Redmond vote on school bond issue Monday

REDMOND — Redmond Elementary School District voters will cast their ballots Monday on a \$550,000 bond issue for construction of a new primary grade school and improvement of facilities at the John Tuck School.

The election board are Mrs. Jessa Tetherow, Mrs. Russell Galbraith and Mrs. D. L. Penholow.

If approved, the sum of \$440,000 would go to construct and equip the new school on property the district owns in Southwest Redmond. The remainder would pay for improvement of musical and physical education facilities at Tuck School.

Rockefeller set for campaign trip to Oregon

ALBANY, N. Y. (UPI)—Gov.

Nelson A. Rockefeller will declare a cease-fire in the political wars in his own back yard next week and head west to campaign for the Oregon and California GOP presidential primaries.

Rockefeller's national prestige suffered a jolt Thursday when a recalcitrant, Republican-dominated state legislature killed one of his administration's pet projects, liquor law revisions, and then adjourned for the year.

The governor angrily ordered the legislature to convene at a special session April 15 to reconsider the liquor measures and certain other legislation which the governor believes the lawmakers should have acted favorably upon.

For the first time since March 11, Rockefeller leaves New York state on Sunday to fly to Ontario, Ore.

He is scheduled to make appearances in seven communities during his three-day tour of Oregon, which has his presidential primary May 15.

The highlight of Rockefeller's stay in the Beaver State will be an hour and a half state-wide television originating from Portland Tuesday night. Scheduled stops on Rockefeller's Oregon itinerary include Ontario, La Grande, Pendleton, The Dalles, Bend and Eugene.

Wednesday, Rockefeller will fly from Portland to San Francisco to resume his campaigning for the important California presidential primary June 2.

The governor is pitted against Sen. Barry Goldwater in the Golden State's primary, whose outcome, observers say, will substantially determine the political strength, the two candidates will carry into their party's national nominating convention in July.

Between Wednesday and Friday afternoon, the governor is scheduled for appearances in San Francisco, Palo Alto, Millbrae, and Los Angeles.

Seven companies get oil permits

PORTLAND (UPI) — The

Oregon Geology Department said Friday that seven oil companies have been given permits to explore off the state's coast this year.

Vern Newton, petroleum engineer for the department, said that the companies were expected to start exploration about the middle of next month.

They are Humble, Mobil, Richfield, Standard of California, Union, Shell and Superior. More firms are expected to apply for permits to make seismic surveys and take bottom samples, according to Newton.

Five companies received permits to explore off the Oregon coast last year.

Brandt, Moro invited to U.S.

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (UPI)

President Johnson has invited West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt to visit him in May and Italian Premier Aldo Moro for a working visit in July, the White House announced today.

Johnson invited Brandt to call on him in Washington on May 18 and the mayor has accepted the invitation, the White House said. Brandt will be in the United States to address the Foreign Policy Association in New York on May 15.

Moro, president of the Council of Ministers of the Italian republic has been invited for a "working visit" July 7 and 8. It will be the premier's first official visit to the United States.

Delay requested on extradition

SALEM (UPI)—Attorneys for John Lyle Wilson have asked Gov. Mark Hatfield to delay action on an extradition request from Washington Gov. Albert D. Rosellini "for a few days."

Loren Hicks, Hatfield's legal counsel, said the attorneys want time to discuss the case with Rosellini in hopes they can convince him to drop the extradition request.

Wilson, who has been living in Portland for the past six years, escaped from custody in Washington seven years ago. He had been sentenced to 30 years in prison for his part in the murder of a Seattle grocer.

Hicks said Wilson's attorneys also asked that in case they were unsuccessful in their efforts with Rosellini, that they be allowed to hold a private meeting with Hatfield.
