plans for new apartment unit

Bend's planning commission continued to gather information at two public hearings held Monday night at the city hall on proposed zone changes.

Three persons in attendance commented on the inability to hear the proceedings from the chair at times, including two people in the audience and Commissioner Dick Maudlin.

The commission heard from John Wilson who explained his plans for the development of a 56-unit apartment structure between McKinley and Cleveland and S. 1st and S. 2nd Sts. He urged the commission to recom-

mend the zoning change in the area from R-3 (2-family dwellings) to R-4 (multiple family dwellings) so he could go ahead with his plans.

Kirches Say OK

Mr. and Mrs. C. V. Kirsch, owners of the Ranch Room which is adjacent to the proposed apartment development, expressed approval of the plan and urged the commission to recommend the zoning change.

R. N. Newland and Mrs. V. L. Harley spoke in favor of the proposed zoning change in the Riverside Addition and Westoria Addition from R-2 to C-2. The area is bounded by 3rd St. on the west, Thurston on the north, Seward on the south, and 100 feet west of East 5th St.

Newland pointed out that the changing of the area from R-2 to C-2 (residential to commercial) would be just an extension of C-2 which is located on the west side of the area under construction. "This would not be a case of spot zoning," Newland said.

Commissioner Maudlin said he was not in favor of changing the area to a commercial zone because it was too close to the Neal residential development.

Special Meeting

A special meeting will be held by the commission April 6 to discuss the information gathered from the two hearings and prepare a recommendation. An application from Harry English, representing Miller Cleaners, requesting zone changes in the area of 2145 E. 1st St. will also be discussed at this meeting.

A sidewalk report prepared by the Sidewalk Study Committee was accepted and sent to the city commission. The planners authorized a letter of commendation directed to the study committee which consisted of Mrs. Roy L. Sailer, Mrs. George McGeary and Mrs. James Smiley.

The Bulletin will carry a report of this sidewalk study in tomorrow's newspaper.

LBJ offers hope of peace for future citizens

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson said today his greatest hope is that he can pave the way for every American boy to grow to manhood "loving his country — instead of dying for it."

He made the remark in departing from a prepared speech before an AFL-CIO audience, his second address in two days before a major union group.

Johnson said the United States will strive for "reasoned agreement" rather than use of force or threats of force to settle international differences.

"The people of this country have more blessed hopes than for bitter victory," Johnson said. "Our hope is to enjoy reasoned agreement instead of ready aggression—to substitute understanding for retaliation."

Johnson's speech to the National Legislative Conference of the AFL-CIO's Building and Construction Trades Department focused on domestic issues, primarily his anti-poverty crusade. He also renewed a call he issued Monday to the United Auto Workers convention in Atlantic City to guard against revival of the price-wage spiral.

Then, departing from his prepared text, Johnson told the enthusiastic audience that before he concluded he wanted to "talk to you about your family and mine—about their future and this country's future."

"My most fervent prayer is to be a President who can make it possible for every boy in America to grow to manhood loving his country — instead of dying for it," he asserted.

In the earlier portions of his remarks, centering on his domestic legislative program, Johnson was interrupted more than a dozen times with applause and cheers from the union delegates as he vowed to work for full employment and abolition of poverty.

The biggest cheer came when he vowed to battle for a program of "medical assistance through social security" for the elderly.

Advance copies of the President's text had Johnson predicting passage of the medicare bill this year. But he apparently decided to change the forecast to less specific terms, and forecast enactment "if not this week, if not this month, if not this year, at the earliest possible date."

India supports Soviet proposal

GENEVA (UPI)—India announced its support of a Soviet disarmament proposal today in a move that startled the West.

Disarmament negotiator V.C. Trevidi said his government favors Moscow's "nuclear umbrella" proposal, which calls for the destruction of all nuclear weapons—except a limited number retained for defense by the United States and Russia—as a first step toward disarmament.

Church reports its schedule for Holy Week

Holy week services at Trinity Episcopal church started Monday noon with communion rites and will continue each noon through Thursday, from 12:05 p.m. to 12:35 p.m. On Thursday evening at 7:30, there will be the traditional institution of the Lord's Supper, with Holy communion.

There will be a three hour service on Good Friday, from noon until 3 p.m., with short sermons based on the seven last words of Christ on the Cross. Members of the congregation are invited to come and go at their convenience, during the service.

Easter Sunday services will be at 8 and 10:30 a.m., with choral communion and sermon. At the 10:30 a.m. service, children will present their mite boxes and adore the floral cross, in a traditional feature of the rites.

The choir at the Sunday services will sing excerpts from "The Messiah."

Cattle building to be built

PRINEVILLE — Construction is expected to begin in the near future on a 90-head cattle building at the Crook County fair grounds. Alvin Hanson and Son, contractors, Prineville, will be the builders.

The new structure will be erected north of the new sales pavilion constructed last year, and will be similar to the one large cattle building which has been in use at the fairgrounds for some time.

Increased number of entries, resulting in a crowding of existing facilities, caused the fair board to decide on the new construction, Ivan Chappell, fair manager states.

When the building is completed, Chappell said, arrangements have been made for black-topping areas around the various livestock buildings to reduce dusty or muddy conditions that have harassed fairgoers in the past, according to the weather.

Portland jail said disgraceful

PORTLAND (UPI)—Rev. Edward Steele, Portland police chaplain, Monday called the city jail "disgraceful" and one of the most "shameful situations existing in Portland."

Speaking at a luncheon meeting of the Sertoma Club of Portland, Rev. Steele pointed out that the jail was built in 1912 to house between 100 and 200 prisoners but now had up to 400 prisoners on weekends.

N.Y. to continue Clay recognition

NEW YORK (UPI)—Cassius Clay, threatened with the loss of his heavyweight championship by the World Boxing Association, was assured Monday of continued recognition as champion by the New York State Athletic Commission.

Emile Bruneau, chairman of the World Boxing Association Championship Committee, said in New Orleans early today that he expects the WBA to take away Clay's title for "acts detrimental to boxing."

While Bruneau was polling his seven fellow committee members by telephone, the New York commission, which is not a member of the WBA, stated flatly that it will continue to recognize Clay.

Former Marine Gen. Melvin L. Krulwich, chairman of the New York commission, said:

"Within the limits of the Constitution, the right to freedom of speech and to religious beliefs are inviolate. No title of a world champion has ever been vacated because of religion, race, or personal beliefs."

"The New York State Athletic Commission will continue to recognize Cassius Clay as world's heavyweight champion," Krulwich said.

The New York action assured Clay of at least partial recognition as champion regardless of what action the WBA decides to take.

Krulwich went on to say he is calling a meeting of four leading heavyweight contenders here Thursday to "complete arrangements" for an elimination tournament to produce a challenger for Clay.

Khanh receives confidence vote

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI)—South Viet Nam's highest government body gave military strongman Maj. Gen. Nguyen Khanh a unanimous vote of confidence Sunday in its first meeting since his coup Jan. 30.

The Military Revolutionary Council reelected Khanh as its chairman by 53 to 0. He cast the only blank ballot. The 37-year old general, who came from a combat command to seize power, said the vote shows again "the unity of the armed forces, not only in Saigon but in the whole force, especially combat units in the field."

The council also chose a new executive or steering committee in a move apparently designed to make its operations smoother. Three of Khanh's deputies are on the committee.

The official Viet Nam press agency, meanwhile, reported that 22 persons were killed when Communist Viet Cong terrorists exploded a mine under a bus Sunday morning in South Viet Nam's Long An Province.

The agency report said six children and a pregnant woman were among the dead. It said four persons were hospitalized with serious injuries.

COMMISSION RESUMES

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Howard L. Brennan of Dallas, a witness to the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, testified today before the Warren Commission.

Brennan was near the Texas School Book Depository last Nov. 22 when Kennedy was shot by a sniper believed to have fired from the building.

Deadline near on applications for tax relief

Property owners planning to apply for tax relief under the senior citizens' exemption and deferral law passed by the 1963 legislature are reminded by County Assessor Robert E. Lyons that the deadline for filing is Wednesday, April 1.

The new law has two separate provisions for persons who were 65 years or older on March 1. One allows a partial exemption from taxes on property used as a personal residence by an applicant whose "gross receipts" are not more than \$2,500 during the previous calendar year. The exemptions vary, according to the taxpayer's age, from 10 per cent to 100 per cent of the first \$10,000 of true cash (market) value. Exemptions are outright, but the taxpayer must apply each year by April 1.

The second provision is for a deferral of taxes on the owner's nonincome-producing residence on which there is no tax delinquency. Granting of the claim will defer tax payments for the next fiscal year and continue the deferral of payments for past years as to which claims have been filed, until eligibility ceases. The taxes, plus 6 per cent annual interest, become due when the claimant dies or the property is sold or no longer qualifies. A surviving spouse, 60 years of age or older, can elect to continue the deferral.

Applications for exemption and deferral must be filed with County Assessor Robert E. Lyons, together with proof of age. Forms for both benefits are available at his office.

Ten members of the group of 25 will be living in St. Veit. The other 15 students will be divided between two nearby towns, Voltermarkt and Klagenfurt.
