

Ayes' and 'nays' about equal at Dunes hearing

FLORENCE (UPI) — The "ayes" and the "nays" were represented in approximately equal proportion Thursday at a hearing on the proposed Oregon Dunes National Seashore along the central Oregon coast.

The measure, sponsored by Rep. Robert Duncan, D-Ore., would create a 30,000-acre federal preserve in the dunes area south of Florence. All but some 4,200 acres already are in public ownership.

A similar measure sponsored by Sen. Maurine Neuberger, D-Ore., is currently awaiting Senate action after being favorably reported out of committee.

Reps. Ralph Rivers, D-Alaska, and Harold Johnson, D-Calif., members of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Subcommittee, conducted the hearing. Duncan attended as an observer.

Among those testifying was a spokesman for Crown Zellerbach Corp., owners of more than one-third of the privately held acreage within the proposed park boundaries. He stated that his company would not object to the creation of the park if a land exchange could be made to protect the firm's Tahkenitch Tree Farm.

Opposition Given
Industrial opposition to the measure was characterized by a plea from Chris Beck of the Central Lincoln Public Utilities District. He objected to loss of the water resources in the dunes.

The statement brought a reply from Duncan that there was room for both a park and industrial water development—provided the latter did not significantly conflict with park purposes.

A number of witnesses expressed concern over future economic implications of the park. However, J. J. Geany, Coos County commissioner, stated that land values and commercial businesses in the neighborhood of other seashore preserves had increased following the establishment of a park.

Mrs. Florence Waggener, Gardiner, a candidate for the Republican nomination for Congress from Duncan's 4th District, called the plan an "outrageous waste of money," and added that it would be bad for the economy.

Generally opposition came from local residents and area industry as well as elvive and governmental groups. Favoring the park were such organizations as the Mazamas, Sierra Club, the Oregon Roadside Council and the Committee for the Oregon Dunes.

Police cars travel 137,580 miles in 1963

Did you know that Bend's city policemen are world travelers—of a sort?

During 1963 city police cars traveled 137,580 miles. That's over five times the distance around the world and half the distance to the moon.

Acting Chief of Police Jack Arney reported that his department uses four cars. The total mileage per month averages over 11,000 miles.

November was the month that saw the local cars roll up the highest monthly total of the year at 12,385 miles. January was next in line at 12,042 and October was the lowest at 11,708 miles. June was the lowest individual month at 10,574 miles.

Storm moving toward Oregon

The weatherman forecasts more than normal precipitation for fading March, and predicted temperatures indicate this moisture may be in the form of rain below the 5,000 foot level.

A new storm now moving in from the Pacific will bring from one to two inches of rain to the coastal areas, and from one-fourth to one-half inch in the interior, the five day forecast indicates. East of the mountains, the moisture will be lighter, but "more than normal," the forecast adds.

Roads over the Cascades were in good shape this morning, with only a trace of new snow reported. There were some slick spots on mountain highways.

So far this year, Bend patrol cars traveled 12,189 miles in January and 13,065 in February which is slightly above the 1963 totals for the same period.

This is the monthly 1963 breakdown: January, 12,042; February, 11,309; March, 11,063; April, 11,052; May, 11,137; June, 10,574; July, 11,581; August, 11,240; September, 11,923; October, 11,708; November, 12,385; and December, 11,099.

Arney said that each car is traded in every two years (with the approval of the city commission) with an average of 100,000 registering on the speedometer. "Any car that has gone that many miles has almost had it," the chief continued.

Many miles are not even recorded on the speedometer because often in surveillance work

the motor of a car continues to run while the speedometer is idle.

To keep the vehicles in the best possible operation, maintenance is carried out by city crews at the Bend city shops. Each of the cars goes through a lube and oil change "operation" every 1,000 miles.

The Bend fleet consists of three 2-door sedans and one station wagon. The wagon is used as an auxiliary ambulance when the regular emergency vehicle is on call. The fleet is supplemented by two three-wheeled scooters used on meter patrols.

During those 137,580 miles pilled up in 1963, 13,108.4 gallons of gas was guzzled by the four police vehicles. And that's no "gas".

Sale of wool pool reported

PRINEVILLE — The Central Oregon Wool pool was sold yesterday to the Caron Spinning Company, Rochelle, Ill., according to Gus Woods, Crook County agriculture agent.

Woods said that 4,357 fleeces were involved in the annual sale. The wool sold at 64 cents a pound. It was one of the larger sales since the pool was first organized for farmer sheep growers, in 1945.

The size of the pool, it was said, reflects increased interest in farm flocks in the tri-county area. The sale represented the wool crops of 87 farmers in Crook, Jefferson and Deschutes county.

The Central Oregon wool pool was organized to give the small flock owner an opportunity to sell his wool in a competitive market.
